Coach Don Veller's Seminoles, seeking to add an Erskine triumph to their opening victory over Cumberland last weekend, struck for a second period score and a brief 6-0 lead. But the experienced Fleet came from behind on a pair of touchdowns by halfback Clarence "Rabbit" Lowery to chalk up its third win against two losses this season.

Leading Scorer

Lowery, swivel-hipped climax runner who leads the Palmetto state in scoring took a pass from Captain Harry Hipps for a second period score and raced over for the final tally in the third frame.

Lowery's two touchdowns, and a pair of perfect placements by place-kicking guard Bill Bryan, overcame Indian halfback Ken McLean's charge into paydirt in the second quarter.

After the Seminoles had threatened twice to march to paydirt in the opening period, they broke the scoreless deadlock in the second period when McLean and Walter Foy moved the ball down to the Erskine two and McLean burst through right tackle for the counter.

The Fleet countered with its first tally before the haltime on a Hipps to Lowery pass, and chalked up its second in the third frame when Lowery took a hand-off and went 13 yards to score after a series of Hipps-Ansley passes had set up the touchdown.

Roll Up 14 Downs

The Seminoles rolled up 14 first down to Erskine's 10, and flashed a running attack which accounted for 205 yards on the ground. But their passing game clicked for only 32 yards on five completions out of 14 tosses. And the Fleet capitalized on their superiority in the air to win.

Ken McLean led the individual ground gainers with 63 yards from scrimmage, followed by Buddy Strass who piled up 59, most of them in the second half when he led the futile FSU assaults.

First Quarter

Florida State University's Seminoles, distinct underdogs before the opening kickoff quickly threatened to upset the dope bucket as they roared out after the opening kickoff and took the play straight into the Flying Fleet's territory.

age along the ground, got an early drive underway that carried to the Fleet 18 before it fizzled out.

After the Fleet punted out to Parish, FSU knocked at the door again when McLean and Manuel picked up a pair of first downs to the Fleet 15. But once more the Indians ran out of gas in the shadow of the goal and the Fleet took over.

The two teams battled harmlessly around midfield as penalties kept the Indians back on their heels.

Second Quarter

The Indians finally hit paydirt when they got a drive underway that culminated in a TD.

After FSU had taken over on the Fleet 38, big Ken McLean and Walter Foy moved along the ground to a first down on the 25, and then on the 15.

McLean hammered the line for 13 yards and another first down on the two, and the big Seminole tailback crashed through right tackle for the score.

Joe Crona's attempted placement was wide.

The Fleet roared right back to take the lead on the accurate right arm of Capt Harry Hipps.

Taking the FSU kickoff Erskine struck through the airways with Hipps hitting Oates for vital yardage. Aided by a 15-yard penalty, Erskine moved to the FSU 30. Hipps then hit Shelton on the 15 for a first down.

Hipps, fading to pass, was almost trapped, but got away and connected with Rabbit Lowery in the shadow of the FSU goal, and the slippery halfback shook over for the score.

Bill Bryan, extra-point specialist converted to give Erskine a 7-6 lead which the Fleet held at half-time.

Third Quarter

Shortly after the second half opened the Fleet got underway again on a scoring drive. Starting from their own 40 they moved to the 13 on Hipps' pass to Cliff Ansley. From the 13 Lowrey took a handoff from Hipps and slithered across to score. Bryan's placement was again good.

The Seminoles came back with a pair of drives, but both died.

After FSU had moved to the

Fleet's 22 they lost the ball on a fumble. And a second march, which carried from their 20 to the Erskine 46, was stymied by a 14-yard loss.

Fourth Quarter

With Buddy Strauss plugging away at the Erskine line the Seminoles several times threatened to get underway, but lacked the steam to get a serious march underway.

After Weaver's punt to the four had put FSU in a deep hole, the two teams spent the remainder of the tilt exchanging the ball without danger around the midfield marker.
