

Mike Martin drilled a single back through the box driving Randy Brown home from third with the winning run as Florida State edged a tough Clemson team, 4-3, here yesterday.

The victory was the eighth straight for the tournament-bound Seminoles, and brought their season's record to 36-10. Clemson is 19-7-2.

Sophomore left hander Wayne Vincent won his 11th decision against one defeat and broke a ten-year-old FSU strikeout record in the process. Vincent, who narrowly missed setting a record for strikeouts in a single season against Florida last Friday, came into today's game only two short of Tony Avitable's 112 total set in 1956.

The slender redhead from Birmingham closed out the first three innings with strikeouts to break the record, and ran up eight for the day, bringing his season's total to 118 in 110 innings pitched.

The Seminoles might have won by more, but outstanding

Martin and seventh innings to choke off FSU rallies. Dantzler's was a real gem as he stretched prone to snare Tom Thomas' line drive, then scrambled back to first bag to double off Brown.

Clemson also had its chances. The Tigers left the bases loaded after scoring two runs to tie the game in the seventh, and left a total of ten runners stranded during the game.

Gary Sprague was a hitting star for the Seminoles. The FSU shortstop poked his third home run of the year over

the right field fence to lead off the first inning, and collected two other hits in three trips to the plate.

Clemson pounced back in the second to tie the game on singles by Cowart, right fielder Tommy Pack and Dantzler. Pack attempted to score from second on Dantzler's hit, but Martin cut him off at the plate with a perfect throw.

FSU regained the lead in the third when Vincent and Sprague led off with back to back singles. Sprague's hit,

a blazer down the left field line, would have been good for two bases under ordinary circumstances, and the Seminole shortstop rounded first with every intention of taking second.

However, Vincent had been held at second, and as Sprague dashed back to first, shortstop Jack McCall's relay throw sailed over Dantzler's head and the Seminole runners advanced.

Vincent scored from third on an error by Clemson second baseman Rusty Adkins on Jim Little's hard hit grounder, then Sprague roared home when the throw in from right field went astray.

Two were out in the seventh when Clemson sandwiched a single by Adkins between walks to Keith Waters and McCall to load the bases. Vincent hit George Sutton to force in one run, and Cowart singled sharply to bring in another.

Vincent got Pack on a fly to right, the only time the Tiger right fielder failed to get a hit in four trips.

The two teams were scheduled to play again today at 3 p.m. in a game which concludes FSU's regular season.
