

Seminoles Give Miami First-Half

Fit Before Bowling

Fiveash, Taylor Star in Defeat

**Hold Hurricanes Scoreless Until
Minutes Before End of 2nd Period**

MIAMI, Sept. 26—Twenty-six thousand people looked on in wonder here Friday night as a tenderfoot pack of Florida State University Seminoles gave a tough University of Miami team all the football it could handle for the

better part of two quarters.

The fact that the Hurricanes swept on to a 27-0 triumph took some of the lustre off that vigorous first-half stand. But the over-all stamp of approval on a keen individual and team effort was undeniable.

It may seem odd for anyone to be pleased with a 27-0 defeat. But the calibre of football played by an outmanned team salved more than somewhat the sores.

There was no more outstanding back on the field than the Seminoles' Bobby Fiveash. The

senior from Bainbridge, Ga., was a superb defender. He made more tackles than any player, given credit for eight outright, with six assists. He carried more times for more yardage than any other Seminole back, nine times for 35 net and a 3.9 average.

THREE-TEAM STYLE

Up front, there was no better lineman this night than Seminole end Jimmy Lee Taylor, Miami's flock of impressive terminal talent notwithstanding. He had six tackles and two assists, caught three of the four passes that FSU completed, for 45 yards.

Bob Crenshaw, co-captain of the Seminoles for the game alongside fellow Miamian Lee Corso, had four tackles, 10 assists.

Corso survived the mammoth pressure of being starting quarterback for an opposing team before homefolks. He held the reins very well until he was hurt—a slight concussion. It may have been coincidence but FSU's stock started falling along about the time Corso was injured.

But Coach Tom Nugent figured later that it was the sheer volume of manpower Miami had that wore FSU down. The Hurricanes rotated three fine teams smartly—and three was too much for FSU, a one-team group at the moment.

FSU won the toss and the Seminoles immediately went into their pre-arranged plan of Operation Defense—electing to receive.

Art Knust wheeled that opening kickoff back 30 yards to the Hurricane 42 and it looked like Miami was off to the races.

Knust struck for six, then seven yards. With the help of an offside penalty, FSU detoured the opening march and forced a punt that Corso returned four yards to the 14.

Fiveash got four and six in two carries and a first down. But Corso fumbled and Miami's Ted Lubas grabbed it at the 24.

FSU dug in and stopped four running plays short of a first down. The Seminoles took over and there followed three plays later one of the slickest maneuvers of the evening.

With third down and 13 yards to go, the ball on FSU's 13, Corso daringly rifled a pass to Taylor. The connection was good for 22 yards to the 35. Big thing, it got FSU out from under an early gun.

After a punt exchange, FSU narrowly missed a touchdown. Carl Green swept 16 yards on a pitchout to Miami's 30. Fiveash pitched to Eddie Johnson but the bullet overshot its mark and what would have been a TD went by the boards. Next two plays

backfired in yardage losses to the 48 and FSU's first scoring chance was gone.

INTERCEPTIONS HURT

J. B. Johnston came in at quarterback for Miami and completed three passes, ran 20 yards himself in a drive that carried to FSU's 25 before it ran out of gas as a Seminole aerial defense showed its colors. Moments later, Miami was knocking again inside FSU's 25 after a 15-yard illegal substitution penalty and a poor punt had backed the Seminoles up. Again the defense held.

Whitey Rouviere's interception of a Corso pass paved Miami's first touchdown. In three straight carries, Gordon Malloy, former Georgia Tech player and Miami's finest ball-carrier of the evening, swept one end for 24 yards, the other end for 10 yards, and hit the middle for nine. This one-man push led to FSU's 19. Don James' pass to Tom Pepsin sat things up on the three and Rouviere whipped over. Glen Mugler converted for 7-0. The score had come four minutes, 35 seconds before halftime.

Miami's second score, early in the third period, was also staged following an interception. Knust hauled in a Fiveash toss at the FSU 27. A series of short knocks, led by Knust, carried to the one-foot line and Malloy took it over from there. Dan Tossotti, at right tackle one of the large thorns in FSU's side, kicked the point for 34-0.

MASSEY DIRECTS

FSU manipulated another scoring opportunity after Buddy Bryant covered a James' fumble at the FSU 41. Stan Dobosz got six, Ronnie King 11, Harry Massey seven and Taylor seven (on a pass from Massey) to spark a drive to the Miami 25. But Miami held.

From that point the Hurricanes marched 75 yards to their third touchdown. Bill Smith, who had started things rolling with a 20-yard sweep, climaxed it from one yard out. Ed Oliver's conversion was good for 21-0.

FSU moved strongly after the kick. Massey directed a drive all the way to the Miami 20, his 26-yard run and his 17-yard pass to Taylor features of the push. Miami defenders stormed through to set FSU back on the 45 in two plays.

Miami rolled against a tiring FSU squad in the closing moments. Fifteen seconds before the final gun, the Hurricanes got a fourth marker on James' eight-yard throw to John Shields.

It was the longest touchdown play of the night. Every one of Miami's scores had come the hard way against a foe that grudged every inch.
