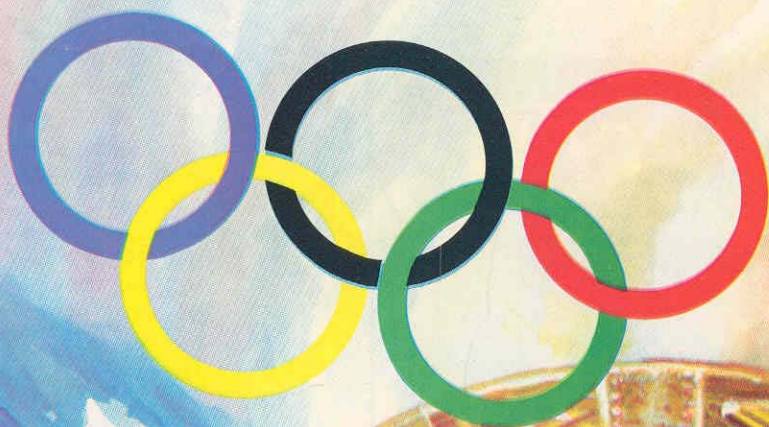

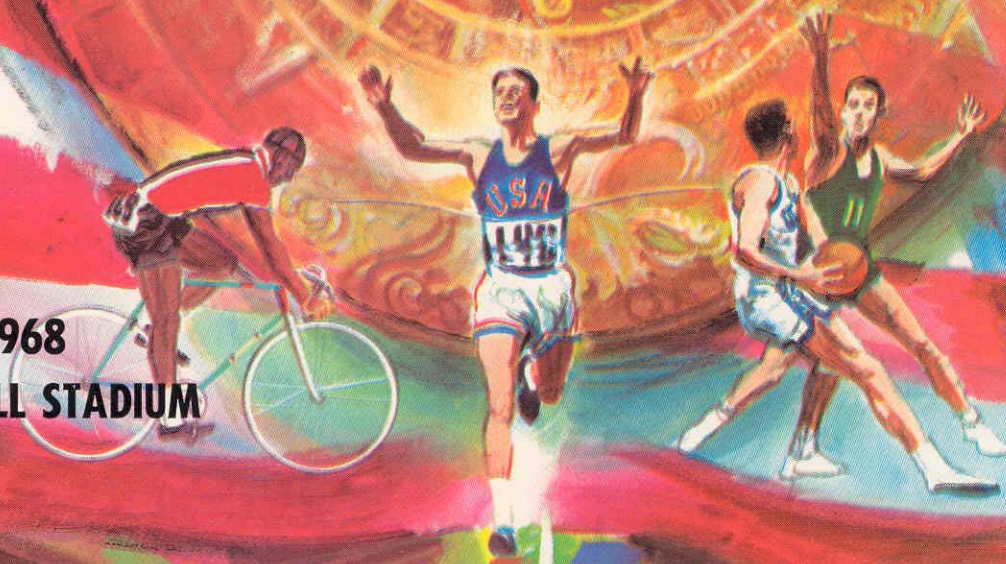

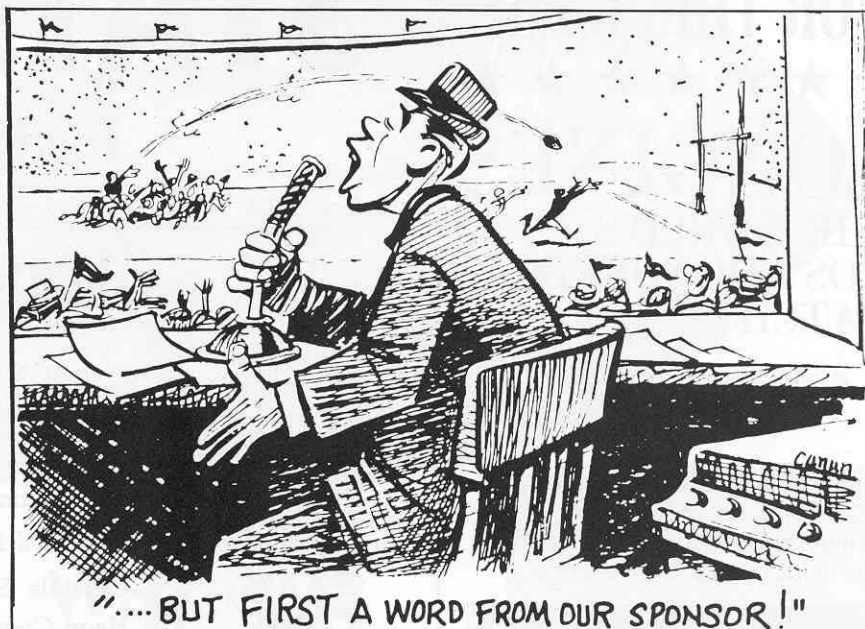

MEMPHIS STATE UNIVERSITY, from its humble beginnings as West Tennessee State Normal School in 1909 to its present structure of eight Colleges and Divisions, has been one of the nation's fastest developing Universities. Credit for much of this successful rapid growth goes to the foresight of its administration and president, Dr. C. C. Humphreys. The University has more than 1,100 acres in four locations within Shelby County. Undergraduate and graduate degrees are awarded in more than seventy-five major areas.

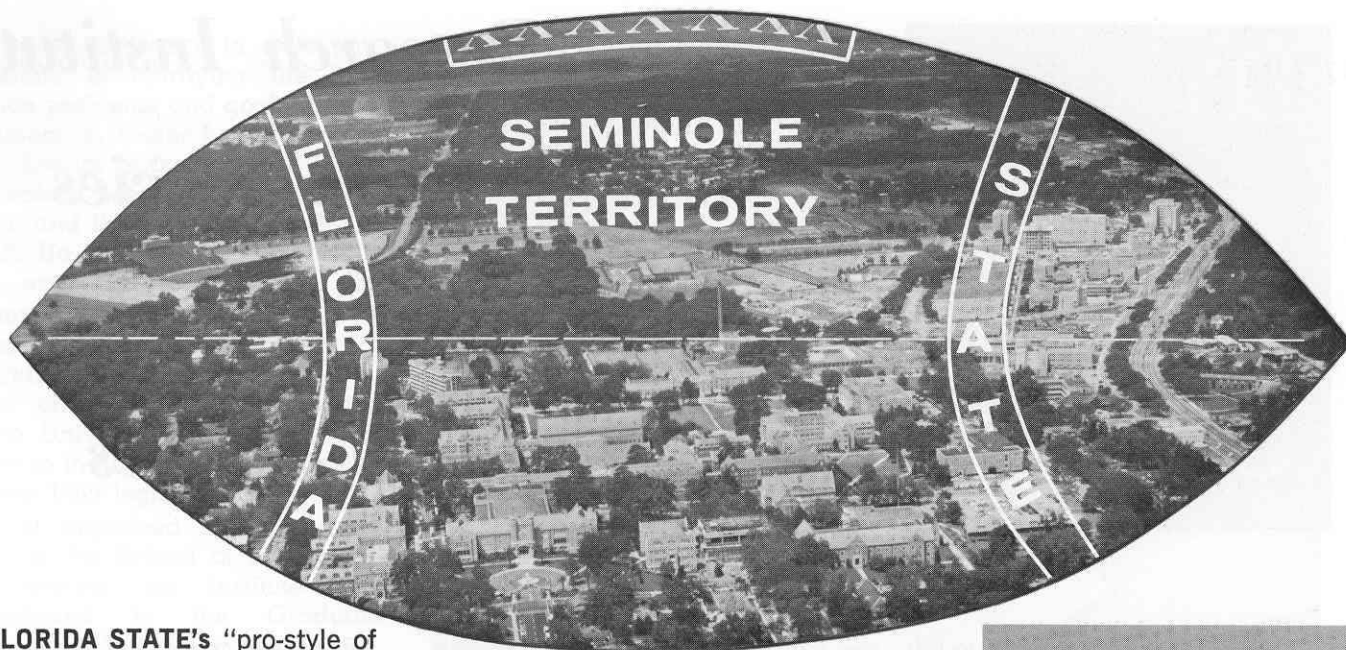
THE TIGERS are competing in the rugged Missouri Valley Conference football race for the first time this year and are given a good chance of walking away with the

championship. The season started slow for the Tigers, as they dropped their first two games to non-conference foes Tennessee and Mississippi. The slow start might have been expected though considering the competition and the number of young untested players on the Tiger squad. After the opening losses Memphis State has come on strong with wins over North and West Texas State. Ricky Thurow is one of two Tiger quarterbacks. Last year he ran the second team which was known as the "Touchdown Team." He guides the Tiger option offense and is a fine sprint out passer. Defensively the Tigers are as strong as last year. The defense is sparked by the play of brothers Alex and Bobby Dees, a fine pair of ends.

NEXT WEEK: The Seminoles take to the road for the first time in a month when they journey to Columbia to face South Carolina in a night contest. It will be homecoming for the Gamecocks, which doesn't make the Tribe's task any easier. Carolina Coach Paul Dietzel was Bill Peterson's boss back in the 1950's when both were at LSU. And Dietzel is still looking for his first win over his former assistant coach. While the varsity is on the road, the Seminole freshmen will take over Campbell Stadium hosting the Southern Mississippi frosh Saturday night at 8 p.m. It will be the Baby Seminoles' only home appearance this season. The varsity will return to Campbell Stadium Nov. 2 for a night game with Virginia Tech.



FLORIDA STATE's "pro-style of leadership is not limited to athletics. It permeates the 350-acre campus and characterizes the University's 41,000 alumni, 16,000 students and more than 3,000 dedicated members of the faculty and staff.

FOUNDED IN 1857, the University has grown to a complement of 10 colleges and schools, winning All-America honors both in arts and sciences as well as athletics. Moving rapidly upward in the national leagues of innovative institutions, Florida State is one of the 24 universities in this country which confers more than 100 Ph.D. degrees each year. It also has the distinction of holding one of the National Science Foundation's largest (\$4.8 million) grants for development as a "center of excellence" in four science areas—physics, statistics, psychobiology and chemistry.

AS THE WINTER HOME of the 1966 Nobel Laureate in Chemistry (Dr. Robert S. Mulliken), and as year-round headquarters for a faculty team with Nobel Prize potential, the University is one in which excellence in classroom teaching is its most important goal. Constantly experimenting with new formations in its educational teaching patterns, Florida State is preparing for a yearly enrollment of 28,000 by 1975.

A fellow on the phone asked would I write a story about Bill Peterson for this program, make it personal, tell it like I know him . . . and hold it to 250 words.

There ain't no way.

There is hardly any way to explain Florida State's head football coach in 250,000 words. He lends himself not at all well to telling about in words, period. You have to have a "feel" for knowing about Pete, and for most it comes only from being around him a long, long time.

He is what you call a walking paradox. More than most, he is not always what he seems.

Sometimes he kind of reminds me of a woman, the way he talks. You see, when something crosses his mind he often blurts it out. He's always thinking out loud. He is emotional; it is a way of getting things out of his system. Because he does this, some call him a cry baby . . . He is that and much in the manner of Georgia's Wallace Butts, another renowned weeper. Like Butts, Pete will use any convenient shoulder.

Also like Butts, he's much of a man . . . which they don't make many of anymore. Thoroughly rugged with more energy than a 2-year-old colt, Peterson can be terribly impatient with the little annoying things that get in his way—and these are the molehills he sometimes makes mountains out of. Of course, some of the mountains are very real ones.

But give the man some real trouble, the kind that makes mice out of men, and he's got his cup of tea. He's one of those who reacts better with a crisis. If he doesn't have a ready-made crisis, you can give points on his manufacturing one—or more.

What he does to the English language, on occasion, only Casey Stengel before him has done. Yet, when he's at ease, with his busy mind firmly on the matter at hand, he can be among the most articulate of speakers.

He enjoys life, and he tackles it with the same zest that he does football. The only "name" of any game with him is winning. Yet, he likes his fun with it, and he is totally obsessed.

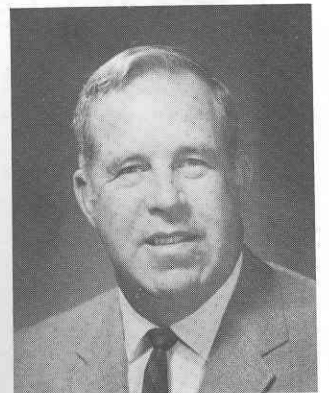
Only he, I think, could have accomplished what he has in FSU football with the same resources. Despite his yelps, he's never recognized the odds, really. He has never stopped believing that he could, despite all, make his football team No. 1. He's one to find a way.

He summed himself up really well, paradoxes and all, one day during the summer when near the end of a particularly long lament over the telephone, he said: "Hell, Bill, I don't want to be no Knute Rockne—I just want to win!"

TONIGHT'S GAME

Tonight's opponents, Florida State and Memphis State, may well think twice before they put the ball in the air.

Both boast fine pass defenses, Florida State 1st in the country and the Tigers rate high in interceptions with 11.

Memphis State, in its last two games, have intercepted 10 passes and recovered four fumbles. The Tigers picked off six in downing North Texas 30-12 and then last Saturday night they intercepted four while downing West Texas 42-21.

On the other hand, the Seminoles have eight interceptions and have allowed an average of only 67.3 yards passing in three contests.

Memphis State relies primarily on a rushing offense featuring a pair of sophomores in the starting backfield. Jay McCoy, from Miami, is the tailback and 220-pound Ray Jamieson is the fullback.

Like Florida State, the Tigers are a two-quarterback club since juniors Ricky Thurow and Danny Pierce split the playing time. The Seminoles remember Thurow well since he counted Memphis State's lone touchdown last season on a 59-yard option play as Florida State dumped the Tigers 26-7 before a regional television audience.

If the Seminoles remember Thurow, the Tigers should remember Florida State's All-America linebacker candidate, Dale McCullers. Against Memphis State last year, the 210-pound McCullers made 17 unassisted tackles and for this performance was named National Line-man of the Week by the Associated Press.

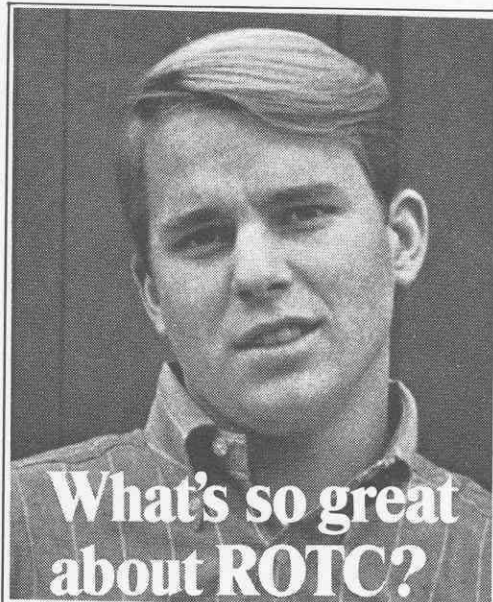
McCullers gained the same honor this year following the Seminoles' 20-14 victory over Texas A&M when he made 20 tackles.

The Seminoles are likely to go with the same starting lineup which faced Texas A&M. That includes quarterback Bill Cappleman, fullback Tom Bailey and tight end Jim Tyson, three players who started for the first time against the Aggies.

Florida State will pit its "Pro-T" attack against Memphis State's crushing running game featuring the option play. The Tigers will throw but not as much as the Seminoles since Florida State has thrown an average of 33 times in three contests to Memphis State average of 19 in four games.

This will be the third meeting between the Missouri Valley Conference Tigers and the independent Seminoles. Memphis State won 16-6 in 1959 while Florida State claimed last year's game 26-7.

Memphis State comes into the contest with a 2-2 record having lost its first two to SEC powers Ole Miss (21-7) and Tennessee (24-17).



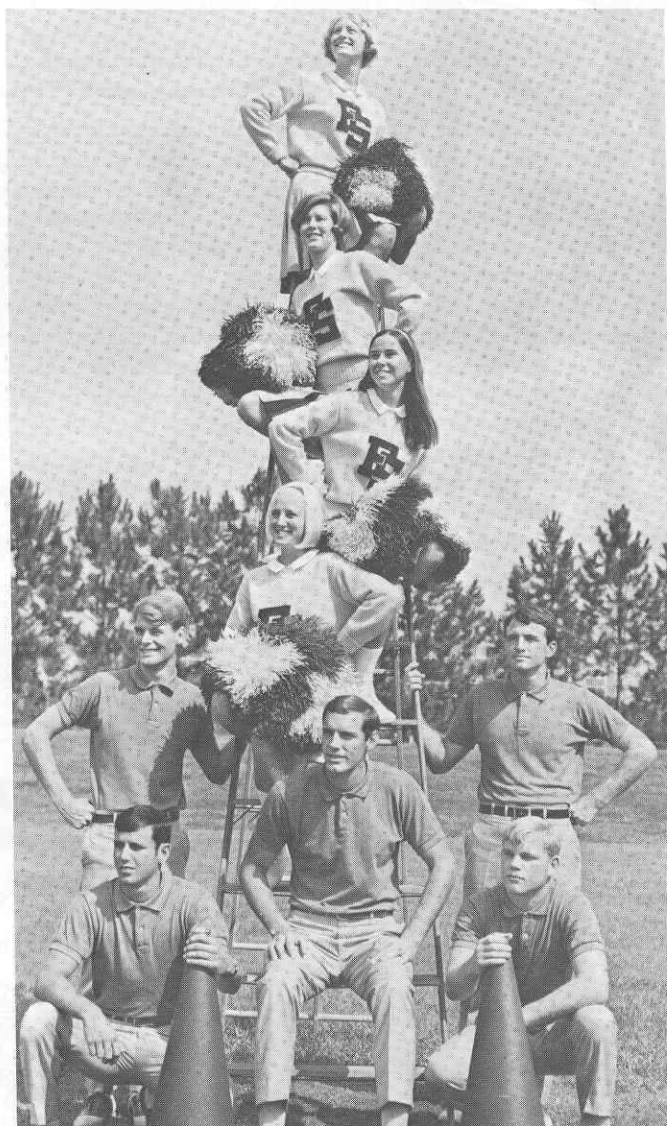

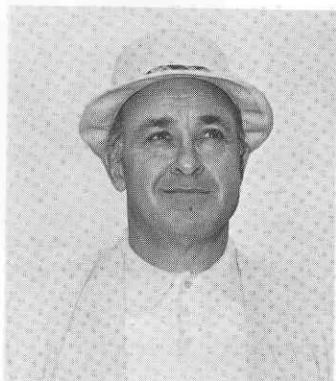

QUOTES FROM THE COACHES

MSU COACH BILLY MURPHY -- We played a very good football team tonight. Florida State was able to make the big play when they had to. We didn't play the type of football game we wanted to play. Sellers is an outstanding football player, and he caught the ball well tonight. We were unable to cover him on the circle hook, and he hurt us with this.

In addition to not playing up to our capabilities, we lost two starters in this game. Defensive tackle Edna Luis Fernandez and offensive guard Ray Damphousse both hurt a knee and will not be back.

Fernandez--injured right knee when caught in a pinch jumping to attempt to block Cappleman pass in the first quarter.

Damphousse--injured left knee while covering punt just before the half. Both will be operated on next week.

FLORIDA STATE COACH BILL PETERSON -- We beat a fine football team. They were ready to play. But I think we're a good team. We're just a little ways from being a great football team. I thought Ron Sellers found himself again to night. Sam Cappleman did a fine job. In the first half we just missed too many passes. That off week definitely hurt our timing.

Our defense was great except for the couple of times we let them out of the trap on third and long yardage.

Memphis State had some real hard runners. And they have a pair of fine quarterbacks.

They changed their defenses some and they used a coverage that confused us a little. But we got it straightened out. They dogged us a lot and we didn't think they would.
