

# FSU bats pound Monmouth for a school-record 27 runs

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Maybe Terry Glasgow, the coach of the Monmouth (Ill.) College baseball team, now will take scouting reports on the opposition with a grain of salt — or maybe a salt mine.

"We had heard that Florida State wasn't as good as they have been," Glasgow said after his team played the Seminoles.

Perhaps FSU doesn't measure up to powerhouses of years past, but don't tell that to Glasgow. Rolling up a school-record run total, Florida State pulverized the NCAA Division III team 27-2 Wednesday night at Seminole Field.

"I'll tell you what," Glasgow said. "There were only five people who felt worse than I did. That was our pitchers."

It was the second time in a week that FSU had fattened up on a lesser opponent. Sunday, the Seminoles ripped Division III Brooklyn College 23-5.

Florida State, winner of eight straight, is 15-3. The

Seminoles next play at home Friday in a doubleheader starting at 3 against another biggie, Otterbein (Ohio) College.

The game was settled quickly as the Seminoles scored six runs in the first inning off Scouts' loser Bob Marlovits. Jim Weaver struck the big blow, a bases-loaded double.

From then on it was fun time at the old ballpark for FSU. Every non-pitcher on the roster played as the Seminoles swatted 20 hits, and the Scouts made five errors.

"We just went out and jumped on 'em in a hurry and the ballgame was over in the first inning," FSU Coach Mike Martin said.

Junior lefthander Ed Schneider made his record 3-0 by working the first five innings, allowing no runs and four hits. Keith Parenteau and John Gagnon finished the pitching duties for the Seminoles.

The game got totally out of hand when the Seminoles added to a 10-0 lead, scoring four runs in the sixth inning and 11 in the seventh. Dick Wiggins, more frequently a pitcher, hit his second homer of the season, a 400-foot.

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two-run job in the seventh.

Mike Cullen entered the game in the fifth and hit a single, double and triple and drove in five runs. Ken Huff, who came in at the same time, had two hits, reached base a total of four times and scored four runs.

In addition, Eddie Howser, another who debuted in the fifth, drove in three runs. Shortstop Don DeLoach was the only player to go the distance. He had three hits and drew the praise of Glasgow.

"Their shortstop was super," said Glasgow, in his eighth season as coach at the school, which has an enrollment of 650. "I don't recall seeing as quick or an aggressive a shortstop. He was trying to pick people off at second base when he was ahead 25-2."

Glasgow said the Seminoles certainly are as powerful as any club his Scouts will play — they meet a few Big 10 teams — and he will try to find some good in the lopsided defeat.

"By and large, we're not gonna fold up our tents over this thing," he said. "We're gonna make something positive of it."

Glasgow said four of his five pitchers were freshmen, and that his two best pitchers already had been used in two games in Panama City.

"We're not a good enough club that we can come in without our top two pitchers and be ready to play Florida State," he said.
