

Florida State's Seminoles bunched all their hits and runs into two big innings to turn back Wisconsin, 7-3, for their third straight tournament success at Centennial Field last night.

Notre Dame's Fighting Irish stayed within striking distance with a come-from-behind 6-4 triumph over luckless West Virginia in yesterday's afternoon game.

SLUSSER GOES

Monday results set the stage for a Centennial Field showdown between Notre Dame and Danny Litwhiler's Seminoles at 7:30 tonight.

Senior righthander Frank Slusser, winning pitcher in a 5-2 PSU victory over Notre Dame (the only Irish loss) last Saturday, will pitch for the Seminoles. Either Chuck Symeon or Frank Carpin will pitch for the Irish.

Wisconsin and West Virginia clashed at Seminole Field at 3 this afternoon.

Wisconsin righthander George Schmid baffled Florida State for seven of the nine innings last night, retiring the side in order seven times. But the Seminoles raked Schmid for three hits and three runs in the fourth inning and four hits and as many runs in the fifth.

Florida State had the unusual distinction of not leaving a runner stranded.

In the meantime, senior lefthander Jack Bristol was fashioning a seven-hitter, striking out 10 Badgers and not issuing a single walk. It was Bristol's second decision over Wisconsin against one loss to Auburn.

Schmid mowed down 10 batters in a row before first baseman Charlie Rodgers looped a double into shallow center field with one away in the fourth. Shortstop Dick Howser chased Rodgers home with a single up the middle.

Rightfielder Mike Copps forced Howser and Jerry Philp walked before third baseman Dale Koch tripled home two runs. Koch was thrown out at the plate trying to stretch the hit into an inside-the-park home run.

The Seminoles rallied for four runs in the fifth, all after two outs. Second baseman Ray Bazzell singled and scored ahead of Owen McCarron's inside-the-park home run. Rodgers walked and scored when Howser doubled to right on the hit-and-run. Copps singled to center to plate Howser.

Wisconsin scored single runs in the fifth, sixth, and eighth innings. Shortstop Bill Mallatt's double and two singles paced the Badgers' seven-hit attack.

West Virginia lefthander Paul

Chuma was the victim of unearned runs in losing the Notre Dame game. Rightfielder Wayne Austin's two-run homer over the right-field wall had given the Mountaineers a 4-3 lead in the fifth inning.

Chuma, who had a four-hit-
ter going into the fatal ninth,
was the loser. Symeon, third of
four Notre Dame pitchers, earned
the victory by retiring West
Virginia with no damage in the
eighth.

Austin had two hits in four
trips for the Mountaineers.
Rightfielder Bo Broemmel col-
lected two of Notre Dame's five
hits.
