## Miami puts the Seminoles away 7-3

CORAL GABLES - Florida State is still waiting to kick its final stretch into

The Seminoles dropped a 7-3 decision to top-ranked Miami Friday night before 6,482 at Mark Light Stadium. Playing much as it had two days earli-er against Florida International, FSU suf-

fered from poor defense and missed scor-

ing opportunities.

The Seminoles, 40-12 with eight regular-season games remaining, committed

four errors, including two during a two-run Miami first inning. Meanwhile, the visitors did little with the meager scoring chances given them by starting pitcher Oscar Munoz.

FSU, ranked No. 6 by Collegiate Base-ball-ESPN and No. 9 by Baseball America,

lost its second straight game.

Miami improved to 46-6 on the year.

The two teams continue their threegame series tonight at 7:30.

"We'll just have to bounce back," said

FSU coach Mike Martin, who was forced to coach third base for the first time in five years because assistant coach Chip Baker

had the flu. Martin held up Allen Bevis on a crucial play in the sixth, forcing Bevis into a rundown.

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"There's nothing wrong with this ball club," Martin continued. "I'm not the least bit down, or discouraged. There's a lot of baseball left."

But for FSU to be successful during

these final games, something must change.
The Seminoles have committed seven errors over the past two games, and Friedrich and the second proday they stranded runners in scoring position in the sixth, seventh and eighth in-nings. They did score two runs during an eighth-inning rally, before reliever Todd Bush struck out Chris Brock with two outs. That gave Bush his ninth save, preserv-a win for Munoz (14-0), who leads Divi-

sion I in victories. FSU starter Gar Finnvold (11-3) was

hurt more by FSU's defense than by his own pitching. Finnvold, who played for Palm Beach Junior College, allowed a sea-son-high six walks and eight hits in his 6plus innings.

It was Finnvold's first loss since a 9-1

loss to Arizona State on March 31.

"You don't like to see those errors. I guess it's something we've just got to work on," said Finnvold, who is winless in two

starts here. "Sure, I'd like to be 2-0 (here), but it's not somethi ng I'm going to lose any

sleep over."
FSU is now 1-5 against teams ranked in
the Top 10, while Miami is 7-1.

"To be honest, that (record) doesn't mean a thing," Martin said, "because we've got a chance to come back and win (today)."

Trouble started early for Finnvold and EXIL grouting the "International Control of the Control

FSU, spotting the Hurricanes two runs in an ugly first inning. Orlando Palmeiro led off with a single followed by Greg Erick-

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son's fielder's choice grounder.

Erickson stole second, went to third on Pete Grifol's throw in the dirt to second, then scored on Finnvold's wild pitch.

The bases were loaded on two walks and a fielding error by Rocky Rau. Juan Flores' sacrifice fly to center scored Fabregas from third to put Miami up, 2-0.

Finnvold struck out the side in the second, then served up a leadoff homer to Fabregas in the third. He loaded the bases again, but got John Farrell to fly out to center to minimize the damage.

FSU finally scored in the sixth thanks to two players with Miami connections. Catcher Pete Grifol, a Miami Columbus High graduate, led off with a double and went to third on Eddie Perez's sacrifice bunt down the first-base line.

Up stepped John Marc Tamayo, who transferred from Miami after his freshman year. Tamayo, starting for third baseman Rob Bargas (who had the flu), poked a single to left to score Grifol.

That cut Miami's lead to 3-1.

FSU threatened again in the sixth, but couldn't do anything after getting two runners to third. Bevis led off with a single and went to second on Munoz's wild pitch.

With one out, Brad Parker singled to center. Martin initially waved Bevis home, but then he held Bevis as he went two-thirds of the way down the base line.

By then, centerfielder Orlando Palmeiro's throw was heading home. Bevis stumbled as he tried to reverse field, and was easily caught in a rundown.

"I was digging hard for the plate trying to score, and I looked up and saw (Martin) waving me in," said Bevis, whose 12-game hitting streak ended. "At first he did and then he held me up. He was kinda far down (the line), but I don't think that mattered."

Said Martin: "It was a situation with me not being out there all the time, and was just an error in communication."

Miami unloaded on FSU in the seventh, scoring four runs to chase Finnvold for a 7-1 lead.

FSU rallied in the eighth, scoring two runs off reliever Elliot

Cianchini. In came Bush, who gave up a sacrifice fly to Eddie Perez and a walk to Tamavo before striking out Chris Brock.

FSU will pitch righthander Brad Gregory (0-1, 11 saves, 1.44 ERA), making his first of the season. Miami will counter with righthander Greg Knowles (10-2, 2.23), who has a lifetime ERA of 18.32 against FSU.

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
