Fred Hatfield paraded another sophomore to the mound yesterday, and Florida State played just well enough behind him to win its eighth game of the season, defeating Wake Forest, 5-3.

Steve Marks was the pitcher, and though he had trouble early and often, he set the Deacons down on seven hits. Most of Marks' woes were inflicted by shortstop Maury Hopkins, who had a day both disasterous and brilliant

Hopkins, playing with a sore arm, made six errors, but also started two of four FSU double plays, and completed the relay on another plus making a sequence son's line drive in the ninth with two Deacons aboard.

Meanwhile, Florida State capitalized on three Wake Forest errors for two uncarned runs, and Randy Brown pounded a two - run homer high over the right center field fence.

Marks, while first varsity appearance, walked only one man, and struck out three. The Seminoles managed three runs in the first inning, and one each in the third and fifth.

Deacon pitcher Don Rich had some control trouble early, and hit leadoff-man Dick Fernandez. Fernandez reced for second as Hopkins struck out, and Deac catcher Dick Myers made a good throw, but no one came the bag to take it. Fernandez y took third.

Mike Martin reached first on a throwing error by third baseman Anderson, then Brown cleaned things up with his secl ond bomer of the year:

Wake Forest came charging back in the second when Lynn Nesbitt led off with the first of two tloubles for the afternoon, sliding in expertly under Tom Thomas throw to second from right field.

Hopkins fielded Joe Sepic's grounder, but tried for a play on Nesbitt going back to second which failed. Bill Molloy rapped out a single scoring Nesbitt.

It looked as though the Seminoles were out of the inning when Myers hit a double-play ball to short, but Hopkins' throw pulled Fernandez off—the bag and another run scored.

Gerald Boyles drove in the cother Deacon run with a single,

id but Hopkins started a double id play on Rich's grounder, saving n-a run.

C- With two out in the third, id Martin singled. Brown walked and Thomas drove in the run with a sharp hit through the middle.

Martin, who accored three runs, led off the fifth, and got all the way to second on an throwing error by shortstop Kraus Brown and Thomas grounded out, but Gary Nichols alapped his first pitch into right center plating Martin.

In an earlier game, Michigan State defeated winless Duke, 4-0. John Kettunen drove in two runs with a single in the fourth, and John Biedenbach tripled home another in the fifth, then scored on Bob Maniere's sacrifice fly.

Florida State remains the only undefeated team in the FSU Invitational with a 4-0 record. Michigan State is 3-1, Wake Forest 2-2, and Duke, 0-4.

Today's schedule had Duke and Wake Forest at 10, Michigan State and Duke at 12:30 and Florida State and Michigan e State at 3.
