It was Michigan State's second victory of the day. The Spartans clipped arch-rival Michigan, 1-0, and Western Michigan trimmed Duke, 5-3, in other games yesterday.

xesterday's results left litinots as the unofficial tournament champion. The Ilini won five of six games before leaving the round-robin tournament Wed-nesday. Western Michigan, the pre-tourney favorite, linished second with a 5-2 standing.

Other tournament showings included North Carolina, 2-1; F5U, 6-4; Michigan State, 3-4; Duke, 3-5 Florida, 1-3, and Michigan, 1-6.

Coach Danny Litwhiler's Seminoles had at least one victory over every team in the tournament save North Carolina. FSU dropped a \$-7 verdict to North Carolina in the opening game of the tournament.

A three-run third inning gave Michigan State an edge the Seminoles couldn't overcome last night. Spartan righthander Craig Van Sciever—coming on after the Tribe had faced a chain of lefthand pitchers throughout the tournament—handcuffed the Seminoles on three hits over the last five and two-thirds innings.

Jerry Hohne was tagged with the loss, his third. Michigan State reached Hohne and reliefers Carl Nelson and Ron Fraser for nine hits, two each by third baseman Jerry Lumianski and centerfielder Dean Look.

Michigan State rightfielder John Russell may have set some sort of record with four sacrifices in the nine-inning game.

Russell moved up Spartan runners with bunts in the first, fifth, seventh, and ninth innings.

First baseman Doug Walker led FSU's 7-hit attack with two singles.

After their 6-4 tournament performance, the Seminoles now have won 14 of 19 games for the season. FSU hosts Florids in a pair of regular-season games here next Friday and Saturday.
