North Carolina dealt East Carolina a 7-1 setback in Thursday's second game.

Mississippi State played the spoiler's role Thursday with a 4-3 victory, a game which the Seminoles threatened to break open in almost every inning. However, the floodgates held and Coach Fred Hatfield left Sims - Legion Park muttering under his breath.
