TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 10--(Special)--The Florida State University "Marching Chiefs" will present their Florida Spectacular Saturday in the first annual Bluegrass Bowl in Louisville, Ky. before an estimated crowd of \_\_\_\_\_\_ and a television viewing audience of millions.

The Chiefs, under the direction of Manley Whitcomb, will present a halftime show of marches, music and formations that herald Fabulous Florida's industries and tourist attractions.

Amoung the many intricate formations for which the Chiefs are nationally known will be their Rocket formation in honor of the missle base at Cape Canavaral; the Bok Singing Tower at Lake Wales, known to millions of tourists that have visited Florida in the past twenty-five years; also included will be a "marching map" of the State, palm trees and many many more.

The nationally televised Bluegrass Bowl game will be carried over the American Broadcasting Company Television Network and will be be viewed in practically every television area in the United States.

The Marching Chiefs, some 120 members strong, will leave Tallahassee on Friday night at 7 p.m. aboard a Bluegrass Bowl Special which has been chartered by the students of Florida State University, the state of Florida Development Commission and the many loyal fans and boosters of the Florida State University "Fighting Seminoles."

The "Special" is scheduled to arrive in Louisville at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, December 13 and will then depart at 9 p.m. the same night.

In addition to the halftime show and music during the game, the Chiefs are being scheduled for a parade to the stadium preceding the clash between the "Cowboys" of Oklahoma State University and the "Seminoles" of Florida State University. This game promises to be a real "Cowboy and Indian" thriller in true Hollywood-type fashion.

# FSU Loses By 15-6 In BG Inaugural

# Stretch Bid Fails To Overtake OSU

LOUISVILLE, Ky-Hard-running Oklahoma State backs, no thoroughbreds but plenty good workhorses, firstdowned Florida State to death here Saturday afternoon and won the frigid inaugural of the Bluegrass Bowl, 15-6,

Eugged Cowboy linemen forced the Seminoles to the air and the 185 yards they gained on passing made it most interesting.

Behind 15-0 going into the last quarter, FSU made a stretch bid on Joe Majors' slick throwing.

But despite Carl Meyer's touchdown catch on a 38-yard pass, it and Bobby Renn's 40-yard grab t for a first down on the six, FSU v couldn't catch up.

#### WOOD GETS 14 POINTS

Duane Wood got 14 of the Cowboys' points, slashing 17 yards for a second-quarter payoff, pounding over from the one in the third period, taking a pass from Dick Soergel for two points after the No. 2 TD.

It was Fullback Forrest Campbell, however, who did most of the damage, and it was he that writers voted the game's most valuable performer. Campbell, a 196-pounder, ran a whopping 26 times picked up 130 of the Cowboys' 298 yards rushing. OSU ran up 23 first downs to FSU's dozen.

#### TEAMS IN SNEAKERS

While many thousands across the country comfortably watched this one on television, only 7,000 braved the marrow-chilling 10degree weather of Fairgrounds Stadum. Both teams wore sneakers to combat the frozen turf. The Seminoles started as

first two times they got the ball. Fourth-down fieldgoal attempts by Johnny Sheppard were futile on both occasions.

FSU was hounded by mistakes from these early bright moments until the end. Oklahoma State recovered three FSU fumbles, intercepted four passes. FSU managed one pass theft but got no OSU fumbles until the final minute, when two were grabbed. TOTAL OF 375 YARDS

Though the Cowboys ran up a total yardage of 375, they didn't have to go far for their points. First touchdown came after a 53-yard drive following an FSU punt from down deep. They travelled 39 yards for the second after claiming an FSU fumble.

The Seminoles spent most of the afternoon repulsing a steady s run of Oklahoma threats. They d held at the 16 in the first quar-0 ter, at the one in the second 0- after OSU got a first down on is the seven, at the 24 in the third, re then at the 10 near the finish.

# ROMEO A WHIZBANG

Tony Romeo was a whizbang all afternoon, and the FSU end was runnerup to Campbell in the

most-valuable vote. The Tampa sophomore played 56 minutes, caught three pases for 62 yards, was a stickout on defense.

Guard Al Ulmer and end Ron Hinson also turned in outstanding line performances for the Seminoles.

Majors, throwing from a doublewing spread, hit on five of nine throws for 116 yards. FSU all told, passed 22 times, completed nine. Fred Pickard was the running leader with 44 yards in 14 trips.

While FSU had the ball for only 50 offensive plays, running on merely 28 of them, Oklahoma State gave a big lesson in attack control. The Cowboys got in 88 plays, ran 76 times. Duane Wood accumulated 81 yards on the ground in 17 bids, and Jim Wiggins contributed 59 for 12.

#### RECORDS EQUAL

Both teams went into this one with 7-3 records.

Regarded as a 3-point favorite in Louisville before the kickoff, the Cowboys came through over the Indians in the tradition of many another television epic.

Florida State won the toss and received the game-opening kickoff.

Vic Prinzi hauled it 14 yards to the 38. Pickard managed five yards in two smashes. Prinzi, on the option run, sailed one into the arms of Romeo for 25 yards to the Cowboy 32. Bobby Renn sliced to the 27 but two plays later FSU was still on the 27 as Pickard and Renn met trouble. Sheppard entered for a long field-goal try. It was short.

After Romeo curtailed the Cowboys' first offensive effort by dropping Duane Wood for minus eght, FSU got going from its 37.

## LATERAL WORKS

Prinzi and Renn teamed on a lateral deal that netted 18 yards to the Oklahoma 35. And the Cowboys were taxed for roughing, down to the 20. Bud Whitehead's one-yard run, an incomplete pass and Joe Majors' keep carried only to the 13. Again Shep tried for three. The attempt was partially blocked by Vandiver Childs III.

Oklahoma State got going from its 20 and in 11 running plays, dominated by Campbell's eight dashes for 48 yards, was knocking at the FSU 18. But on fourth down, needing three, Campbell was stopped a yard short by the FSU right side.

## BAD BOUNCE

Bobby Conrad's quick-kick got a nasty reverse bounce, was good for 37 yards to the Oklahoma 47.

Dick Soergel threw his first pass. It was a beaut to Wiggins, 31 yards to the FSU 22. Majors' tackle averted a touchdown.

As the second quarter opened, Wiggins dug to the 17. Then, on a quick-opener, Duane Wood burst through left tackle for the touchdown. Jim Wood capped it with an extra point. Helped by a 12-yard pass, Prinzi to Romeo, FSU pushed to midfield. But Don Hitt intercepted a subsequent throw at the 36.

Gene McCormick, No. 3 quarterback, provided an interesting Seminole moment when he threw 25 yards to Romeo at the Oklahoma 41. Fourth down, needing much, McCormick couldn't get off a pass. Fumbled when hit at the 43.

Oklahoma State went on a timeconsuming march, started by Soergel's pass to Jim Wood for nine. Duane Wood banged for 15 in two smashes. A penalty assisted the Cowboys to the 24. Four more runs and they had a first down on the seven. Wiggins hit to the four. Soergel got nothing. Wiggins powered to the one. End Ron Hinson pulled down Wiggins a foot from the goal on his fourthdown effort with 1:15 left in the half.

Renn quick-kicked on second down, up to the 34. Soergel passes to Wiggins and Duane Wood, moved the Oklahomans to the nine. A pass bounced off Jim Woods and Pickard intercepted it as the whistle ended the quarter.

With Campbell probing off tackle for 40 yards in eight totes, the Cowboys paraded downfield from the second-half kickoff. Sixteen plays extended all the way to FSU's 24 before a holding penalty against OSU left the Seminoles breathe easier. Jim Wood punted out on the 17.

Pickard and Prinzi runs reached to the FSU 45. Renn hit the middle, might have been free but he fumbled and Hitt covered it for Oklahoma.

A penalty again helped contain the Cowboys but they had a better shot seconds later when Pickard lost the ball and Harold Beaty claimed it for OSU at the FSU 39.

Ten plays did the job. Down to the five on Wiggins' 18-yard scamper, the Cowboys drew a holding penalty. They overcame it on third down when Soergel shot a screen pass to D. Wood, who navigated to the 1-foot line. D. Wood pounded over.

# PAT GOOD

Soergel's pass to D. Wood for two raised the score to 15-0 with the third quarter all but gone.

Renn returned the kickoff to the FSU 40 and immediately FSU went into its double-wing spread. A Majors' screen to Paul Pasquale got 14 to the OSU 46. Then Carl Meyer outsprinted a defender, gathered in a Majors' pass at the three and fell across the goal.

Prinzi tried to sweep for two points but Ralph Bock grabbed him by the hell four yards short, leaving it 15-6. Scenting a chance, FSU's line perked up, held. J. Wood punted 42 yards to FSU's 21.

Pickard, in two pushes, got to the 31. Majors passed to Jack Espenship for seven, to Hinson for

16, and Majors found Renn with a long one, 40 yards to the six.

But Pickard got nothing. Majors lost a half yard. Renn was clear in the end zone but the pass sailed over his head.

A last-down pitch was stolen by D. Wood in the end zone, and he ran it out to the 18. Seven minutes, 43 seconds remained. . The Cowboys ate up almost seven minutes of it with a ground push that reached to a first down on the 10. A stray pitchout lost 18, however.

FSU had a fading opportunity when Bob Swoszowski got Dan Wagner's fumble at the 27 with 27 seconds left. Tony Banfield intercepted Prinzi's throw at midfield. Terry Moran promptly grabbed another OSU fumble. Again Prinzi's throw was intercepted, this time by Fred Latham. It was the last play of the game.
