

Seminole pepper pot Jim Reed stole home with the winning run in the fifth inning yesterday as Florida State edged Georgia Tech for the second straight day, 3-2.

The score was knotted at two all as a result of left fielder Jimmy Adams towering 345 foot home run in the top half of the fifth which drove in teammate Terry Hall ahead of him.

Reed drew a base on balls off pitcher Don Shi, then scooted to third on a passed ball by Catcher Dick Emerson. With lefthanded swinger Mike Augustine at bat, the Seminole second baseman brazenly lit for home, knocking the ball from Emerson's mitt. Umpire Larry Schenck called interference on Emerson, a decision which would have sent Augustine to first and Reed back to third. Fred Hatfield, tearing a page from the football coach's book, took the play rather than the penalty, and FSU led, 3-2.

Four Tech pitchers held the Seminoles to four hits, while rapping FSU's Bob Kull for six. Kull went the route to win for Florida State although he was hit hard by the Yellow Jackets as Seminole outfielders got a workout, pulling down nine long drives in defense.

Reed, the lead off man, scored in the first inning when he walked, then moved to second on a passed ball. Monty McBryde, currently the hottest Seminole at the plate, scored him with a ringing double to left center.

McBryde singled in the fourth, but was forced at second on George Rountree's ground ball

back to the mound. Rountree made second when Gary Nichols grounded to the first baseman, moved to third on a single by Larry Johnson, and came home with the second FSU run on a base hit by Paul Dirks.

Tech second baseman Doug Cook singled with one out in the fifth, then scrambled to third when an attempted pick off by Kull went astray. Cook struck for the plate on Hall's grounder to third, but Gerry Chmielewski's throw nipped him at the plate—a timely heave since the next man up was Adams who knocked the top out of a pine tree behind the right field fence.

Adams had a single in the third, and Emerson lined two safeties before giving way to Larre Entrekin in the eighth to lead the Jackets in hitting.

The Seminoles take on Northeast Louisiana in an afternoon game today, preceded by a Georgia Tech - NE Louisiana game at 11:30. Lefthander Marty Howell will go for Florida State.

Tech and NE Louisiana hook up in a rematch tomorrow morning at 11:30, while FSU meets North Carolina at 3:30 p.m. Hatfield has not announced his pitcher for tomorrow's game, but will probably go with John Smith, Ken Creely or Don Murray.

Yesterday's victory brought the FSU record to 6-2. Tech is winless in two starts.
