Florida State's explosive bats boomed again Thursday as the Seminoles whipped Rutgers University 18 - 10 for their 15th victory in 17 games.

The Tribe-collected 17 hits in the 3 hour, 20 minute marathon, including five extra base blows.

Dick Fernandez is the lat-

est member to join FSU's hero - a - day club. The 5-11, 170 - p o u n d senior second baseman banged o u t four hits in five trips to the plate, inincluding a



including a Fernandez three - run homer, and drove in six runs. Fernandez also scored three runs.

The game was a slug-fest with the lead going back and forth until the Seminoles took it for good in the bottom of the fifth.

FSU grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first when Gary Sprague rapped a leadoff double, advanced to third on an infield out and scored on Tom Thomas' single. Rutgers came back in the second for three runs. Will Anderson started things with a base on balls against Flori-

da State starter Nick Cafaro.
Jay Donovan followed with an infield single and both runners moved up a base on a passed ball. Rich Henderson walked to load the bases and Mike Stang slammed a double to left center clearing them—again.

Calaro was lifted in favor of Jim Ward and the junior righthander put out the fire.

The Seminoles took the lead again in the bottom of the second with a three - run outburst. Peter Sarron was hit by a Jim Corneile pitch to lead off the stanza. Mike Martin drew a free pass and Fernandez then hit a shot over the right centerfield fence.

FSU added its fifth run in the third on a double by Sarron and a single by Fernandez.

The Scarlet Knights got a couple in the fourth as Ward issued a walk to Tony Pascale after one man was out, and Rich Surdez belted a homer over the right centerfield fence.

Corneille retired after three innings on the mound for Rutgers, and lefty John Bretz took over. He didn't last very long however. Bretz' first 12 pitches were gue, Jim Lyttle and Randy Brown on base via walks before a strike was called in the inning. Thomas then punch-

ed a single into right scoring Sprague and the fleet-footed Lyttle followed him home when rightfielder Surdez bobbled the ball.

Edgar Ott relieved Bietz with runners on first and third and nobody out. Maury Hopkins walked to load the bases and Sarron grounded into a double play scoring

Brown with the third run of the inning. Martin then ended the rally with a ground out.

Rutgers came back to tie the score at 8-8 in the top of the fifth.

Anderson's single, a walk to Donovan and Henderson's single pushed across the first run, Donovan taking third base on the last hit. Stang's long fly ball to right scored Donovan. Ott followed with a base hit putting men on first and third and one man out.

FSU Coach Fred Hatfield decided to bring in sophomore right hander Jim Helms in from the bull pen and the Louisville, Ky., product came through.

Pascale hit a bouncer to the mound forcing Ott at second and scoring Henderson to knot the score. Surdez then singled, but Helm settled down and got Bob Dickman to pop tip to end the inning.

Helms went the rest of the way for the Seminoles, giving up two runs (one on a homer in the seventh by Henderson) on four hits to receive credit for the victory.

Florida State picked up three runs in the bottom of the fifth to go ahead again, then scored four in the sixth and three more in the seventh to wrap it up.

Singles by Helm and Sprague and a walk to Lyttle filled the bases for the Tribe and Brown socked a base hit to score two of the runners. Thomas singled and then he and Brown teammed on a double steal for the other run.

The sixth - inning rally was highlighted by a two - run single by Fernandez and a run - scoring double by Sprague. Martin cracked a solo homer in the seventh for FSU.

Egge was credited-with the loss, pitching just one and two - third innings and giving up three runs.

The Seminoles hit the road for the first time this season today when it journeys to Auburn for games with Wake Forest and Auburn. Florida State plays Auburn again Saturday before returning home Monday for two a day series with Spring Hill.
