

Georgia pitcher Allen Parrish retired the side with the tying run on third base in the ninth inning and the Bulldogs managed to snap Florida State's six-game winning streak, 7-6, here yesterday.

The one-run setback gave Danny Litwhiller's Seminoles a two-game split with the defending Southeastern Conference champion and a 6-1 record heading into today's series opener with Amherst (Mass.) College.

FSU will meet Amherst, starting its fourth spring tour of Florida, in 3:30 games on its East Campus diamond this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon. Tommy Garcia, pint-sized freshman righthander with a 2-0 record, is Litwhiller's choice to face Amherst today.

#### POOR BEGINNING

The Seminoles got a poor start against Georgia yesterday and were never out front. A four-run FSU rally in the seventh inning, however, tied it briefly before the Bulldogs pushed across the deciding run in their eighth.

State moved a runner to third base after two outs in the ninth, on Riley Seever's single, a sacrifice and an infield out. But Parrish forced pitcher Max Long, who had batted in three runs in the big seventh inning, to pop up and that was the ball game.

Parrish, tall righthander, was credited with his second victory against no losses although he gave up 10 hits and was in hot water most of the way. Long

was saddled with his first loss after two triumphs, giving up 14 hits in the chilly weather.

The Seminole error and singles by Tarleton, Andrews and Grice gave the Bulldogs a two-run start in the first inning. Knight's single, a fielder's choice, and Tarleton's double made it 3-0 in the fourth.

#### RALLY IS FUTILE

Twomey's double down the left field line after Parrish had walked the bases full accounted for FSU's first two runs in the fifth. A two-base error and Knight's single to center brought Georgia a run in the sixth.

In the seventh, Andrews'

triple, a fielder's choice, and Grice's single through the box gave Parrish a 5-2 lead. He couldn't hold it.

Billy Campbell led the Seminole seventh with an infield hit and raced to third as Seever's lived on the shortstop's bobble. Twomey plated Campbell with a line shot to left and the bases were full when Hendrix walked. Long delivered, slamming a base-clearing double against the left-field wall to tie it at 6-6.

But Tarleton's single, two walks, and a fielder's choice enabled Georgia to push across the winning run in their eighth.
