, Wednesday afternoon the Seminoles ran up a quick lead against Springfield, and then hung on as the stubborn Maroons charged back with a three run outburst in the seventh inning.

The Tribe jumped on losing hurler Ken DeMond in the first inning for four runs.

Chuck Cone opened the attack with a single. He was cut down on an apparent double play; but Springfield first baseman Dave Bennett dropped the relay throw after he had batter Roy Mewbourne out by two steps.

The miscue was all the Seminoles needed.

Harry Greene followed Mewbourne with a single. Lance Hitchock then singled Mewbourne home with the first run, and Greene going to third. Marv Stringfellow forced Hitchcock, at second, but Greene scored with the second run. Back - to - back singles by Dick Gold, Ed Yarneli and Jeff Hogan produced the inning's final two tallies.

Springfield came back for single runs in the fourth and fifth off Tribe starter and winner Marty Brooks.

A pair of errors by Cone allowed the Maroons' first. score, and Brian Hammernick's double followed by Chuck Lelas' triple produced the fifth-inning tally.

The Seminoles struck for two runs in the bottom of the fifth, however, and were again

aided by Springfield errors. Cone opened the inning with a bunt single, and the fleet leadoff in an went all the way to third when Maroon thirdbaseman Dick Wojtukiewicz's hurried throw went into right field.

Hitchcock, who went three-forthree against Tech and had five hits in seven trips for the day, unloaded the first of two triples to deep leftcenter.

Stringfellow then lofted a fly to deep center scoring Hitchcock with the Tribe's go ahead run.

Two more FSU runs came across in the fifth, when Dean Duchak walked, Hitchcock again tripled to leftcenter, and Stringfellow singled. A walk to Duchak, a ground rule double by Hitchcock and a sacrifice squeeze bunt by Dick Gold scored a run in the seventh off reliefer Charles Farson.

Florida State's final marker came in the eighth, on a walk to Darryl Stewart, who saw his first catching duty of the year, a sacrifice by Reibling, and a single by Easom.

Reibling went the distance for the Seminoles, striking out nine while walking four. He became the fourth Tribe hurtler to pitch a complete game in the tournament:
