PLAY - BY - PLAY

FIRST INNING

Oklahoma State: Espinal goes down swinging. Fariss homers over the right center field wall off the Marlboro sign (RBI). Ventura doubles into left center field after the wind held up the ball. Ifland reaches first on the third baseman's fielding error as he can't get the ball out of his glove, Ventura stays at second. (E-5). Barragan walks, loading the bases. Wilkinson walks on a full count forcing in Ventura from third (RBI), reloading the bases. Ed Porcelli replaces Pollack on the mound. Diaz grounds into 6-4 fielders choice as Wilkinson is forced at second scoring Ifland and Barragan (RBI). Diaz advances to second on the second baseman's over throw at first (E-4). Blackmon grounds out 4-3. Four runs, two hits, two errors, one left. (only one run is earned)

Florida State: Marzan grounds out 4-3. Sorrento goes down swinging. Alica bounces out 3-1. No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

FLORIDA STATE: 0

SECOND INNING

Oklahoma State: Kosco walks to lead off the inning. Espinal pops out to the second baseman behind second in shallow center as the wind held the ball up. Fariss pops out to the second baseman in right field. Kosco steals second. Ventura singles up the middle scoring Kosco from second (RBI). Ifland goes down swinging. One run, one hit, no errors, one left.

Florida State: Figueroa grounds out to the shortstop who throws him out from deep in the hole. Mangham bounces out 5-3. Taddeo grounds out 4-3. No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

FLORIDA STATE: 0

THIRD INNING

Oklahoma State: Barragan grounds out 3-unassisted. Wilkinson is called out on strikes. Diaz lines out to short. No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Florida State: Fulton lines a double down the right field line into the corner. Blackwell drops a single into shallow right field advancing Fulton to third. Clayborne grounds back to the pitcher, 1-3, advancing Blackwell to second. Fulton holds at third. Marzan chops one to first who steps on the bag, Fulton comes home and Blackwell advances to third (RBI). Sorrento singles into right field scoring Blackwell from third (RBI). Alicea grounds out 4-3.

Two runs, three hits, no errors, one left.

FLORIDA STATE: 2

FOURTH INNING

Oklahoma State: Blackmon grounds back to the pitcher, 1-3. Kosco grounds out 4-3. Espinal grounds out 5-3.
No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Florida State: Figueroa flies out to the left fielder in left as the wind holds the ball up. Mangham walks. Mangham steals second. Taddeo singles into left center field scoring Mangham from second (RBI) and takes second on the throw home. Fulton singles into center scoring Taddeo from second (RBI). Blackwell grounds out 5-3 and Fulton advances to second who was running on the pitch. Clayborne grounds out 4-3.
Two runs, two hits, no errors, one left.

FLORIDA STATE: 4

FIFTH INNING

Oklahoma State: Fariss draws a walk. Ventura walks, advancing Fariss to second. Richie Lewis replaces Porcelli on the mound. Ifland walks on a full count, loading the bases. Barragan flies out to the center fielder in center, runners hold. Bobby McKercher pinch hits for Wilkinson. McKercher is caught looking. Adam Smith pinch for Diaz. Smith grounds out 4-3.
No runs, no hits, no errors, three left.

Florida State: McKercher goes into play left, Blackmon moves to center and Smith stays in at catch. Marzan goes down swinging. Sorrento doubles into left center. Sorrento advances to third on a passed ball. Alicea hits a sacrifice fly to the center fielder in right center scoring Sorrento from third (RBI). Figueroa grounds out 4-3.
One run, one hit, no errors, none left. (the run is unearned).

SIXTH INNING

Oklahoma State: Blackmon goes down swinging. Kosco is caught looking. Espinal pops out to the second baseman in shallow right field.
No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Florida State: Mangham grounds out 6-3. Taddeo walks. Taddeo steals second. Mike Gardella replaces Bronkey on the mound. Fulton flies out to the center fielder in right center on the warning track, Taddeo stays at second. Steve Lienhard replaces Gardella on the mound. Blackwell strikes out 2-3.
No runs, no hits, no errors, one left.

SEVENTH INNING

Oklahoma State: Fariss doubles into the corner in right. Ventura walks on a full count. Ifland grounds into a 4-6-3 double play, advancing Fariss to third. Barragan goes down swinging.

Florida State: Clayborne grounds back to the pitcher 1-3. Marzan walks. Marzan is caught stealing 2-6. Sorrento is caught looking.
No runs, no hits, no errors, one left

EIGHTH INNING

Oklahoma State: McKercher grounds out 4-3. Smith flies out to Sorrento in right center who makes a nice diving catch. Blackmon goes down swinging.
No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Florida State: Mark Malizia replaces McKercher in left. Alicea singles into right center. Figueroa singles into right field and Alicea advances to third on the hit and run. Mangham hits a sacrifice fly to center field scoring Alicea from third, Figueroa stays at first (RBI). Gordie Dillard replaces Lienhard on the mound. Craig Saxner pinch hits for Taddeo. Saxner goes down swinging. Fulton goes down swinging.
One run, two hits, no errors, one left.

COLLEGE WORLD SERIES NOTES FOR SATURDAY, JUNE 7

WILL THERE BE A CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SUNDAY?

That depends on Arizona. If the Wildcats defeat Miami tonight, it means tomorrow could be the title game if Arizona wins again. Otherwise, the same two teams (Arizona and the winner of Oklahoma State-Florida State) will meet again Monday to decide the championship.

If Arizona loses to Miami tonight, it means tomorrow cannot be the title game and assures a Game 15 on Monday. Sunday's game would match today's winners (Miami and either OSU or FSU) with the survivor playing Arizona for the championship on Monday. By winning Game 11, Arizona receives the bye to Game 15.

WHO FINISHES THIRD?

That also depends upon tonight's two games. If the remaining undefeated team (Arizona) beats Miami, then Miami and the OSU-FSU loser will tie for third.

If Arizona loses to Miami, then the OSU-FSU loser tonight will finish fourth in the championship and the loser of Game 14 on Sunday will finish third.

HOW TOUGH IS IT TO GO UNDEFEATED IN THE CWS?

In the 36 years under the current eight-team double-elimination format, only eight teams have gone undefeated, with Southern Cal the winner four of those times. The others are Oklahoma (1951), California (1957), Miami (1982) and Texas (1983). USC did it in 1961, 1968, 1973 and 1978. Both California (1947) and Texas (1949) went without a loss under a different format.

SCORING, BATTING ON THE RISE

CWS statistical trends have risen a bit over the past few games. Through 11 games, the series is producing 10.2 runs per game (both teams combined) and the teams are hitting a combined .273. Although higher than earlier this week, the runs per game total is the second lowest in the past eight years. Only the 1983 average of 9.1 has been lower since 1978.

Average game time stands at 2:57, lower than the past two CWS, but still fourth highest since 1967.

Attendance through seven sessions is now 86,680, compared with 90,101 for the record year in 1985.

ESPN RATINGS REMAIN STEADY

ESPN has released the ratings for Games 7-10. Game 7 -- 2.0; Game 8 -- 1.7; Game 9 -- 1.1; and Game 10 -- 1.7. The overall rating for the first 10 games is 1.5, or 1.6 without Game 2's 0.5 (the only taped game). Each rating point equals 369,000 households. According to ESPN, ratings for the remainder of the CWS will not be available until Tuesday, June 10.

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY, PHIL STEPHENSON

If you were in Omaha four years ago today, you will remember Phil Stephenson. It was on June 7, 1982, that Stephenson and his Wichita State teammates took on Miami in a second round game. And it was in that game that Miami pulled its now famous fake throw to first base, complete with scattering bullpen and pointing teammates in the Hurricane dugout. Stephenson, the victim, was easily tagged out at second when the pitcher, who had the ball all along, tossed it to second. What will Miami do for an

Oklahoma State coach Gary Ward:

"Wasn't Richie Lewis something? He had an outstanding performance. I have a similar feeling to the Miami game where we had a chance to break the game open with the defense lapse. Porcelli then comes in and stabilizes it until they can get to Lewis, who came on and threw big league stuff.

"I had the feeling that if they got back into it, we'd come with McKercher and Smith which gives us seven consecutive left-hand hitters in the lineup. Lewis showed a big league arm, give him a lot of credit. I'm not sure he gave us a pitch that we could handle.

"Barragan went 2-2 in the count with the bases loaded and hit a slider to centerfield, but the wind held it up. We didn't want to gamble then and get someone thrown out at the plate and take ourself out of the inning.

"Bobby McKercher and Adam Smith are both fastball hitters, and he just threw it by them. So, we give Florida State a lot of credit.

"Have you noticed that it's unsafe as hell to get a lead here. I'm proud of my ballclub, and it's hard to describe. The College World Series is like a bowl game in football. You're tremendously proud of all you've done to get here. And when you win, it's a tremendous feeling. When you lose it's heartbreak. It takes until the 4th of July to get over it. At least that's how long it's taken in the past, and I hope it's gone that soon this year.

Quotes from FSU coach Mike Martin --

"The key was that when we got down five runs we just didn't quite. I guess everybody's talking about it but it seems like when you get down by a bunch of runs in this series that seems to get you going.

We just beat a good ballclub. It doesn't surprise me the way Richie Lewis pitched. The little guy just went out there and pitched his game. He's one of the few pitchers in the college game that can dominate a game like he did.

We will treat tomorrow night's game just the way we did tonight. We will start Doug Little and try to go far enough to get to Richie. He can pitch as many innings as Florida State needs him to pitch.

There were some big offensive keys today. Give Eric Mangham credit. He faught that guy and faught that guy and got a big sacrifice fly. The mood in our dugout was very professional. We knew what we had to do offensively.

RICHIE LEWIS -- "I've been there before. I guess getting out of a jam with the bases loaded is just exciting to me. I came in there looking for a strikeout and got a popup. The next gut I was looking for a double play and got a strikeout. Then the third guy hit the ball hard but right at somebody. That's baseball.
