# Tribe sweeps two from USF

Florida State tuned up for tonight's game with rival Florida by sweeping a doubleheader from South Florida Sunday afternoon at Seminole Field.

Lefthander Jackie Smith fashioned a two-hitter as the Seminoles won the opener 4-0 to snap the Golden Brahmans' 15-game winning streak. Then in the second game Brooks Carey and Larry Jones teamed for a six-hitter as Florida State won 6-1.

Tonight at 7:30 FSU meets the Gators for the first time this season. Florida comes in with a 15-14 record, while the Seminoles now stand at 27-7.

Bob Mayer who has thrown a complete game in each of his last two outings, will take a 4-0 record to the mound for the Seminoles.

Florida State wasted little time disposing of South Florida. The Brahmans came in with a 28-4 record, but left Seminole Field just over three hours later with a 28-6 mark. USF ace Chris Welsh, who was 9-0 going in, suffered his first loss of the season in the first game, as did Jeff Walters (6-0 going in) in the second contest.

South Florida coach Jack Butterfield wasn't even around as long as his team. He provided the most excitement of the afternoon in the third inning of the second contest when USF's Scott Taylor bounced a line drive over the centerfield fence.

When base umpire Tommy Rosa made no signal, plate umpire Al Davis ruled it a ground-rule double. That brought Butterfield and half the Brahman team out of the dugout, and after protesting for about five minutes he was finally thrown out of the game, much to the delight of the partisan fans.

Taylor eventually scored from second, but FSU came right back to score two runs in the bottom of the inning to go on top 2-1. Carey, now 4-2, then settled down and retired eight of the next nine batters he faced before giving way to Jones in the sixth. JONES, MAKING just his second appearance in almost a month, seemed more vulnerable than he had in his first outing Saturday night. The 6-foot-2 junior was injured earlier in the season, and was expected to be lost for the remainder of the year. But he came on and worked the final two innings of that game, striking out four and allowing just one hit.

Sunday, however, the big righthander was touched for a pair of hits, and suffered obvious control problems.
