

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FSU 'gets happy' with a 23-5 waltz

With less than formidable opponents now regularly appearing on the Florida State baseball schedule, Coach Mike Martin calls this the "get-happy" part of the season. Sunday, the Seminoles were ecstat-

ic. Had there been aisles to roll in, the players would still be spinning.

FSU beat Brooklyn College 23-5 at Seminole Field, pounding out 20 hits and winning their fifth straight since losing to big boy Florida 21-6 a week ago. In addition to Sunday's win over Brooklyn, the Seminoles won doubleheaders this week from NAIA member Wingate College and Missouri-Rolla, an NCAA Division II team.

The series, "Giants of College Baseball," continues tonight at 7:30 when the Seminoles, 13-3, play host to

Northern Kentucky.

FSU and Brooklyn provided such gripping tension and drama that the highlights occurred when a dog twice ventured onto the field and the fire department arrived to extinguish a tiny blaze that broke out in some bushes behind the bleachers.

"Our bats were so hot, they called the fire engines," Martin cracked, smiling at the ease with which his Seminoles disposed of the NCAA Div-

ision III Kingsmen.

Brooklyn was opening its season. The Kingsmen practice on a football field, when the weather lets them. Brooklyn Coach Mike Hipscher said his team has managed to get outside about four days and therefore knew what was coming.

"I don't feel too bad considering this was our opening game," Hipscher said in a New Yawk accent thick enough to spread on rye bread. "It's about what I expected. I really did. I

think by the end of the week, we'll be playing a different game."

The Seminoles showed the Kingsmen a different game. Don DeLoach hit two doubles and a triple, drove in six runs and tied a school record with seven at-bats. Craig Ramsey had a pair of doubles among his three hits, and drove in three runs. Mike Cullen didn't enter the game until the seventh, but still found the time for a double, home run and four runs bat-

The Seminoles set a team record with eight doubles. They are hitting

346 overall and averaging just fewer than 10 runs per game.

FSU quickly established control in the first inning with four runs off Kingsmen starter Mike Kolodney.

After a lead-off walk to Lionel Martinez, the first of four for the sec-ond baseman, DeLoach's pop fly was caught by the gusts but not by the Kingsmen. It fell for a double be-tween shortstop Henry Tapia and leftfielder John DeRosa

After Jim Weaver fanned, Jeff Ledbetter's sacrifice fly, which should have been the third out, scored Martinez. Then Mike Yastrzemski hit a real double for two more runs and Ramsey singled in another tally

That was all the cushion Dick Wiggins would need. The senior right-

hander, who committed two errors, muddled through six innings. He allowed four runs on seven hits, but got his third victory of the year against two defeats.

Kolodney, despite missing all of last season after undergoing elbow surgery, is a hard-throwing profes-sional prospect. He was held to three innings work and shut the Seminoles down after the first. Some scouts in the stands departed after Kolodney

So did all semblance of a game. Brooklyn pitchers Walter Paller and John Papagnia were battered by 15 hits and 19 runs over the final five innings. Only 13 of the runs were earned, however. Pete Shea, moving from rightfield to shortstop in the

fifth, committed four errors for the Kingsmen.
