The score was 18-14, the name of the game was baseball.

Florida State's erratic Seminoles added another amazing chapter to their most unusual season in taking their second game in a row from an equally amazing Loyola of New Orleans team here Saturday afternoon.

The Seminoles saw a 16 run lead dwindle to four in two of the wildest linings ever played at Seminole field. The gritty Wolfpack from the Delta City fought back for five runs in the eighth and seven in the ninth before reliefer Jim Ward could steam the tide and save starter Marvin Stringfellow's fifth victory of the year.

In the final analysis it was FSU power, and remarkably inept defensive play on the part of Loyola which spelled the difference. The Wolfpack, which had committed only nine errors in 18 games until Saturday, bobbled-in-every-way-imaginable. Only six of FSU's 18 runs were earned.

However, the Seminoles pounded 18 hits, and the display was sufficient to maintain their reputation as one of the nation's most powerful teams.

Wayne Giardino, playing at third base, hit a three run homer to left in an eight-run sixth inning which seemingly put the game in cold storage.

Dick Fernandez continued to show power to the opposite field. He led off the first inning, then scored on a sacrifice fly by shortstop - third baseman-first baseman-outfielder Muary Hopkins, who resumed his original position at short with good results.

Gary Nichols started his first game of the year at first and responded with three hits in five trips, driving in two runs and saving several errant throw afield.

Pete Sarron blasted three hits in four trips, including a double for two RBI's, and Randy Brown had two for two and scored three runs — one on a double steal with Roy Mewbourne.

Mewbourne, who had replaced the injured Mike Martin in centerfield, drove in two runs with two hits in three trips.

Tom Thomas collected two hits, including a double, and Bill Hammond poled a long triple to drive in a run in the seventh.

Stringfellow was effective until when Loyola began slapping away. Five questionable singles and two walks got the Wolfpack their five runs before Bob Kull came in to put out the fire.

Kull had no better luck with
