

Big Warren Bogle put Florida State down on four hits Friday night at Centennial Field as Miami handed the Seminoles their second setback of the day 6-1.

North Carolina defeated the Tribe 6-4 Friday afternoon.

Bogle kept the Seminoles in check all the way, giving up the only run in the bottom of the ninth inning. The 6-4, 230-pound sophomore southpaw struck out 12 and walked five en route to his third victory against as many losses.

Marvin Stringfellow started for FSU and was the loser, working six innings. Jim Ward worked the seventh frame for the Tribe before Ken Sloan came on in the eighth to finish the game. The loss dropped the FSU record to 18-7.

Miami got all the runs it needed in the first inning, scoring a pair.

Tito Gomez opened the contest with a double to left cen-

ter and raced home when the next Hurricane batter, Dave Sonenberg, singled. Sonenberg took second when rightfielder Jim Lyttle bobbled the ball.

John Collins bounced one back to the mound and Sonenberg was out trying to reach third. Another bouncer back to Stringfellow on the mound moved Collins to second and Dan Stefkovich's single pushed the second Miami run across.

The visitors scored again in the fourth on a single by Rich Miller, a fielder's choice, and successive singles by Dick Pucci and Stan Yanowitz.

Miami got two more runs in the sixth with just one hit. After the leadoff batter struck out, Stefkovich drew a base on balls and Pucci followed with a single.

Yanowitz then hit a grounder to Pete Sarron at first base, but Sarron bobbled the ball and his throw to the plate was too late to get Stefkovich. Pucci took third on the play and scored when Rick-

Jones grounded out to the pitcher.

Just as Ward began his motion and threw to first trying to pick Miller off and the balk ruling was made, allowing Gomez to score.

Florida State got its four hits in bunches. In the fourth with two men out Mike Martin and Maury Hopkins collected back-to-back singles, but an infield ground out killed the rally.

The other two hits came in the ninth as the Seminoles averted the shutout. Roy Mewbourne opened the inning with an infield single — the first time Florida State had got a man on base with less than two outs since Gary Sprague drew a leadoff walk in the first.

The next batter fanned, but Gary Lawrence, batting for pitcher Sloan, hit a shot over the first baseman's head that rolled into the right field corner and Mewbourne scampered home from first. Law-

rence got thrown out at third trying to stretch it into a triple however, and the next batter grounded out to end the game.

North Carolina pitcher Buddy Cahoon limited the Seminoles to just five hits in the afternoon game as the Tar Heels rode a 15-hit attack of their own to a 6-4 win.

Chuck Hawkins the Tribe's starter was tagged with nine hits and five runs in 5 1-3 innings to absorb his first loss of the season.

North Carolina took advantage of an outfield error by the Seminoles to take a 1-0 lead in the second inning.

Center fielder Charile Carr opened the frame with a single and, after one out, third baseman Rod Thompson sliced another single to right. The ball slithered under Jim Lyttle and rolled to the fence, however, allowing Carr to score from first.

The Tar Heels added two more runs in the third on a home run by first baseman Danny Talbott. Bob Hume opened the inning with a double, but was thrown out on a fielder's choice. Talbott followed with his blow to right field and the Seminoles were down 3-0.

FSU came back with two runs in the third with the help of a Carolina error.

Tom Thomas was safe at first on Thompson's error at third. After two outs Lyttle beat out an infield roller for a single and Randy Brown walked to load the bases. Center fielder Mike Martin then singled to score Thomas and Lyttle.

The Seminoles added another run in the fourth inning on Thomas' fifth home run of the year, and went ahead on another tally in the fifth inning.

Gary Sprague opened the fifth with a single to right and

went to second on a wild pitch. An infield out sent the Seminole shortstop to third and another wild pitch allowed him to score.

The Tar Heels came back with two runs in the sixth on a double and four singles, to take the lead, and added another in the seventh on four singles for insurance. It was not needed, however, as Cahoon limited the Tribe to one hit through the last four innings.
