

Junior catcher Ken Suarez—a pacesetter all year—finished the season with a .404 batting average and led Florida State's baseball team in five other departments.

The stocky Tampa native collected 44 hits, six home runs, 67 total bases, 30 runs batted in and 21 bases on balls — all team highs.

Lanky Cliff Ranew won seven games for the Seminoles, but had to yield the strikeout title to lefthander Marty Howell who finished with a 6-6 record. In a brilliant two-game performance against Florida last weekend, Howell fanned 20 batters, boosting his season's total to 70.

Sophomore Ken Creely had the best record, winning four games in relief while losing none. Creely's 2.14 earned run average also led the staff.

Shortstop Larry Johnson and rightfielder Bob Wilcox were the only two regulars besides Suarez to hit over .300 on a

team which had a .273 batting average. Johnson hit .317 with eight doubles — led the team in that category. Wilcox hit .303 and drove in 27 runs.

Outfielder Monty McBryde led the Seminoles in stolen bases with eight, followed by second baseman Jim Reed and centerfielder Mike Augustine who had seven and six.

Augustine, an All-American last year with a .399 batting average, hit .294 this season. However, the Philadelphia, Pa.,

senior got 40 hits and struck out only five times.

Coach Fred Hatfield's team won 23 games, lost 13 in his first year at Florida State. Traditionally one of the nation's strongest teams, the Seminoles have never had a losing season in baseball.

Co-captains of the 1964 team were Reed and catcher Paul Dirks. Seniors were Reed, Augustine, Howell, Dirks, Johnson, first baseman George Rountree and pitcher Gary Williamson.

1 Three rainouts also gave the
1 scouts more time to talk to play-
ers they hope to sign. Eleven
players on NCAA tourney teams
were listed on the three 10-man
teams picked by the coach-
es. Only two not here are Frank
Stark, first base and Lance
Cobb, outfield, both of Texas
A&M, the only club eliminated.
Both made the second team.

In the two winner's bracket
games tonight Minnesota meets
Maine and Missouri takes on de-
fending champ Southern Cali-
fornia. Mississippi meets Ari-
zona State in an afternoon los-
ing bracket game.

Missouri was the only school
with two first team choices —

pitcher Keith Weber and third
baseman Dave Harvey, a .371
hitter. Both went to Missouri on
football scholarships.

Southern Cal was the only
school with three men on the
first three All-America teams.
The Trojans placed pitcher Walt
Peterson on the first team,
catcher Bud Hollowell on the
second team and Gary Suther-
land, .365-hitting shortstop, on
hte third team.

Hollowell, a .324 hitter, is one
of the USC players ineligible for
the college world series. Peter-
son, who'll start tonight, has a
16-3 record with two losses to
pro teams, and a 1.62 earned run
average. His foe will be sopho-
more Dennis Musgraves, 6-1,
and 0.36 for Missouri.

Arizona State placed second
baseman Luis Lagnaus and
pitcher Skip Hancock on the sec-
ond team, Mississippi put short-
stop Donnie Kessinger, a .422
hitter, on the first team, and
Minnesota had catcher Ron Woj-
ciak on the third team.

The starting pitchers remain
the same today, with Minnesota
using Frank Brosseau, 6-1;
Maine, Tom Murphy, 5-1; Miss-
issippi, Larry Higginbotham, 5-
0, and Arizona State, Ron Lea,
6-1.
