Leftfielder Jerry Philp's inside-the-park grand slam and stout pitching by veteran Jack Bristol paved the way for a 12-4 Florida State victory over Wisconsin's Badgers at Centennial Field last night.

Earlier in the day, Wisconsin's
George Schmid pitched the Badgers to a 6-1 triumph over West
Virginia in the open game of Florida State's invitational tournament.

LEADS FIELD

Despite its loss to the Seminoles. Wisconsin entered the second round today as the tournament leader. The Badger-FSU game last night won't count in tournament standings.

Weather permitting, three games were scheduled today. Most attention figured to center around FSU's 12:30 game with Notre Dame, the tournament favorite. Notre Dame and Wisconsin were to tangle at 3:30 at Seminole Field.

West Virginia and Florida State meet for the first time at Centennial Field tonight, starting at 7:30.

Wisconsin's Schmid didn't allow a walk and gave up only six hits in going the full nine innings agaist West Virginia yesterday. Art (Dynle) Mansfield's Badgers made the most of seven hits and six Mountaineer walks to hand West Virginia its first setback of the senson.

First baseman Ed Lenart's runproducing double was the biggest hit-for West Virginia. Batting sensation of the day, however, was Wisconsin leftfielder Ron Nieman, Badger co-captain.

HEFTY HITTING

Nieman clouted a 360-foot threerun home run against West Virginia, followed up with two triples against FSU last night. Both triples at spacious Centennial Field probably would have sailed out of the park at Seminole Field.

Philip had the day's most productive effort, though. The FSU senior, who played halfback in football, made only one plate appearance against Wisconsin. With the bases jammed. Philip smacked a fast ball into right field that took a wierd bounce past the Badgers' Ron Steiner. Philip scored behind three teammates as the ball rolled to the wall.

When Wisconsin's Bill Richards
(a southpaw) relieved starter Ken
Walfer in the second, Coach Danny Litwhiler lifted Philp (lefthanded hitter) in favor of Tallat

hassee's Buddy Cach (Right-handed hitter).

Bristol worked the first seven innings for his first 1958 decision. The Sharon, Conn., southpaw limited Wisconsin to five hits and one earned run before Jack Nelson finished up.

McCARRON RAPS

Centerfielder Owen McCarron led FSU's 11-hit attack against three Badger hurlers. McCarron scored four runs and collected two singles and a double in five official trips.

Singles by McCarron and Mike Copps and a walk to Dick Howser preceded Philip's four-run home run in the first. Three walks and a hit batsman gave FSU an easy run in the second.

Nieman's first triple and Richard's infield out produced a Wisconsin run in the third. An error and Nieman's second three-bagger brought the Badgers an unearned run in the fifth.

Wisconsin's defense fell apart in the fifth, when the Seminoles paraded four runs across with only one hit, McCarron's line shot to center. Solid hits in the seventh, after two outs, gave FSU an 11-2 margin. McCarron's double, Charlie Rodgers' triple, and Howser's sharp single past second accounted for two runs.

Nelson relieved Bristol at the start of the eighth and Wisconsin picked up its final two runs, both unearned. Dave Moriarty's pinch single, a walk, and two Seminole errors opened the gate.

Ray Bazzell's triple and Johnny-Sheppard's single chalked up FSU's 12th run in the eighth. BADGERS-WIN

In the afternoon game Wisconsin loaded the bases against West Virginia in the first with none out, but managed but one run on Ron Steiner's infield roller. The Badgers made it 20 in the second when Dave Moriarty walled, stole second, and scored on Schmid's single to elft.

Back-to-back singles by Frank Marik and Russ Mueller and Steiner's infield bouncer produced Wisconsin's third run in the fifth.

West Virginia spoiled Schmid's shutout in the sixth. With one away, third baseman Bob Senay lived on the shortstop's error. Ed Lenart chased Senay home with a double to left-center.

Control cost reliefer John Brodie three Wisconsin runs in the seventh. Two walks set the stage for Nieman's, 360-foot home run over the right-center wall.
