

Golden Records On A Silver Anniversary

Florida State's Athletic Program joins the entire University in this year's Silver Anniversary celebration, proud of its accomplishments in the last 25 years and excitedly looking ahead to the next 25.

Perhaps never in the history of Intercollegiate Athletics has a program come so far, in so short a period after starting with

Athletics at Florida State began in 1947, the same year the University received full coeducational status. It has fought its way to the top and now ranks among the nation's better programs. The overall success that Florida State's program has enjoyed is envied by schools two and three times as old.

Florida State currently participates in eight intercollegiate sports at the NCAA level. They have a winning percentage of 67.3, for the last 25 years. Since 1960 that percentage stands at 70.5 and has been chalked up against some of the nation's toughest competition.

The best single athletic season came in 1969-70 when the Seminoles won 118 of 148 events for a winning percentage of 80.4. Only once, the very first season in 1947-48, have they fallen below the 50 percent mark.

The Tribe baseball team with 608 victories, is the biggest winner (basketball is second with 358), but the best winning percentage is held by the swimming team which has won 81.2 percent of its 234 meets. Golf has won 75.6 percent of its matches, while baseball has a winning mark of 70.8.

In addition to the eight sports still competing, Florida State was also represented by Gymnastics and Volleyball teams until scheduling problems forced their disbandment. The Gymnastics team had a phenomenal 42-4-1 record for its 11 seasons. It was unbeaten in nine of those years, and brought two NCAA and three AAU National Championship Trophies home.

The volleyball team also had an outstanding record, winning 72.8 percent of its matches and one national championship in nine seasons.

A complete table of Florida State's athletic history in current sports is listed below. In addition to the year-by-year breakdowns there are totals for the first 13 years (1947/48 -1959/60), the last 12 seasons (1960/61 - 1971/72) and the full 25-year totals.

TODAY'S GAME

Colorado State, the Seminoles' opponents this afternoon, has only three seniors on its squad and only two of these get much playing time.

The Rams, members of the Western Athletic Conference, come into the contest winless, having lost to Arizona (17-0), Iowa State (41-0), West Texas State (41-14), Utah State (21-0), Air Force (52-13) and Wyoming (28-9).

Colorado State's main problems have been inexperience both offensively and defensively. The Rams lost their top defensive player, safety Paul Duda, for the season with a broken leg.

Offensive turnovers have been extremely costly for the WAC team. The young Rams offense has turned the ball over 27 times in six games and most of these errors have come at inopportune moments. In the Wyoming game, Colorado State was inside the enemy 15 five times, turning the ball over four times and scoring once.

Sophomore quarterback Mark Driscoll missed last week's Wyoming contest but should be healthy today. The 175 pounder from LaJunta, Colo., averaged 18 completions in the two games before he was injured. His 19 completions against Utah State tied a school record.

Another sophomore, Willie Miller, is the Rams' leading receiver with 21 catches for 330 yards. Top rusher is Reggie Leonard, 177-pound speedster from Cincinnati, Ohio, who has gained 243 yards while scoring two touchdowns.

Seminole defenders will be facing one of the biggest offensive lines they have looked at all season since tackle Al Simpson tips the scales at 275 and guard Charles Montgomery weighes in at 255.

The battered and bruised Seminoles snapped back last week for a 25-21 victory over Mississippi State. With the Florida State defense physically beat up, the Seminoles went to a ground game with the objective being to use up the clock.

It was successful since the Seminoles went into the fourth quarter with a 17-7 lead and hung on against an aerial attack which produced two late Bulldog


Heisman Trophy candidate Gary Huff threw two touchdown passes to Barry Smith and became the Seminoles' all-time TD passer with 43, one better than Bill Cappleman.

This is the 25th Florida State homecoming game and the Seminoles sport an 18-5-1 record before the old grads.

When Florida State University opened its doors in 1857, the school was known as the West Florida Seminary and consisted of 10 acres of land, a \$6,172 building and 120 students.

Today, the multi-million-dollar University sprawls across 343 acres (main campus), has nine colleges and schools, and has a student enrollment in excess of 19,000.

This year, Florida State celebrated its 25th anniversary as a coeducational university and its 115th birthday as an institution of higher learning.

The University actually had its beginning on Jan. 24, 1851, when the legislature passed a law establishing two Seminaries—one east and one west of the Suwannee River—but it wasn't until 1857 that the school received its first student and at that time it was known as the West Florida Seminary.

The institution progressed through a series of historical eras and changes in its educational missions, being known at various points in the latter half of the nineteenth century as the "West Florida Seminary," and as "Florida University;" and in the first half of the twentieth century, as "Florida State College," "Florida Female College," and the "Florida State College for Women" (1909-1947).

During the Civil War years the Seminary had hard times; its part in the battle of Natural Bridge is now legend. On March 6,

1865, cadets from the Seminary took part in the battle near Woodville and, according to historian William G. Dodd, they "took a proud part, and by their bravery and gallant behavior they won the plaudits not only of the townspeople but of the older and more seasoned fighters as well."

The Seminary found itself in fianancial straits during the early 1870s and again in 1879. It was suggested that the Seminary buildings and land be sold and that it merge with the Female Academy. This plan envisioned the coeducation of the sexes and, "for this reform the community was as yet unprepared," reported Dodd in his "History of West Florida Seminary," published in 1952.

A turning point in the history of the Seminary came in 1887 when Judge James D. Westcott died and gave it a legacy which yielded approximately \$2,000 annually. The University is still receiving funds from the Westcott Estate; and its main administration building, now being repaired and remodeled, is named after him.

Another milestone came in 1901 when the institution became a college and its name was changed to Florida State College. During its first year, the student body of 252 came from 5 other states and 32 Florida counties. This increase in enrollment resulted in an increase in faculty—from 6 to 7.

Interestingly, Florida State's new nationally known School of Music was born in 1902, as a department with two teachers. A year later, a library was added with authorization to spend \$3,500 for books.

By 1903 the College had a glee club, dramatic club, baseball team and football team which played an inter-collegiate schedule.

In 1905, the legislature passed the Buckman Act which replaced a multiplicity of small state schools with a university for men and a college for women under the management of a special Board of Control.

In the act, the women's school was designated the Florida Female College, a name which was distasteful to many friends of the school. After 1909, the name was changed to Florida State College for Women, a name it retained until 1947 when it became Florida State University.

In the years since, the University has experienced a four-fold increase in its student enrollment and a rapid expansion of its graduate programs of research and study.

Florida State University's progress, since it became coeducational in 1947, has been termed by some educators as "a modern miracle." The University did not award a doctoral degree until 1952. In the past few years it has reached the high level of distinction accorded only to those two dozen public institutions in this country which produce more than one hundred Doctor of Philosophy degree graduates each year. At the end of the 1970-71 year, the University had awarded a total of 2,082 doctoral degrees.

The academic organization of the University offers courses of study leading to the baccalaureate degree in 96 fields of study; to the master's degree, in 87 fields; and to the doctorate, in 58 fields of study.

As one of the three oldest universities and the second largest university in the State System, Florida State University has been designated by the Board of Regents for continuing leadership at the graduate levels of education. In 1947, there was practically no graduate program; ten years later there were 888 students working toward graduate degrees. This number of graduate students had increased in 1971 to 3,515.

Twenty years ago the University had practically no support in contract and grant funds. Today the University receives some \$15 million each year from local, state, and national agencies, foundations, and industries. Nearly all academic divisions of the University are actively engaged in graduate research and graduate degree programs, with a majority of the research being conducted within the separate schools and colleges under the supervision and coordination of the University's Director for Research and Graduate Dean.

In addition to research conducted in the various academic divisions of the University, a number of facilities and institutes are devoted to specific research interests. Additional University faculty engage in research in the field of education and in many areas of the fine arts-from language and literature to music and drama.
