Battling Band of Seminoles Goes

Down to 7-0 Defeat

Gamecock Remains Unbeaten and Untied

The Jacksonville State teachers college Gamecocks maintained their place among the nation's unbeaten and untied elevens last night with a first period scoring march that gave them a slim 7-0 win over a battling band of Florida State University Seminoles.

Some 3,700 spirited fans watched the Seminoles shake off the effects the effects of the scoring drive and outfight the highly vaunted Gamecocks throughout the remainder of the contest. Move 29 Yards

The Alabama eleven, protecting their perfect grid mark, moved

29 yards the first time they gained possession of the ball to take the game, but the Seminoles took the glory.

Rising up in the final tilt of a dismal season that saw them lose their fifth straight game, the Seminoles continually checked the lightening-fast teacher attack and fought back bitterly in an effort to get a scoring drive of their own underway.

The PSU forward wall, after grudgingly yielding the single score, hawked the Gamecock ball carriers all night 40 hold them to a net gain of 184 yards by rushing. The first time all fall that the Teachers have been held under the 200-yard mark.

Williams Scores

Led by Johnny Williams, full-back candidate for little Allmerica honors the Alabama eleven maneuvered down to the 2-yard line. From that point Williams, who has paced the Gamecock ground gainers and scorers ill fall, burst through center for the score.

Williams, who needed 127 yards to hit the 1,000 mark in rushing gains this fall, picked up 69 of the necessary total before he was injured and removed from the fracas midway in the final period.

Martin Douglass, rangy Gamecock flankman, was also hurt late in the game, losing five teeth.

The red-clad Jacksonville Teachers kicked to FSU, and after Banakas slipped and fell with the boot the Seminoles put the ball in play on their own 16. Don Grant tore around his own right end to his 31 on the first play from scrimmage, for a fast first down, but the Seminoles' attack stalled and a third down fumble gave the Gamecocks the ball on the Indian 31. Showing their spurs early, the Alabama eleven drove to a score. Cassidy and Williams moved to the 21 in two running plays. Aided by Heath's pass to Williams, the Gamecocks moved to another first down on the 9. Williams darted to the 5. After Heath smashed to the 2, Williams crashed through the middle for the score. Brugge's placement was perfect and the Gamecocks led 7-0.

New Indian Team

The Seminoles sent in an eitlrely new team for the kickoff. After Carter raced the kick from his I1 to the 34, the Seminoles, running from the single wing instead of the customary T, picked up two first downs before the Gamecocks

Moving from midfield Jaz drove to the 10 before a 15-yard penalty and three incomplete passes halted the drive on the 31.

With the two lines dominating the play the teams battled scorelessly throughout the second period. A terrific kicking duel featured. With McLean getting off kicks of 48 and 42 yards, and

Manuel contributing a rabbity 61yard quick kick, the Seminoles had the upper hand in the play. though Heath's 65-yard quick boot was the longest single punt of the session.

In the closing minutes of the first half the Indians started to move and went from their 42 to the Jax 32 before time ran out. Ken McLean, running hard from the single wing, picked up the attack when it lagged and chipped in with an 11-yard drive that almost saw him get away.

FSU students gave their garnet and gold squad a good hand as it left the field for intermission.

Third Quarter

The Seminoles kicked to the Gamecocks, Gilberg's high boot going down to the 5 where George Heath handed the ball off to Earl Roberts, who almost got away for the distance with a sprint to the 40.

The Gamecocks, aided by a 15yard penalty, got another march underway and moved to a first down on the 19.

After Jim Costello had sifted through and spilled Heath for a 7-yard loss the Seminoles held and took over on their 14.

McLean punted out to Bama 44, and on the second play regained possession when Chris Kalfas grabbed a deflected pass from Heath on the 44.

On the warpath the Indians took over the offense for the remainder of the period, as they roared to the 1, 19 and 20 yard lines in three unsuccessful attempts to score.

With MeLean still generating plenty of power the Seminoles moved on the ground, but their passes failed in the clutch.

Fourth Quarter

After K Smith had kicked the Bama eleven out of danger with a booming 58-yard spiral to the Seminole 26 the Gamecocks regained possession of the ball when Williams intercepted Chaudron's pass on his own 42-yard line.

A roughing penalty moved the ball over into PSU territory on the 36, but the Seminoles held and took over when Chaudron regained the porkpelt with a running one-hand interception. Unable to move the chain along the Semiholes kicked and Manuel's fourth down quick kick went out on the Teachers' 15-yard line.

With Williams and Sewell, his replacement, breaking into the clear the Gamecocks moved to the FSU 15 before the Indians rose up and stopped the charge by dropping the Teachers for four consecutive losses that pushed them from the FSU 10 to the 35.

C McMillan grabbed Chaudron's pass for a 27-yard gain after two defenders had batted it around, but PSU's aerial game failed again and the Teachers took over.

After K Smith punted to the FSU 31 the Seminoles picked up another first down on Barnes' pass to Costello that moved the ball over to the Teachers 48.

A third down fumble gave the ball back to the Gamecocks and the game ended with the Indians in possession on their own 29.
