Season in Review

"If you would have told me back in February this team would have 48 wins in May I would have bet you anything, including my house against it."

The speaker was Florida State head baseball coach Mike Martin. No, it wasn't that Mike didn't have confidence in his team back in February, but he knew this was supposed to be a rebuilding year for the Seminoles.

After all, he was expecting to start a lineup that would contain five new faces from last year's club that finished with a 43-17-1 record and advanced to the NCAA East Regional playoffs. And, Martin was in his first season as head coach, taking over in late October when Dick Howser was summoned to manage the New York Yankees.

Now, look what has happened.

- (1) The Seminoles begin NCAA South Regional Tournament play with 48 victories, one shy of the school record for a single season. The mark of 49 was set by the 1975 club that went 49-10 and advanced to the College World Series.
- (2) FSU won its first Metro Conference baseball championship since 1977. After losing its first game to Virginia Tech, the Tribe battled back to win five straight while playing six games in 54 hours.
- (3) The current Seminoles have already set team records for runs scored, hits, doubles, home runs, total bases and base on balls in a single season.
- (4) This club put together a 20-game winning streak, the second longest in school history. It also finished the regular season with a 29-8 mark against Division I competition.

Indeed, it has been a most interesting campaign for the 48-10 Tribe.

"It has been a very satisfying season because the team has displayed great unity," says Martin. "Each player has a heavy dependency on the other. We expect a lot from everyone involved in our program—starting with the coaching staff and going to the equipment manager. The players adapted to their roles better than any club I've ever been associated with."

The individual player roles were many and varied.

Junior college transfer Lionel Martinez has been steady at second base in his first season wearing garnet and gold togs. In addition to batting at a .360 clip and fielding .960 he has walked a school record 70 times.

"Lionel was our leadoff batter and we wanted him to get on base no matter which way he could get there," Martin said. "He was on base 141 times during the season and it allowed our power hitters more opportunity to pick up important RBIs."

Three players—Mike Fuentes, Jeff Ledbetter and Jim Weaver—provided the power. Fuentes contributed 20 home runs, one shy of the school single season record. Six of those round trippers came during the Metro Tournament when he hit a .379 for six games. That performance made him the MVP of the baseball tournament, and helped win honors as the Outstanding Athlete of the Metro Spring Sports Carnival.

Ledbetter began the season as the designated hitter, but has now switched to first base where he has been a starter since mid-season. He blasted 18 home runs during the regular season while Weaver hit 17 even though he missed 12 games.

The role of Don DeLoach, who slugged 10 round trippers last season, has changed. Now his home run production is down to three, but he has cracked 27 doubles, just four shy of setting a new NCAA Division I record.

Third baseman Rick Figueredo, a power hitter in high school, has become known for his timely singles and enters the tournament with a sparkling .347 batting average.

The pitching staff has been steady, too. Ed Schneider (8-3, 2.91), Ken Fischer (9-1, 2.61) and Dick Wiggins (8-3, 3.81) have been the mainstays of the starting staff. Rick Hatcher (9-2, 2.53) began the campaign in the bullpen, but is now a starter and Ken Smith (4-0, 5.18) is the main stopper.

Indeed, it has been a team effort that has moved the Seminoles into their third playoff appearance in the last four seasons. It makes Martin smile even more when he realizes that many times during the regional tournament he will be fielding a starting lineup that won't contain a senior.

MIKE MARTIN Florida State Head Coach

Although he was just named head coach on November 27, 1979, Mike Martin has been a part of the Florida State baseball program for a much longer time.

Martin first arrived on the Tallahassee campus in 1965 as an outfielder. He played that year and also in 1966 and had such a fine playing career that he was twice named to the All-District team.

Following his collegiate career, the Charlotte, N. C., native had a three-year professional stint with the New York Mets and Detroit Tigers organizations before returning to the Tallahassee area to teach and coach.

After several years of coaching high school basketball and baseball, Martin joined the Seminole staff in 1975 as an assistant to Woody Woodward. When Woodward left and Dick Howser took over for the 1979 campaign, Howser's first duty was to appoint Martin as his assistant.

And, when Howser took the New York Yankee post last fall, there was no doubt about his successor-Martin.

"This is one of the top five collegiate baseball coaching positions in the country," said Martin at the time of his selection. "I look forward to accepting the challenge of continuing the great baseball tradition that has been established at Florida State."

His first Seminole team now sports a 48-10 record as it begins NCAA South Regional play. One more victory and the Tribe will equal the record for most wins in a single season. Ironically, two previous FSU teams have compiled 49 wins. One of those clubs was the 1975 team--the first that Martin was associated with as a coach at FSU.

Martin is a 1966 graduate of Florida State. He earned his master's degree in 1971 from Florida A & M. He and his wife Carol have three child-ren-Mary Beth, 10, Mike, Jr., seven, and Melanie, four.



TOURNAMENT HISTORY

1980 marks the 27th year for college baseball district or regional playoffs in the southeast. From 1947-1953, the College World Series' format did not include playoffs. District Three playoffs were held from 1954-1974. In 1975, the NCAA adopted the present Region playoff system which allocated two regional sites to the southeast. The District Three tournaments were played at Gastonia, N. C. from 1956-1972. Starkville, Miss. was awarded a three year bid for the tournament beginning in 1973. Current NCAA guidelines call for the tournaments to be played at a host site. This will be the fifth year for the South Region under those guidelines.
