TALLAHASSEE--When Florida State Coach Jack Stallings puts out the call for his Seminole baseball team next fall, he will be pleased in the knowledge that four of his top five pitchers will be returning.

Three of the four, Marty Rice, Bill Fuller and Barry McQueen formed the heart of Seminoles' pitching rotation for the last half of the season.

The only loss from the top group will be Mac Scarce, who Stallings calls "the best relief pitcher in college baseball."

Replacing him will be no easy task. In 29 appearances this season "Mac the Knife" had a 3-1 record and recorded 18 saves. In 36 innings he struckout 60 (an average of 15 for each nine innings) and had a 1.00 ERA.

With the young starters all due to return, however, it may not be necessary for Stallings to look toward the bullpen quite as much as he did this year (there were just nine complete games in 57 starts).

Fuller (9-2) and Rice (11-3) were the workhorses for the Seminoles.

A lefty from Great Neck, N.Y., Fuller led the club in starts (15), innings (107) and strikeouts (111). A fine control pitcher he was almost always around the plate. Although he gave up 101 hits, he walked just 22, fewer than two per game. He had a 2.26 ERA.

Rice was just a freshman, but came along fast enough to become the Seminoles biggest winner. A righthander from Tallahassee, he finished the season with a 2.43 earned average.

His statistics were not particularly impressive, giving up 56 hits and walking 50, while striking out just 57, but he had the ability to go out and win. And as Stallings put it, "that is the name of the game."

McQueen (3-3), Price (2-0) and Dave Fernald (5-2) were just behind the top two in development.

"It took a little while for the youngsters to get settled down," said Stallings, "but by the last third of the season, we had one of the better pitching staffs in the country. It was certainly a tournament caliber staff."

As a squad, the Seminole hurlers finished the season with a 2.76 ERA. In 490 innings there were 424 strikeouts and 242 walks. Although just three pitchers were able to complete a shutout, the staff registered 10 whitewashes.

TALLAHASSEE--Florida State senior third baseman-outfielder, Ron Cash has won the Woody Woodward trophy as the Seminoles' leading hitter for 1971.

The former Manatee Junior College star from Decatur, Ga., captured the title with a .325 average. He also led the team in three other categories, runs scored (43), doubles (10) and triples (six).

Cash was named to the District III All-Star team as an outfielder this season. It was his second selection, having made the squad at third base last year. The 22-year old line-drive hitter, who ranks high on the pro scouts draft list, moved to the outfield mid-way through the year, with a pulled muscle in his shoulder.

Following Cash in the batting race was infielder Herb Sikes at .327. A hometown product from Tallahassee Leon, Sikes started the season at first base, but switched to third when Cash got hurt. A junior, he led the team in RBI with 44 and was tied for the home run leadership with Harry Saferight at eight.

Outfielder Ken Doria, who played in all but one of the Seminole's 57 games was next at .301. He led the team in at-bats (196) and hits (59). His 40 RBI put him third in that category.

Saferight and Doug Kasimier round out the top five hitters, each with a .300 average.

A senior catcher, who also came to Florida State from Manatee JC, Saferight cracked nine doubles, three triples and eight homers to lead the Seminoles in total bases with 97. His 43 RBI was just one shy of Sikes' 44.

Greg Gromek, who like Cash moved from the infield (shortstop) to the outfield at midseason, wound up at .292. Other regulars finished the year as follows: Dave Nichols, .270, David Grimes .264, and Larry Cocks, .221.

Gary Huff, who missed a good part of the season while attending spring football practice, finished the season with the highest over all average (.372), but his 43 at-bats failed (by seven) to qualify him for the batting race.

As a team the Seminoles finished the year with a .282 average.

Kasimier, was the Seminoles' best fielding infielder. The rangy first baseman was charged with just five errors in 281 chances for a .982 average.

Doria led the outfield with a perfect fielding performance on 72 chances.

The team fielding average was .957.

The following is a description of the events leading to Florida State's protest of the second game of a doubleheader against the University of ^{South} Alabama on Sunday May 9, at Mobile. In the seventh and final inning of the game, with South Alabama leading 3-1, FSU had a walk and a single to start the inning. At that point Coach Eddie Stanky went to the mound to talk to his pitcher. Following a sacrifice bunt and a sacrifice fly, which left the score 3-2, with the tying run at second and two out, Coach Stanky again visited the mound. He did not remove his pitcher. Coach Jack Stallings questioned the plate umpire, Mr. Stroecker, who

in turn conferred with the field umpire, Mr. Duffy, and Coach Stanky. He then reported to Coach Stallings that they were not aware of the two visit rule and it had not been enforced all year. After making sure there was no misunderstanding as to the rule being challenged, Coach Stallings then protested the game. The umpire notified the official scorer and the game continued, Florida State was unable to score and the game ended 3-2.

Following the game it was claimed that Coach Stanky was not instructing his pitcher but rather his infielders. However, this conference did take place on the mound and the pitcher was involved.

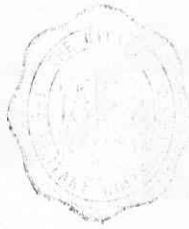

Dear Coaches Stanky and Stallings:

If enclosure 1 presents the facts as they existed on May 9, at Mobile in the seventh inning between Florida State and South Alabama, then it is quite apparent what the proper ruling is.

My reference is the 1971 Official Collegiate Baseball Guide, Rule 7, Section 4 (Page R22). It clearly states "If a coach or his non-playing representative goes to the mound a second time in the inning to talk to the same pitcher, the pitcher must be removed permanently from his position, except in the case of obvious injury."

With both participating schools bonafide members of the NCAA and the contest in question an officially sanctioned game between these schools, it is mandatory that the game be played according to official NCAA baseball rules. Therefore, if enclosure 1 is a true resume, then the protest filed by Coach Jack Stallings, Florida State, is upheld and the game, if replayed, should commence from the exact point of protest with another pitcher taking the mound for South Alabama. If the game is not to be replayed, then it should be declared as no contest and every and all game records of this contest be declared null and void.

In future controversies, it would be most beneficial to have the host institution and/or umpires write up the conditions of a protest appeal.

Because of the lack of coverage that college baseball generally receives from the news media we are taking this opportunity to give you our candidates for the District III All-Star Team. We hope you will give them every consideration when filling out your All-Star ballot, if you have not already done so. If you have anyone on your club you think is worthy of consideration for the team, please let us know. Thanks.

THIRD BASEMAN RON CASH --Senior, Decatur, Georgia, Bats Right, Throws Right, 6-0, 175. A two year starter, Ron was a first team All-District Selection last season, his first with the Seminoles after two fine years at Manatee Junior College. Has had an outstanding season for the Seminoles this year. Is currently hitting .360 with 150 at-bats. Has nine doubles, five triples and three home runs. Does an outstanding job at third. Scouts are very high on this youngster. Last year they selected him to the Sporting News All-America squad. He led the Basin League in averages (.385) and RBI last summer, following a .335 season with FSU.

PITCHER MAC SCARCE --Senior, Richmond, Virginia, Throws Left, Bats Left, 6-3, 175. Anyone who has seen Mac pitch knows why he is being nominated. This tall, lanky, lefty is perhaps the best pitcher to ever pitch for Florida State. His only handicap is that he is not a starter. Arm trouble a couple of years ago forced him into short inning work, but was it ever effective! Stronger now, he has become much too valuable as a reliever. The scouts have no doubt that he could be pitching Triple A ball right now, and more than likely be able to stick with several big league clubs. In 28 2/3 innings he has 47 strikeouts--that's 15.6 every nine innings. Last season he set an FSU record with 12 saves. He broke that already this season, getting his 13th against South Alabama last weekend. In addition he has chalked up a 3-1 record with an ERA of 0.63. I know it's tough to justify a reliever for All-Star nomination, but Coach Stallings says that other than Texas' Burt Hooton, he has not seen a better college pitcher in the last two years.

CATCHER HARRY SAFERIGHT --We'll be honest. It is tough not to vote for South Alabama's Glenn Borgmann as the District III catcher, but take into consideration this quote from the scouts at the Florida State-South Alabama games in Mobile, and you know why we are nominating Saferight; "You could not find two better catchers in a single college game in the country than the two (Borgmann and Saferight) that are here today." I do not think we need say much more. Both of these young men can do it all--they both deserve a spot.

PITCHER MARTY RICE --A freshman who is making big strides. One of the leaders of the Seminoles fine young mound corps, he is currently 8-3 for the season. Has a good strong arm and good assortment of pitches. He will get better, but already is at All-Star level.
