

Playing flawless defensive baseball for more than two-and-a-half hours, Georgia's Bulldogs made two miscues in a span of five seconds here yesterday and Florida State seized the chance for a 9-8 season-opening victory.

The teams conclude their two-game Seminole Field series at 3:30 today, with senior right-hander Jim Daniel scheduled to pitch for the Seminoles.

QUICK JUMP

Jumping off to a 5-0 start yesterday, then falling behind by 8-6, FSU rallied for three runs in the final two innings to launch a 20-game agenda on the right foot. The clincher came with one out in the last of the ninth inning, when junior shortstop Kyle Spitzer parlayed an infield single and a stolen base with Georgia's sudden letdown for the biggest run of the day.

A first-day crowd of some 1,000 watched Spitzer beat out a high hopper toward third after

second baseman Jack Dull fouled out to open the bottom of the ninth. With third baseman George Fergusson — the Palm Beach JC graduate made a sparkling Seminole debut — at bat, Spitzer dashed for second.

He had the base stolen, but Georgia catcher Phil Ashe's throw shot past second base into center field. Spitzer dug for third. He didn't slow down as the ball somehow bounced off and beyond centerfielder Benny Cheek, a Bulldog batting hero in his first varsity game.

The Seminole comeback kept it from being a gloomy senior debut for FSU pitching ace Frank Davis and was a just reward for flashy relief pitching and timely hitting by junior lefthander Jack Ross.

ROUGH ROAD

Davis, who entered the game with a 16-6 career record and a 3-0 chart in previous starts against Georgia, was treated roughly after fanning four Bulldogs and hanging up an all-time career strikeout mark of 146. Tagged for nine hits and eight runs in six innings, Davis had tamed the Bulldogs with only one run in 24 previous innings during the past two seasons.

Ross was effective in the three innings he worked, giving up three singles and no runs while chalking up his first FSU victory. And it was Ross who knocked in the tying run for FSU in the eighth frame.

Two newcomers, Fergusson and sophomore catcher Buddy Teagle, led FSU's 10-hit attack with a single and double apiece. Teagle drove home a vital eighth inning run with a 400-foot double to the base of the center-field wall.

Fergusson came up with more than one fielding gem at third base, drawing loud applause in the seventh inning with a lunging stab of Jim Rogers' hot line drive.

Sophomore second baseman Bob Sapp had three of Georgia's 12 hits and Cheek batted in four runs with a double and three-run homer.

Soph righthander Don Woeltjen was the victim of FSU's unearned run in the ninth, after coming on in the eighth with Seminoles on all bases and one out and retiring the side. FSU's first eight runs were earned. W. L. Hall was the first of four Georgia pitchers and Ronnie Braddock, another Bulldog soph, looked

sharp over five innings before tiring in the eighth.

DOUBLE PLAYS

Despite four errors, the Seminoles showed defensive promise, pulling off two infield double plays as Georgia left only four men stranded.

Davis broke Tom Garcia's old career strikeout mark of 145 by getting Georgia's Tom Vandiver on a called third strike in the third inning.

Opening wildness by Hall helped FSU to a 3-0 lead in the opening inning. Four walks forced one run in and Fergusson's double off the bag at third plated two more runs.

A walk to outfielder Jimmy White, soph leftfielder Dwight Smith's single to center, and first baseman Doug Walker's triple to the fence in right center made it 5-0, FSU, in the second.

Georgia reached Davis for three runs in the third on singles by Ashe and pinch-hitter John Wilsher and doubles by Sapp and Cheek. FSU got one of those runs back in its half on Teagle's single, a passed ball, and Davis' ground single to left.

BIG INNING

Georgia took command with five runs in the sixth. An error, singles by Ashe, shortstop Joey Miller, and first baseman Buddy Scott pushed across two runs and Cheek's 330-foot drive over the left field fence brought in Georgia's final three runs.

Fergusson's single, Teagle's booming double, and Ross' single to right field gave FSU a pair of runs and an 8-3 deadlock in the eighth. That set the stage for Spitzer's flight around the bases.
