

Right fielder Jim Lyttle hit grand-slam home run in the eighth inning as Florida State came from behind to defeat Clemson 11-5 here yesterday.

The situation looked as dark as the overcast sky going into the eighth.

Clemson's hard-hitting Tigers

had jumped to a four-run lead in the second and had held the Seminoles at bay behind the pitching of Pete Myers, who seemed to

Lyttle baffle the powerful FSU lineup with slow curves.

However, "Hatfield's Herd" staged a late-inning stampede in typical fashion, and Lyttle's 12th home run of the season couldn't have found a more dramatic moment.

Mike Martin led off the inning with a pop-up to first baseman Ellis Dantzler, a fielding standout for the Tigers all afternoon. Bob Canty had pinch-hit for regular third baseman Gary Lawrence in the sixth and grounded into a double play, but the left-handed batting sophomore cracked a single through the hole between

third and short to start the rally.

Randy Brown, idle since he injured his back in infield practice before the Florida game Friday, came on to hit for starting catcher Ed Yarnell, and slashed a clean single to right, which moved Canty to third.

Marvin Stringfellow, the win-

ner in relief of starting pitcher Marty Brooks, followed with his second hit of the day, a single to right which scored Canty.

Charley Watson came in for Myers.

Shortstop Gary Sprague hit a slow bouncer to Clemson's Rusty Adkins at second. Adkins had trouble finding the handle on a difficult play, and Sprague legged it into first with a single to load the bases, setting the stage for Lyttle's blast.

Tom Thomas followed Lyttle, found the first pitch to his liking, and put it in the same place as Lyttle's for his seventh homer of the year.

Earl Cohen replaced Watson on the mound, but Pete Sarron greeted him with a single, and Dick Fernandez drew a walk. Martin flied to right for his second out of the inning, but with Canty up, Sarron stole third. He and Fernandez then pulled a double steal. Both scored when Clemson shortstop Jack McCall threw wild to the plate.

A throwing error by Lawrence gave Tiger left fielder Tommy Pack first base to open the second inning, and the Tigers went on to score four unearned runs. A walk to right fielder Gene Dunlap, singles by Keith Waters and Adkins, and a long double to left by McCall did the damage.

Florida State narrowed the lead in the third when Sprague led off with a walk. Lyttle and Thomas went down on grounders, but Sarron was hit by a pitch.

Fernandez doubled long to left center, driving in both runners, and Martin followed with a double to right scoring Fernandez.

Three singles in the fourth gave Clemson its fifth run.

Stringfellow as effective, giving up only three hits in his five innings stint. The junior left hander is now 6-4 for the year.

Florida State and Clemson were scheduled to play this afternoon and again tomorrow afternoon at 3 p.m.
