

North Carolina's classy Tar Heels remained unbeaten and Florida State's Seminoles squared their tournament record at 1-1 as play moved into the third round of FSU's eight-team round-robin affair here today.

Walter Rabb's Tar Heels, 4-0 for the season rallied for two runs in the last of the ninth to edge Florida, 7-6, and FSU scored in each of the first seven innings to turn back Illinois, 16-9, in last night's games at Centennial Field.

Three games were on the agenda today, with a 7:30 p.m. Centennial Field clash between Florida and FSU highlighting the program. Illinois and North

Carolina clash in the first game of a Seminole Field doubleheader at noon. Duke and Michigan make their tourney debuts at Seminole Field at 3 p.m.

Florida (2-3), still looking for its first tournament victory, is expected to throw Tallahassee junior Don McCreary against the Seminoles tonight. Seminole Coach Danny Litwiler nominated sophomore Frank Davis (2-0) to face the Gators.

FSU built up an 8-0 lead after three innings in handing Lee Ellbracht's Illini their first setback of the season. Rightfielder Nell Martin collected four of the Tribe's 15 hits and centerfielder Ray Bazzell bagged three singles.

Ron Fraser and Jim Danfel split the pitching chores for the Seminoles, with Fraser getting

his second victory. Only three of the nine Illinois runs were earned as the Tribe committed eight errors.

FSU Second baseman Bob Clem ran his consecutive-game hitting streak to eight games with two singles. The Atlanta sophomore is hitting .531, with 17 hits in 32 trips.

Rightfielder Johnny Burgwyn singled home North Carolina's winning run with two out in the ninth after the Gators had taken a 6-5 lead on catcher Mickey Ellenburg's ninth-inning home run.

Tar Heel righthander Wayne Young pitched the route, allowing 11 hits. Florida ace Ray Oestricher was the loser in relief. Oestricher blanked the Tar Heels in the eighth but a walk, an error, and two singles set the stage for Burgwyn's game-winning single in the ninth.

The teams have scored a total of 74 runs on 91 hits in the first four tournament games.
