

Frank Slusser, a crafty senior righthander less than two months away from graduation, pitched a brilliant no-hit, no-run game as Florida State's Seminoles humiliated ~~the University of Miami~~ 18-0, at Centennial Field last night.

Slusser walked four and struck out eight—including the final three batters in the ninth inning—in becoming the first no-hit pitcher in FSU history.

#### FINALE TODAY

More than 500 fans sat on the edge of their seats as Slusser mowed down the Hurricanes in the ninth inning. The teams were to play the series finale at Seminole Field at 1:30 this afternoon.

While Slusser was fashioning his no-hitter, the Seminoles raked three Miami hurlers for 14 hits, including five doubles and towering home runs by rightfielder Mike Copps and third baseman Dale Koch.

Copps also had a double and a single and batted home four runs. Shortstop Dick Kowser and first baseman Charlie Rodgers each had two safeties.

Owner of two victories over Florida, Coach Whitey Campbell's Hurricanes couldn't solve Slusser's pitches. Suffering its eighth loss after 10 triumphs, Miami hit only three balls out of the infield.

#### ONCE TO 3RD

Only once did the Hurricanes get a man as far as third base. That was in the eighth, when Slusser hit shortstop Bob Brewer and second baseman Angelo Mandis in succession and an

infield out moved them over to third and second. But leftfielder Jerry Couch backed up near the left-center wall to take Miami first baseman Ed Contreras' long drive to retire the side.

Only one other Hurricane came close to a base hit. With two outs in the fifth, Brewer smacked a sharp line drive to the left of second base. But Howser moved over quickly to spear the ball.

It was sweet revenge for Slusser. The Nescopek, Pa., native pitched a two-hitter against the Hurricanes in Miami last year, only to lose, 2-1, when Contreras belted a two-run home run in a seven-inning game.

Slusser has pitched brilliantly all spring. He owned 5-2 (over Notre Dame) and 3-1 (against Wisconsin) triumphs before taking the hill last night. He has allowed but three earned runs in 29 innings for a sparkling 0.93 earned run average.

# QUICK CHASING

Danny Litwhiler's regulars chased Miami starter Roger Newman in the second inning and had stacked up a 13-0 margin after six. Litwhiler then substituted at every position except pitcher and catcher and the newcomers paraded five runs across in the eighth.

The Seminoles scored in five of their eight innings—never less than three runs. It was their eighth triumph against four losses.
