

# FSU Stuns Louisville And Hometown Fans With 59-0 Victory

## 2 Touchdown 'Underdogs' Turn Tables

Incredible, stunning, overwhelming. You supply your own superlatives, your own adding machine, give your imagination a blank check. Florida State University's scrumptious young Seminoles whacked University of Louisville, 59-0, here Saturday night in an amazing turnabout of football fortunes.

Nine thousand fans—and a gaping Louisville team—looked on while these Seminoles went about the business of making believers of them all.

Even that renowned optimist, Tom Nugent, never dreamed anything like this.

Said he, serenely after the guns stopped thundering: "Yes, I was surprised—at the way we blocked and tackled. We used the same three or four plays over and over again. We were just hitting good."

Louisville Coach Frank Camp thought it was something more than that.

### TOO GOOD FOR US'

"You all were just too good for us. You had more speed, were more alert, made more breaks and took advantage of them."

Asked how the loss of passing star John Unitas hampered his Cardinals, the coach replied: "We could not have beaten FSU tonight with two or three Unitas."

Unitas had hurt his ankle in a game last week. The ankle was re-injured in the first half last night. Unitas could do little right while he was in there. He played not at all in the second half.

### HEROES APLENTY

FSU heroes were a dime a dozen. Bobby Fiveash continued his superb halfbacking, scoring three of the nine touchdowns. Stan Dobosz scored two, Billy Graham, Lee Corso, Junior Metts and Carl Greinn got one apiece.

Harry Massey impressed with his quarterbacking. He started the game, guided FSU to its first two scores. Lee Corso played more than Massey, however. Corso's running on the option play was the best individual weapon of the game.

FSU set a new school record for yards rushing with 397. The Seminoles' total offensive yard-

age was 544, despite having 100 yards assessed in penalties. Jarring tackles caused Louisville to fumble eight times, and FSU recovered five of them.

Corso carried 10 times for 73 yards to head individual ground-gaining figures. His touchdown, however, came on a 59-yard punt return.

### ONE BRIGHT MOMENT

Winning the coin toss was one of the few bright moments for Louisville. The Cardinals chose to receive.

Less than three minutes later the Seminoles had their first touchdown of the season. Don Boyd returned the kickoff to the Cards' 28. Louisville ran just two plays. Unitas fumbled and Steve Kalenich hopped on it for FSU.

In four plays, the Seminoles gobbled up the 24 yards to the

goal. Dobosz got one. Fiveash swept end behind Joe Holt's block to the 11. After Holt bulled for three, Dobosz powered off right tackle for the final eight. And Dobosz converted for 7-0.

Louisville was finding the early going rough against a vigorous FSU defense. A weak 20-yard punt gave FSU another chance from the Seminole 43. The boys made good, covering the 57 yards in six plays. Fiveash got 14 on a sweep. Holt picked up one, then 12. On a sparkling running pass, Massey nailed Jimmy Lee Taylor

for a 21-yard gain to the nine. Fiveash got three to the six. Then Fiveash steamed around end and scored with the help of Al Pacifico's block. Dobosz' boot made it 14-0 and the game was not seven minutes old.

With Mike McDonald, a freshman who left the University of Kentucky, in the fore, Louisville drove to the FSU 28. But the Cards had to give up on downs there.

The Seminoles were on their way again. Corso was in at quarterback. His running on the split-T option got FSU up to its own 41. Billy Graham high-kneed his way around end, skipping over a couple of Louisville people who got in his way and chalked 25 to the Card 34. A penalty and Bud Lively's tackling of Graham for a loss of five bogged down FSU momentarily as the quarter ended.

#### RAIN, INDIANS ATTACK

Fans scampered for cover as a brief, but heavy downpour ushered in the second period. Massey was back in directing the attack and he flipped another on the run, Fiveash grabbing the wet ball for a net of 23 at the 13. Massey could not find a re-

ceiver and slashed a 10-yard route to the three. Three plays later, Fiveash bulled over from the two. Dobosz swung his toe for 21-0.

Corso struck for a fourth FSU touchdown a couple of minutes later. The Miami freshman hauled in a Louisville punt at the FSU 41, faked a reverse with Dobosz, then lit-out down the right sideline for 59 yards and the score. Dobosz missed and it was 27-0.

For the first time, Unitas started unlimbering his passing arm. He met with little success. When

Louisville tried to punt, Ed Mann and Bob Barber were there to block it for FSU. Dale Bates picked it up and fought his way 31 yards to what looked like a touchdown. But the ball was dead at the 31 and FSU took over from there.

Graham got six. King stepped for five. After a penalty of five, Leonard Swantic hit John Griner with a pass at the 15 and the Jacksonville sophomore maneuvered to the four before he was pulled down. Graham bagged No. 5 with a drive off left tackle. Graham kicked the point for 34-0.

Once more the Seminoles struck before halftime. A Louisville punt was returned to the Card 44 by Swantic. A penalty put the Seminoles back on the 49. On a brilliant play, Massey pitched out to Fiveash, who faded and lofted a long pass. Taylor made a circus catch at the 20 and ripped to the five, a 44-yard gain. After Holt got one, Dobosz zipped around left end for a sixth touchdown. Dobosz' kick missed.

It was an unbelievable 40-0 midway in the game.

Actually, FSU almost got another one before the whistle. Corso dashed 33 yards on a bootleg play to the Louisville 17. Time ran out there.

The Seminoles had rolled up 170 yards on the ground, 103 through the air with five completions in seven passing attempts. Louisville had 41 rushing, 28 via air. And Unitas, who had struck on 12 of 13 pitches in this same stadium a year ago during the first half, had been stopped cold. Louisville had completed but two passes in eight attempts.

Buddy Bryant brought the second-half kick back 21 yards to the Seminole 43. And FSU was off to the races again. Dobosz broke loose for 37 yards to the Cards 20. Massey lost three but hit the middle for 13 to the 10. After two incomplete passes, Massey ran to the five. Fiveash whipped around end for No. 7. Dobosz' kick was wide 46-0.

#### CARDINALS 'HOLD'

McDonald returned the kick nicely, 38 yards to the Louisville 48. Marrell Hatchcock covered a Louisville fumble at the Seminole 48 a couple of plays later. Corso sparked a drive to the 15. A slip on wet turf, a penalty, an incomplete pass and Louisville "held" for the first time.

Fred Twomey grabbed another fumble for FSU at the Louisville 27. Junior Metts took the ball over nine yards out, with a blocking assist from Barber. Corso's conversion made it 53-0.

In the next few minutes, Sonny Shroyer and Barber recovered additional Louisville fumbles for FSU. An interception of a Swastic aerial by Jim Houser and a Louisville recovery of a Swastic fumble balanced the break.

But FSU was not yet ready to call it a night. Robert Glenn, who had reeled off a 28-yarder among preceding carries, hit for 16 to set the Seminoles up in business on the Cards 15. Swantic got four. With 33 second left, Swastic passed 11 yards to Glenn for a ninth touchdown.

It was the worst defeat Louisville has absorbed since Vanderbilt dealt a 68-0 setback in 1941.

For FSU, it was the second biggest margin of triumph in its young football history. In 1949, the Seminoles routed Whiting Field, 74-0.
