

TALLAHASSEE, Ga.—Lee Corso's long triple in the eighth inning with two men aboard set the stage for a late-game rally by Florida State that led to a 6-2 win over Georgia here yesterday afternoon.

Trailing 2-1, going into the eighth, FSU's Dick Howser singled and Fred Twomey walked to set the stage for Corso's belt that pushed the Tribe into a 3-2 lead.

Florida State added two more runs in this action-packed ninth when pitcher Fred Kenney drove a single through the middle and Owen McCarron was safe on a fielder's choice. After Carlee Hendrix struck out, Howser drilled another one-bagger through the right side to drive in Kenney and McCarron with the insurance.

EARLY SCORING

Georgia took the lead in the first inning on two walks, a stolen base, a balk by Kenney and a single by shortstop Gene Allen.

But from then on FSU's youthful sophomore held the Bulldogs at bay, scattering five hits over the rest of the game until he needed help for the final out in the ninth inning.

Georgia filled the sacks in the final canto with two singles, a double play, and two walks, but the Tribe's ace lefty, Tony Avitable, sauntered in from the bullpen and struck out Phil Tarleton to end the ball game.

Coach Danny Litwhiler cited Kenney for a fine pitching job in his first starting assignment of the season. His efforts made the Seminoles a prime choice for selection as the independent representative in the NCAA play-offs in Gastonia, N. C. next month.

Third baseman Phil Hunt was the fielding star for the Seminoles, coming up with six hard chances without an error. Hunt also contributed a double and single to the Seminoles' 10 hit attack.

HEARN BEATEN

The win by Florida State marked the first time this year that

Georgia's Dick Hearn had tasted defeat. Hearn finished the year with a 7-1 record.

The Seminoles wind up the season Friday and Saturday in Tallahassee against Rollins in an intercollegiate two-game series. Tony Avitable will get the nod on the hill Friday night against Rollins, and should the game go to extra innings, he will get a new challenge. Hearn, who has a 7-1 record for his career in a college season, will pitch for Georgia Saturday night. In his last season of 1955, he pitched in 147 innings. Avitable already has 12 in 78 innings this season.
