

First thing you know, Coach Danny Litwhiller will be scheduling seven-inning baseball games for his Seminole nine.

Had that been the case the past two nights, FSU would be sporting a 5-1 record in its fourth annual tournament rather than the 3-3 standing it sports today.

SAME PATTERN

For the second straight game at Centennial Field last night, the Seminoles had a one-run lead heading into the eighth inning. Duke scored four runs in the eighth Monday to nudge the Seminoles, 6-3. Last night it was Western Michigan that pushed across two unearned runs with two out in the eighth to nip FSU, 3-2.

Illinois continued its red-hot journey showing with its fourth straight triumph, 8-3, over Big Ten rival Michigan State, and Duke blanked Michigan, 2-0, in other games yesterday.

Coach Lee Edbracht's Illini (4-1) and Ace Parker's Duke Blue Devils (2-1), the journey's top two teams at present, clashed in a noon game today. Michigan State (0-2) and Western Michigan (1-1) were set for the second game at Seminole Field at 3 p.m.

FSU and Michigan (1-2) are set for a single game at Centennial Field tonight, starting at 7:30.

UNEARNED RUNS

Seminole pitcher Carl Nelson suffered a tough loss last night. The junior right-hander had shut out Western Michigan on three hits entering the eighth inning when the Broncos shoved across two unearned runs without a hit. A walk and two costly errors proved Nelson's downfall.

The Seminoles had taken a 2-0 lead in the fifth on back-to-back singles by Neil Martin, Charlie Rodgers, and Doug Walker, and an infield out. The Tribe was unable to muster any more runs although leaving 12 runners stranded.

Southpaw Phil Horala allowed only two singles in five innings of relief to get the win for Western Michigan.

Illinois right-hander Terry Gellinger allowed Michigan State two scratch singles and a home run

in pitching Illinois to its 8-3 triumph in yesterday's first game. Bill Schudlich hit the home run.

The Illini jumped on Michigan State ace Dick Radatz for six hits and four runs and bagged seven more hits and four runs off two relief pitchers.

Sophomore Marion Williams pitched the meet's second shut-out in Duke's 2-0 whitewash of Michigan. Williams was touched for only four hits.
