

Seminoles Win On Unearned Runs

Visitors Score 4 In Eighth To Defeat Tar Heels By 5-2

North Carolina had the the cat in the bag yesterday, but let it get away, and Florida State walked off with a 5-2 diamond verdict.

Holding a 2-1 lead with two out in the eighth, Coach Rabb's Tar Heels fell to pieces, allowing the Seminoles to score four unearned runs for their 13th win in 16 outings.

Bill Dannemann, who deserved a better fate, was the victim of the uprising. With two out and nobody on, Mike Augustine singled to center. Gary Nichols and Woody Woodward then drew back-to-back walks to load the bases for the Seminoles' giant-sized catcher, Buddy Teagle.

Dannemann got two strikes and a ball on the All-American, and on the fourth pitch Teagle skied a high pop-up behind first base. Tar Heel first baseman Bobby Reagan,

known for his defensive ability, let the ball pop out of his glove as Augustine and Jim Loftin, running for Nichols, raced across with the tying and go-ahead runs. Woodward stopped at third, Teagle at second.

The next batter, George Roundtree beat out an infield hit to deep second, Woodward scoring easily, and Teagle tallying on Dickie Prindle's attempt to throw Roundtree out at first.

Dannemann finally got Billy Williamson to ground into a fielder's choice to end the fatal inning.

The Tar Heels took advantage of some breaks themselves in the bottom of the seventh. Trailing 1-0 and seemingly baffled by the one-hit pitching of Al Beccaccio, UNC came to life. Prindle started it off with a walk. Tom Wright laid down a perfect sacrifice and beat it out for a single. He ad-

vanced to second and Prindle to third when Beccaccio, who had fielded the bunt, threw to first, where nobody was covering.

Pinch-hitter Heyward Hull and Black both struck out, but when catcher Teagle let the first two pitches to pinch-hitter Ken Boykin get by him for passed balls, the Tar Heels picked up two runs and grabbed the lead. But it was short lived.

The Seminoles scored their other run in the third inning on walks to Beccaccio and Jim Reed and a single by Augustine.

Dannemann, starting his first game, now has a 1-1 record. He retired the first eight men in order and set the Seminoles down 1-2-3 in the fourth, sixth and seventh.

After giving up a triple to Prindle in the first, Beccaccio did not allow another hit until Wright's bunt single in the seventh.

DIAMOND DUST — The Tar Heels travel to Durham this afternoon for an important 3 p.m. encounter with Duke. Either Spence Willard or Bill Haywood will start against the Blue Devils, who won the first game over here, 8-1.
