ATHENS, Ga.—Freshman Tommy Garcia went after his sixth pitching triumph this afternoon as Florida State sought to continue its hottest baseball streak in the finale of a two-game series with Georgia's Bulldogs.

Coach Danny Litwhiler's Seminoles swiped four bases and seized every scoring opportunity to hand Georgia its worst shellacking, 14 = 5, here yesterday. After producing 36 runs in three games on the current road trip, the Tribe has run its season record to 15-5.

SECOND OF YEAR

Two of those 15 triumphs have come over Coach Jim Whatley's Bulldogs, Boutheastern Conference baseball titlists the past two years and almost a cinch to repeat with a present 11-1 reading in the SEC's Eastern Division.

Georgia and FSU are now

deadlocked at six games spiece in their tight rivalry.

Typical of FSU's hustle yesterday was the performance of leftfielder Gale Tuggle. He walked twice, was hit by pitchers twice, and singled once, scoring four runs on only one official time at bat.

Teammate Billy Campbell, on a hitting spree, scored three runs and Riley Seevers, the club's leading hitter, had three safeties and three runs batted in.

Max Long, winning his second game in four days, relieved starter George Hehemann in the second inning to claim the decision Long has a 4-2 record. The victim was Big Al Parrish, who absorbed his first collegists defeat for the Bulldogs.

TOTAL 12 HITS

The Tribe jumped on Parrish and Doug Foster, Georgia's number two hurler, for 12 hits. The Seminoles have banged 43 hits in their last three starts.

Unless a tournament invitation is forthcoming, the Seminoles will close a 23-game schedule-with two games at Stetson this weekend.

Tarleton Ties Runs Record

ATHENS, May 2—Florida State ran the bases with the same daring that their coach, Danny Litwhiler, used with the old St. Louis Cardinals, Monday afternoon and routed Georgia's baseball team, 14-5.

The Seminoles stole only four bases, but their wild running forced the Bulldogs into numerous errors, six to be exact.

For Georgia, it was obviously a case of looking ahead to this weekend's big Southeastern Conference series with Georgia Tech. The six errors and 14 men left on base added up to one of Georgia's poorest performances this season. But that doesn't take anything away from the dashing FSU crew, one of the top teams in the South. The Seminoles took advantage of every break and will be aiming for a sweep of the two-game series Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 on Ag Hill. Typical of FSU's hustle was the performance of left fielder Dale Tuggle. Tuggle walked twice, was hit by pitches twice and singled once, scoring four runs on only one official time at bat. Second baseman Bill Campbell scored three runs while leadoff man James Seevers led the attack with with three hits and three runs-batted-in.

Major consolation for Georgia was the fact that leadoff man Wendell Tarleton tied the all-time runs-scored record in the first. It was his 36th, equaling the mark set by Jim Bagwell in 1950. Top batter for the Bulldogs was John Douglas with three safeties.

Max Long, a slender right-hander, got credit for the victory by hurling the middle five and onethird innings. He is 4-2 on the season. Starter Al Parrish absorbed his first collegiate defeat for the Bulldogs. Tommy Garcia, slated to start for FSU Monday, was ill in the hotel with a stomach disorder.
