

Florida State took another giant step toward the NCAA District Three Tournament Saturday night as the Seminoles rode John Grubb's three-run home run to a 6-2 win over Miami.

The win gave the Seminoles a sweep of this weekend's two-game series and four of four over the Hurricanes this season.

The Tribe, ranked first in the country pushed its record to 37-3-1 and should be in the driver's seat for the coveted bid for the Gastonia, N.C.-based tournament.

Gene Amman picked up his 10th win of the season and the junior righthander has yet to taste defeat.

The victory was the 26th of the Decatur, Ga. native's career, setting a new Seminole record. The old mark of 25 was held by Wayne Vincent.

Ammann got off to a rocky start as the Hurricanes tagged him for unearned runs in the first and third innings putting the Tribe behind.

An error by third baseman Ron Cash, his fourth in two games, a single by Ed Young and Ed Garvey's pop fly double gave the Hurricanes a one run lead in the first.

The Tribe tied it on a walk, a single by Larry Cocks and an infield out in the second, only to see the Hurricanes go back in front.

Young singled to open the third, stole second and with two outs scored on Chuck Helmsteter's single, when catcher Harry Saferight dropped Grubb's throw to the plate.

The Seminoles got untracked with two-outs in the third as a

walk to Dick Nichols and a single by Greg Schnute put the two men on.

Grubb followed with his third homer of the season, a line shot over the right-centerfield fence.

Cash followed Grubb's blast with a walk. Cocks lined a hit into left-center that bounded over the leftfielder's head and rolled to the fence. Cash scored and Cocks came home with an apparent inside-the-park home run.

Miami detected the Tribe outfielder missed thirdbase, however, and on an appeal play, Cocks was ruled out.

Florida State added its final run in the fifth when Dick Nichols stole home on the front end of a successful double steal.

Ammann, meanwhile, settled

down and allowed only one baserunner in the next four innings.

He gave way to Mac Scarce in the eighth, who finished up for the Tribe.

The loss left Miami with a 27-14-1 record with only Monday's doubleheader against Florida A&M here remaining.

The Seminoles will be idle until next weekend, when they take to the road on a four game trip.

The Tribe meets Georgia Southern for two games Friday and Saturday in Statesboro, Ga., then journeys to Auburn for a pair of games May 18-19 against the Tigers.

The final FSU home appearance will be in two weeks, May 22-23, in a big three game series against Florida. The regular season concludes the following week in Gainesville.
