

Florida Southern's Ken Huebner disregarded an ancient baseball adage yesterday afternoon, and Florida State's Seminoles came away with a 5-2 victory to open their 1964 season.

Southpaw Huebner, pitching masterfully most of the way, allowed only two bases on balls. Both were given up to FSU's Marty Howell, his opponent on the mound.

Howell scored both times in front of other Seminole baserunners as timely hits and untimely errors by Huebner's teammates opened the gates in the third and eighth innings to give Fred Hatfield a successful debut as Florida State baseball coach.

Howell, also a lefty, was in control almost throughout in a pitching duel.

Huebner drew no walks from Howell, but he did tag him for a double to score teammate Frank Oktavec in the first inning.

He had put two Seminoles away in the third when Howell watched four balls go by. Jim Reed, who turned in some fielding gems at second base and started the only FSU double play, singled Howell to second to set the stage for some grim miscues by the Moccasins. Reed darted for second when a low pitch escaped Darrell Fulton, but the Moc catcher recovered and the runner was trapped.

However, this wasn't Florida

Southern's day. A play was finally made for Howell going to third, but with an error on the play, all hands came up safe.

Mike Augustine's grounder slipped through Oktavec's legs at shortstop, scoring Howell and advancing Reed to third. On the second pitch to Bob Wilcox, Augustine broke for second, drawing a throw which eluded second baseman Ron James, and Reed came home.

Wilcox then drilled a single to left, scoring Augustine.

Howell had trouble in the seventh when rightfielder Fred Mayer tripled to the right center fence with two away. A pinch hit single by David Sonnen-

burg scored Mayer, then Howell walked Oktavec to keep the Moc rally alive.

Jim Hardee's long drive to left looked bad, but junior Randy Brown, playing his first game for the Seminoles, was on the spot to haul it in.

The Seminole cast of characters was much the same in the eighth inning when Howell drew a lead off walk from Huebner. Reed fouled off two bunt attempts, then lined a single, ad-

2 Augustine, the leading hitter
 for FSU last year, couldn't

 4 in left. Lee fired to second in
 attempt to catch Howell going
 back, but his throw got away
 from Ron Montgomery and Son-
 enberg, sending runners to sec-
 ond and third.

Catcher Ken Suarez worked
 the count to three and one be-
 fore he lined a single through
 the middle, scoring both.

Wilcox had two hits for the
 Seminoles. Lee and Mayer both
 had two for Florida Southern.
 Howell struck out four and
 Huebner three, going the dis-
 tance.

The two teams play again this
 afternoon at 3:30 p. m.
