

Florida State took the wraps off some unexpected batting muscle in the third inning and went on to win its seventh game of the season, defeating Northeast Louisiana State, 7-4 yesterday.

The Florida State Invitational Tournament got down to earnest business with Georgia Tech beating the Louisianians in a morning opener by an identical 7-4 score.

Winning pitcher Monroe Hunt followed Gerry Chmielewski's single with a home run in the third inning to give the Seminoles the lead in the afternoon game, after Larry Johnson's low throw and Joey McGinn's double had put the Indians out front in the frame's top half.

FSU was in control from then on, adding a single run in the fourth and sixth and three tallies in a big fifth inning.

Johnson singled with two away in the fourth, then Ken Suarez was hit by a pitch from Mike Tinnerello, the losing pitcher. Chmielewski, the hottest Seminole at bat yesterday, singled Johnson home.

Gary Nichols' drove in two runs in the fifth with a double to right center. Mike Augustine walked and went to third on Monty McBryde's single. Bob Wilcox hit a screamer to third which was knocked down by Northeast's Charley Dykes.

Dykes took a look at McBryde off second, and the hesitation was long enough to give Wilcox first base and allow Augustine to scamper home with an FSU run. Nichols then chased McBryde and Wilcox home with his two-bagger, but Johnson's line drive was snared by shortstop Keith Prince who doubled Nichols off second to end the Seminole splurge.

Suarez led off the sixth inning with the longest home run hit at Seminole Field so far this year, and that was all for starter Tinnerello.

The Indians hit Hunt consistently, stringing two singles and a base on balls for two runs in the fifth. Right fielder John Hall hit a lead off single in the sixth, and Coach Fred Hatfield called Ken Creely in from the

bullpen with the count 2-0 on Dykes.

Creely had trouble finding the strike zone and threw two wild pitches, allowing Hall to score. However, he got left fielder Marvin Brosset and shortstop Worthington on strikes, and Dykes was cut down at second testing Suarez's arm.

Creely, in his second big relief stint of the season, allowed only one hit and gave up only one base on balls the rest of the way.

Tech won its first game of the year in a real slugfest which saw four home runs, three triples and two doubles rattle around the diamond.

Jimmy Adams had a homer and a double, Bill Selby a homer and Larre Entekin a triple for the Jackets, while Hall and Dykes went the round trip route for the Indians. Pitcher Floyd Murray had a double and a triple for Northeast.

Tech and Northeast La., met again at 10:30 this morning, and Florida State meets North Carolina at 3:30.

Tomorrow's action sees North Carolina and Mississippi State on Seminole Field and Duke versus Amherst at the Florida High diamond, both at 11:30 a. m.

Florida State meets Mississippi State at 3:30 p. m. in the FSU park, while N. E. Louisiana takes on Amherst.
