

Note to Georgia Bulldog pitchers: If you're rocking along out in front of Florida State University's Seminoles in the late innings here this weekend, don't go thinking you've got it made—they may be just setting you up for the explosion.

The Kenyon College curving corps could tell Bulldog hurlers a thing or two about this big inning habit of the Seminoles. It cost the Ohioans an even break yesterday, after literally blowing them out of the ball park in Monday's opener.

There was husky Joe Pavlovich, the Kenyon ace, moving along without too much apparent difficulty yesterday, knocking the Indians down almost as fast as they popped up at the plate.

HERE WE GO

With a 2-0 lead in his pocket, and with FSU able to garner only two blows during the first six frames, it looked very much like the touring Ohio club would avenge Monday's humiliating 21-1 defeat.

A single and an error started it in the seventh, and by the time the frame had ended Pavlovich

had moved his residence from the mound to the showers and Kenyon was trailing 7-2.

Six solid base blows mixed in with that error and a little wildness and school was out for the Lords. Capt. Bob Trowbridge's three-run double was the big blow of the inning.

Just to add emphasis to their seventh inning surge, the Seminoles came back and chased four more runs across the platter in the eighth before rain and darkness prompted the game to be called in the top half of the ninth inning.

It was an 11-run burst in the second frame that had put the opener on ice.

John Witt, three-year veteran of the Seminole staff who is essaying a comeback after a year of idleness in 1951, chalked up the triumph in a relief role.

LOCKARD IMPRESSIVE

Lockard, flashing the form that made him a winner last year, blanked the Lords on two blows through the first five frames be-

fore retiring for a pinch-hitter in the top of the eighth canto.

Ken Smith, Les Mullen, Trowbridge, Ralph Blinn and Witt paced the Seminole attack on Pavlovich and Williams with two knocks apiece. Ronald Melton and Billy Campbell collected the other two hits.

Centerfielder Pitney had a pair of blows for the Lords, who move on from here for three more intersectional games in the state before returning to the cooler but probably safer confines of the northland.
