SEMINOLE SMOKE SIGNALS

FLORIDA STATE, which played in the 1957 College World Series, is making its fifth appearance in the last six years as an at-large entry in the NCAA District 3 playoff. Only three teams--Arizona, Notre Dame, and Colorado State--have appeared in more playoffs than FSU since 1955. In its four previous NCAA tournament appearances (1956-57-58-59), FSU has compiled a 7-9 record for a .438 percentage that ranks the Seminoles 43d among 92 colleges that have competed for the national collegiate baseball championship since 1947.

With 10 lettermen on hand this year, Coach Danny Litwhiler's Seminoles won 20 of 25 regular-season games and scored at least one victory over every team they faced--Georgia, Auburn, Navy, Duke, North Carolina, Florida, Western Michigan, Georgia Southern, Florida Southern, and Miami (Fla.). FSU's longest winning streak was eight games and the Seminoles didn't allow a losing streak. They showed ability to win the close ones, taking five of seven one-run decisions.....Of the 22 players on FSU's tournament roster, nine are sophomores, eight are juniors, five are seniors. The five seniors--second baseman Jack Dull, rightfielder Neil Martin, first baseman Doug Walker, and pitchers Frank Davis and Jim Daniel--appeared with FSU in its last district playoff, in 1959.

Dull, a solid All-America candidate at second base, leads Seminole batters as five regulars are hitting more than .300 (Team average: .308). FSU's all-time home run (15) and runs-batted-in (78) king, Dull this season leads the Tribe in runs (27), hits (38), doubles (6), home runs (5), total bases (59), runs batted in (26), and batting average (.392). Dull was instrumental in a single-season FSU record for double plays, figuring in 20 of 25 Seminole twin killings. Walker has set a school record by slamming 7 triples. Davis (6-1), winningest pitcher in FSU history, has a 22-7 career pitching record.

FSU, now in its 14th year of baseball, has never had a losing season. Litwhiler's seven teams have a sparkling 140-54 (.722) record. The all-time Seminole record is 228-106-1 (.683).

COACH DANNY LITWHILER

There are few persons on any rung of the American baseball ladder who can match the vigor and determination that Florida State University Coach Danny Litwhiler has for the game.

Ask National League opponents who watched Danny's numerous skills during his 10 seasons as a major-league outfielder. Ask American League gaffers, who have seen his long-range hits beat them so often during recent major league Oldtimers games at St. Petersburg that they are threatening to bar him from the annual frolic. And ask his colleagues in the college coaching profession, who marvel at his endless flow of ideas for the betterment of the sport.

There is no doubt about Litwhiler being one of college baseball's most imaginative and dynamic coaches. When he came to Florida State seven years ago it was his expressed desire to put the Seminoles out front in the collegiate baseball scramble.

In seven seasons, Litwhiler's Seminoles have won 140 games while losing only 54. It adds up to a .722 percentage, a championship pace in anybody's league. The 1961 team is headed for FSU's fifth NCAA playoff in six years. The Seminoles appeared in the 1957 College World Series.

There have been extra measures of success. During the past few seasons, scores of Seminole players have signed with major league clubs, the majority signing only after graduation. One of Litwhiler's prodigies, 145-pound shortstop Dick Howser of West Palm Beach, was named to the NCAA's first-team All-America squad in both 1957 and 1958. FSU's team captain only three seasons ago (1958), Howser has earned a starting shortstop role with the Kansas City Athletics and is gaining much early support for American League "Rookie of the Year" honors. In 1959, FSU's Bob Clem won a second-team All-America spot as a second baseman.

Litwhiler has the perfect background to be a solid baseball coach. He built up a storehouse of ideas during his major league playing career with the St. Louis Cardinals, Philadelphia Phillies, Cincinnati Reds, and the old Boston Braves.

Danny went down in the books for several outstanding performances before retiring as an active player in 1950. He batted safely in 21 straight games in his first major league season. He belted a home run in every National League park in 1941.

In 1942 he became the first major league player to play a complete errorless season. He handled 317 chances in 151 games that year and over a period of two seasons set a record of playing 187 consecutive games without an error.

The glove Litwhiler used in that string is retired in baseball's Hall of Fame.

In 1942 and 1943 Danny tied a National League record for the most years (two) leading in fielding percentage by an outfielder appearing in 100 or more games.

Litwhiler, 44, was born in Ringtown, Pa., and is a graduate of Bloomsburg (Pa.) State Teachers College.

After retiring as an active player, Danny coached with Cincinnati in 1951 and has managed minor league clubs at Fargo, N. D.; Wilkes-Barre, Pa.; Jamestown, N. Y., and Duluth, Minn.

TRAINER DON FAULS

A native of Ithaca, N. Y., personable Don (Doc) Fauls came onto the Florida State athletic scene in 1954. He has done an outstanding job easing Seminole aches and pains.

With a solid background in the treatment of baseball injuries, Fauls also serves as an "ex-officio" member of the coaching staff. He has done sparkling work in the instruction of young pitchers.

In his seventh year at FSU, Fauls was graduated from Ithaca College in 1948 with a degree in physio-therapy and began his professional work with a hospital in Bath, N. Y. After serving at Bath for two years, Don went to Greensboro, N. C., as trainer for the Greensboro Patriots of the Carolina Baseball League.

He worked during the off-season at the Gilmore Clinic in Greensboro and, after two years, joined the St. Louis Cardinal chain as a trainer at Omaha, Neb.

FLORIDA STATE'S 1961 ALL-AMERICA CANDIDATE

SECOND BASEMAN JACK DULL

"All work and no play, " as the old saying goes, "makes Jack a dull boy." If you'll pardon the pun, Florida State has a Jack who is literally a Dull boy and Coach Danny Litwhiler and Seminole fans couldn't be happier about it.

Second baseman Jack Dull, who grew up only a few blocks from the FSU campus in Tallahassee, is a paramount reason the Seminoles won 20 of 25 games this season and are headed for their fifth NCAA District 3 playoff in six years. In his first full season as a second baseman, the six-foot, 185-pound senior led the Seminoles in virtually every batting department and was instrumental in FSU pulling off a school-record 25 double plays in 25 games.

With his bat, Dull compiled a team-leading average of .392 and was the club pace-setter in runs (27), hits (38), doubles (6), home runs (5), total bases (59), and runs batted in (26). He shared the team stolen-base leadership with seven. With the glove, the 21-year-old team co-captain figured in 20 of FSU's 25 double plays, starting 10 himself.

Dull has always impressed professional scouts with his hitting. He has a three-year career batting average of .331 and has clouted 15 home runs in 75 games. He has batted in 78 runs--more than one a game--and has 159 total bases for his 96 hits as a Seminole. He batted in a school-record 37 runs and tied a school mark with six home runs in 1959.

His defensive ability? "He's the best second baseman I've seen in college baseball," says Litwhiler. "He makes the double play better than some major league infielders I have seen. He gets a good jump on the ball and has as good an arm as you will find anywhere in baseball."

Dull was a shortstop as a freshman and an alternate between short, third base and left field during his sophomore and junior years. "We should have moved him to second base sooner," says Litwhiler. "It's a natural position for him and he's given us magnificent leadership."

Jack Dull and Neil Martin, stars for the Florida State University Seminoles, signed professional contracts with the New York club in the National League, scout John W. "Red" Marion announced yesterday.

The New York team is scheduled to begin competition next season.

During the 1961 season, Dull, a second baseman, and Martin, an outfielder, hit .370 and .343 respectively. The pair finished one-two in the Seminole batting race.

Dull was recently named to the All-American squad selected by the American Association of College Baseball Coaches.

Marion said both boys signed "for a sizable bonus."

The two will be sent to the Mobile Bears of the Southern Association, Class AA. The Bears are a farm team of the New York club.

Florida State's final statistics reveal just how valuable Dull

was to Coach Danny Litwhiler's tribe. Final 28-game statistics show that Dull led the Seminoles in eight departments.

Besides his batting championship, the FSU co-captain was a pace-setter in runs (2), hits (40), doubles (7), home runs (5), total bases (62), stolen bases (9), and runs-batted-in (27).

Martin finished second in runs (26), hits (36), and tied with Doug Walker for second in doubles (5). He also finished high in triples (1), home runs (1), total bases (46), stolen bases (4), and runs-batted-in (12).

Senior pitchers Frank Davis and Jim Daniel finished with identical 6-1 records. Davis notched two career pitching records, although the Miami right-hander missed the NCAA District 3 playoff because of a blood ailment. Davis ran his career record to 22-7 and had 191 strikeouts during his three seasons.

The tribe set a team record

with 302 hits, 11 more than the 1959 Seminoles collected in 33 games. After bowing to West Virginia and Duke in the district playoff, FSU was ranked sixteenth nationally. The Seminoles were ranked fifth at the end of the regular season and were in the

top ten for most of the campaign. Dull is the third FSU baseball All-American in four years. Second baseman Babe Clem made the second-team All-American squad in 1959. Dick Howser, shortstop for the Kansas City Athletics, was first-team All American in both 1957 and 1958.
