

Florida State's baseball Seminoles played a poor host to the University of Miami here Saturday afternoon, handing the Hurricanes their second straight setback behind the strong right arm of Tommy Garcia. 2-0.

For Garcia, who faced only 30 men in the brilliant four-hitter, it was the third win of the campaign without defeat. The victory brought the FSU mark to 20-4.

It was also the sixth consecutive Florida Intercollegiate Baseball Conference triumph for the Seminoles. After losses here Friday and Saturday the Hurricane FIBC record is now 4-2.

JUST TO SECOND

The furthest along the losers could push a runner was second base, which shortstop Bill Parker reached after singling and moving to the keystone sack on Frank Piveronis' one-baser in the second. Garcia, a sophomore, fanned two and walked none.

Southpaw Bert Robins was almost Garcia's equal. The sophomore curveballer only had one bad inning, the second, when the Seminoles hurried two runs across.

Lee Corso led off the second with a single to left, went to second when Fred Twomey's high fly fell in shallow left for another one-baser and reached third after Bob Rosell walked, loading the bases with none out.

Robins bore down and made Phil Hunt force Corso on a bouncer to third, but Twomey made it in when catcher John Shepard, playing in his first game, lined a sacrifice fly to left. The final FSU run came in when Robins walked Owen McCarron, forcing in Rosell from third.

THIRTEEN LEFT

The Seminoles touched Robins for eight hits and received five bases on balls, threatening in almost every inning, but could never draw blood after the second. FSU stranded 13 men, Miami three.

Garcia and McCarron paced the winners at the plate with a pair of singles apiece.

First baseman Piveronis was the only Hurricane to solve Garcia for more than one hit. Piveronis got a pair on singles in three trips.
