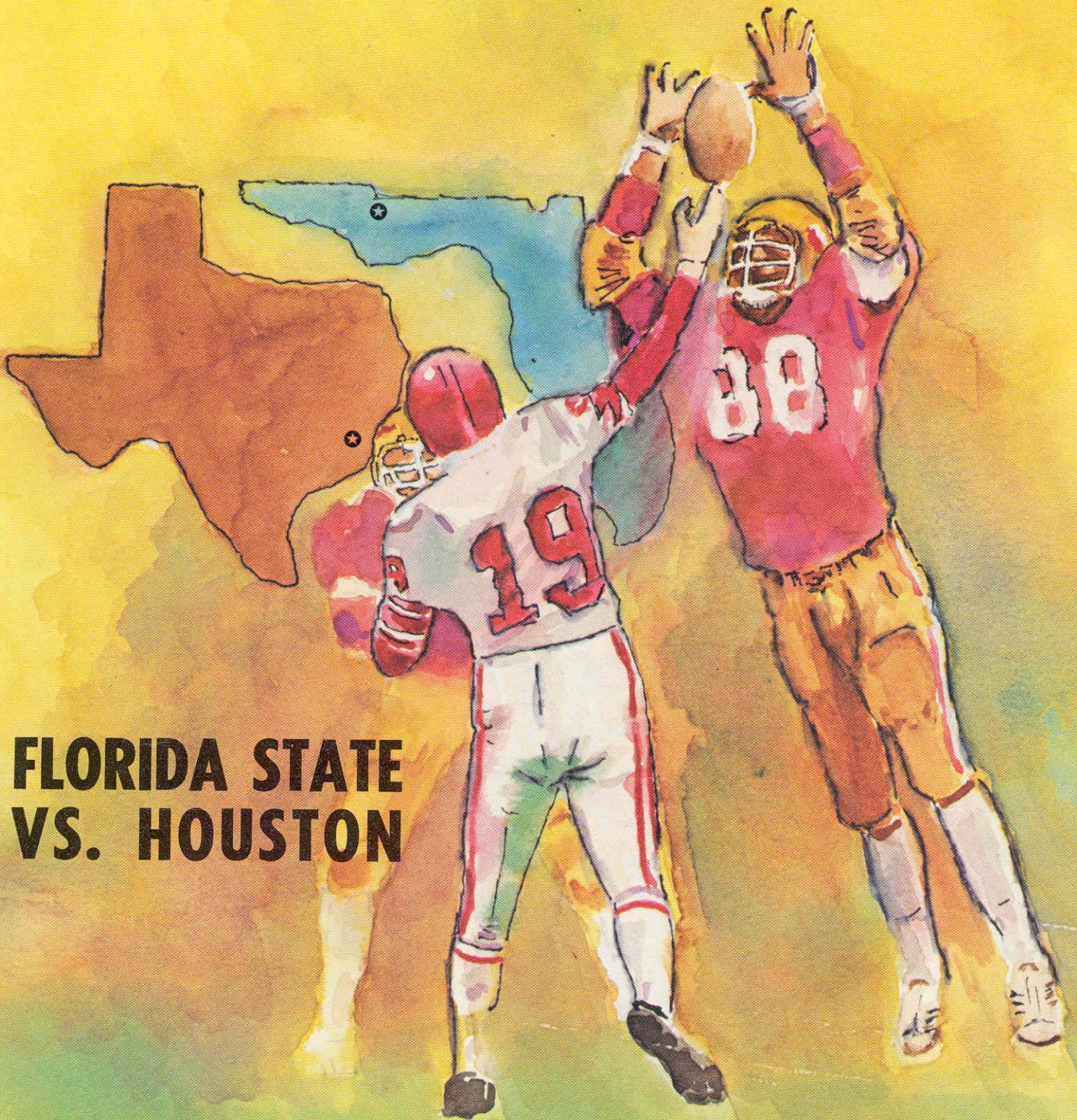

THE SEMINOLES vs. THE COUGARS

Still in the dark after their third consecutive victory of 1978, Florida State nationally-ranked Seminoles may find out just how good they are tonight when they host Southwest Conference foe Houston.

For the last two weekends Florida State has come away with victories and then spent the next several days wondering how. Last Saturday's regionally televised 31-21 victory was no exception.

The Seminoles' high-powered offense struggled throughout the day and in the end it was the seven Miami turnovers that made the difference in the contest.

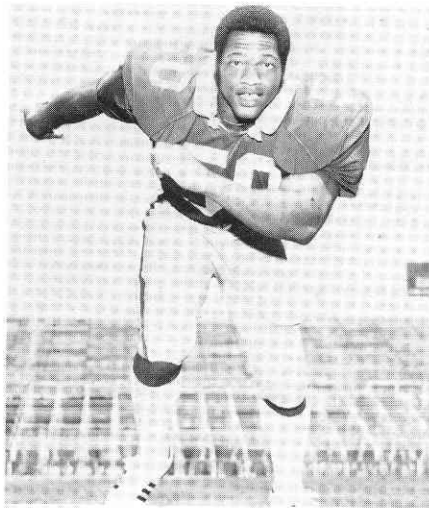
Nevertheless it was Florida State's 16th victory in the last 18 outings and raised the Seminoles' 1978 report card to 3-0. That streak will undergo a severe test when coach Bill Yeoman brings his Houston Cougars into Campbell Stadium.

Getting off to a shaky start this year Houston dropped its opener by a 17-3 count to Memphis State. But the famed veer offense had little trouble rolling up the points last weekend when the Cougars swamped Utah 42-25 in the Astrodome. In that game Houston rolled up 534 yards in total offense.

Houston quarterback Danny Davis completed 10 of 18 passes for 199 yards while running back Emmett King led all rushers with 141 yards in 10 carries. Davis who ranked among the nation's best in total offense probably improved on that standing with 256 yards in 33 attempts against Utah.

Florida State also ranks among the nation's leaders in total offense even though the Hurricanes baffled the Tribe last Saturday and handcuffed them with only 263 total yards. FSU is averaging 418.7 yards a game.

"It's hard to figure how a team can have a day like we did offensively and still put 31 points on the board," said head coach Bobby Bowden. "It makes you wonder what might happen if we can start putting something together like I know we can."

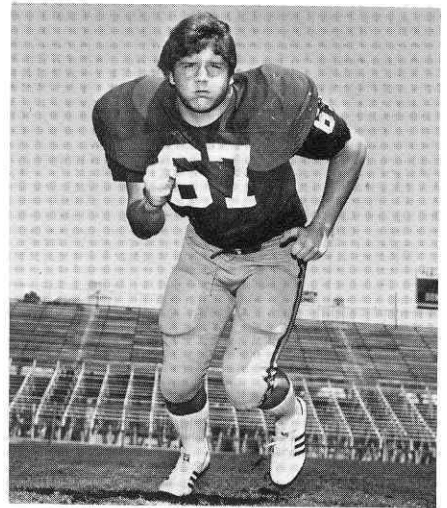


Nose guard Ron Simmons was selected Defensive Player of the Game by ABC against Miami after making 11 tackles, blocking a punt and recovering a fumble.

Quarterback Jimmy Jordan, who shared the signal calling chores against Miami with Wally Woodham, has completed 40 of 64 passes for 496 yards to date. Meanwhile, Woodham has been successful on 15 of 26 tosses for 188 yards.

Jackie Flowers has emerged as the Seminoles' leading pass catcher with 12 receptions for 183 yards but he has two running backs close on his tail. Tailback Homes Johnson has proven himself not only as a runner but as a receiver by snatching 11 passes for 113 yards. Rugged Mark Lyles has hauled in 10 for 107 yards.

Johnson, who has started all three games for the injured Greg Ramsey,



Mark Macek, a reserve playing on the punt return team, picked up Ron Simmons' blocked punt and galloped 48 yards for a touchdown against Miami last week.

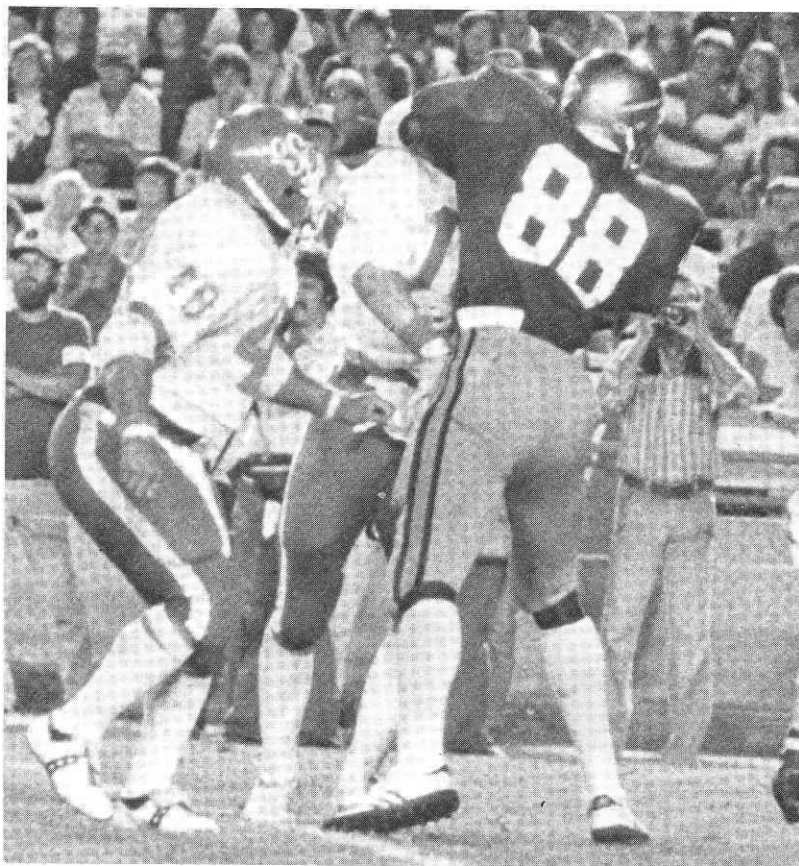
leads all rushers with 303 yards in 62 attempts.

Defensively things are somewhat of a mystery as well for Florida State. The Seminoles got an excellent game out of nose guard Ron Simmons, who was tabbed the Defensive Player of the Game by ABC after making 11 tackles, blocking a punt and recovering a fumble. But still FSU's defense yielded over 300 yards for the second week in a row.

Houston holds a commanding 11-2-2 lead in the series which dates back to the 1960 season when the Cougars took a 7-6 victory in Tallahassee. In the last meeting of the two schools, Florida State fell behind in the first period but salvaged a 33-22 victory in 1975.

"Willie can play with any of 'em"

When Willie Jones arrived on the campus of Florida State University in 1975 they gave him a garnet jersey with a big 88 on it and told him to go out and do his thing every Saturday. That was all that need be said.

It's now four years since this gentle giant arrived in Tallahassee and he's still doing his thing and he's doing it better than ever. You see, Willie Jones isn't just getting older—he's getting better. And that in itself is an achievement because there are many who feel that he's already the best at what he does.

"Yes, I think that Willie Jones could be the best defensive end in college football," says Bobby Bowden who isn't prone to exaggerate. "I coached Ross Browner and Art Still last season in the Japan Bowl and everybody knows the kind of players those guys are. There's no question in my mind that Willie can play with any of 'em."

Jones is a bona fide All-American candidate on this year's Seminole squad—a team with a surprising lack of indi-

vidualism. He's not your typical AA candidate, though. He says he doesn't feel like one. He says he feels like just another cog in a well-oiled machine. That may be true, but without him it's a sure bet that the machine would grind to a halt.

Like most defensive ends, Willie has an obsession with chasing and sacking quarterbacks. In fact, he'd almost rather have a clean shot at the opposing quarterback than eat. And for a guy who goes 6-4 and 228 pounds that's quite a statement.

"That's a big part of playing defensive end," said the personable 22-year-old who's a cinch to be one of pro football's top draft choices after the collegiate season. "I love to play football and playing defense means going after the guy with the ball. I don't have anything personal against quarterbacks, it's just that they have the ball more than anybody else."

Jones seems to be cut out of the same mold of all great defensive ends. He's quick—perhaps quicker than most that

play the position. That's one key to his success. He's also strong and you have to be at that spot. You generally spend an entire game fighting off an offensive tackle who goes well over 250 pounds. It's always the ones that can combine strength with quickness that become great defensive ends.

Jones has been compared on many occasions to another Jones who plays the same position—one Ed "Too Tall" Jones. A teammate once mentioned that he should be called Willie "Just Right" Jones. "To heck with being too tall," said the teammate. "Willie's just the right size."

When Willie first came to Florida State he underwent a baptism of fire. He was thrown into the starting lineup immediately. Inexperience was his main obstacle in the early going. That along with a great deal of apathy toward Florida State football. When Willie played his first collegiate game it was with a team that had won but one game

in two years prior to his arrival. You might say that Willie had a great deal of weight on his shoulders in 1975. He thinks that early load made him a better man.

"I made so many mistakes that first year that you wouldn't believe it," he said. "But if there's one thing you learn in college football it's the fact that experience is everything. The more you play the better you become. I think I learned more that first year at FSU than I had in my entire life of football before.

"Of course my first year I played for coach (Darrell) Mudra and then when coach Bowden came before my second year I really felt I'd have to prove myself all over again," Jones confided. "But I knew that I had a couple of things in my favor. I had a year of experience, plus I was still young enough to help build the kind of program that coach Bowden wanted."

But today Bowden admits that Willie really didn't have to prove anything. "All I had to do was to look at the films and I knew we had a player in Jones," he said. "He still had a lot to learn my first year here, too. Sometimes he'd forget what we were doing out there and start playing his own defense. Of course that wasn't too bad because a lot of times his way worked better than ours," he joked.

One big plus in Willie's career at Florida State is the fact that he's worked the past three years opposite Scott Warren. A standout defensive end himself, Warren has prevented opponents from continuously running away from Jones.

"Scott is a great player and a great friend," said Jones. "I think we work well together. We help each other a lot and I think that's important. It's hard to do a good job at defensive end without a quality player on the other side."

Jones is a highly sensitive person who takes a great deal of pride in his work. That goes the same on and off the field. Willie is a speech communication major at Florida State with a respectable

grade point average. He takes pride in his school work just like his football career.

Jones is not the type to solicit a lot of attention. "I have enough confidence in myself to think that I can play as well as anybody," he said. "But I don't believe in telling the world about it. I've always thought that you should let your play speak for itself."

Jones is deeply serious in that thought. As the Seminoles prepared to play at Miami last week — his old stomping grounds — Willie felt it would be best if he kept a low profile. "A lot of reporters wanted to talk with me about going home to play," explained the Homestead native. "But I just haven't felt like I've played well this season yet and I want to wait until I really have something to talk about. There are a lot of other guys on the team that deserve the exposure right now before me."

Part of Jones' problem this season has been a nagging injury to his right wrist.

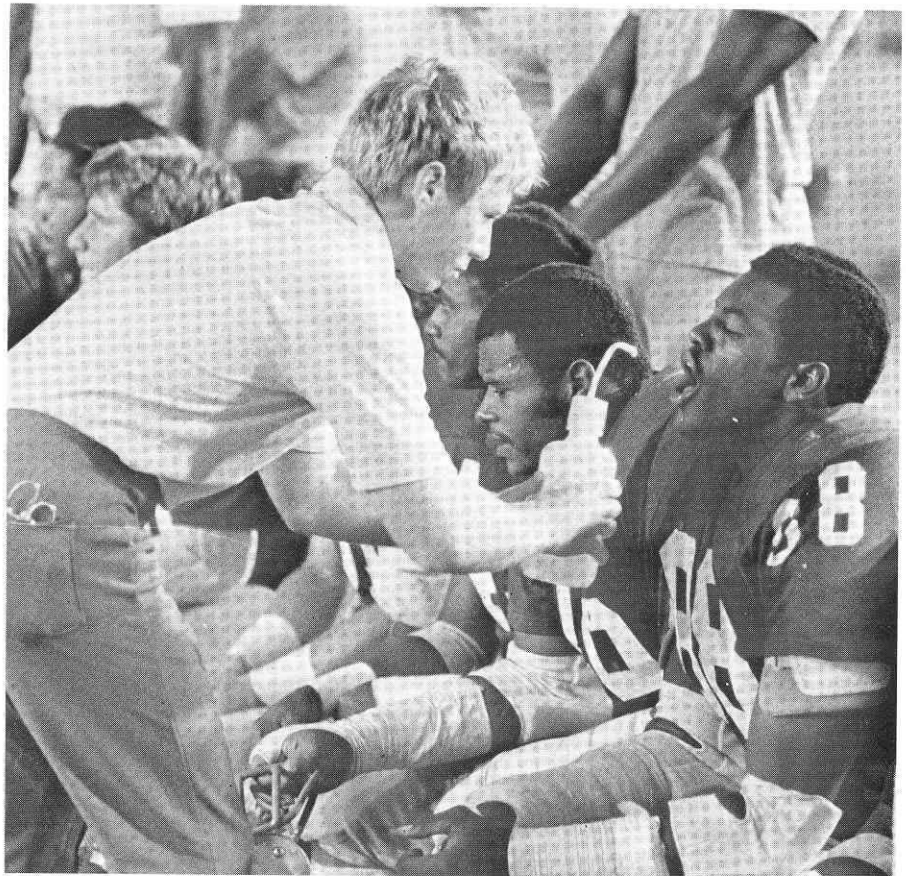
He suffered a dislocation of the wrist in the season-opener at Syracuse and ever since has played with a cast.

"He's done just about everything we've asked of him," said coach Jim Gladden, who handles the defensive ends. "It's not easy to do anything with a cast on your arm much less play football. He's had some troubles at times but we're not concerned about him coming through when we need it. He's an exceptional athlete. But more than that he's a winner.

That may be the best description of Willie Jones. When you talk about the Florida State rise from the outhouse to the penthouse you can put Willie's name at the top of the list. And that resurgence is more important to him than any individual honor.

"The thing that I will remember most of all are the things we have accomplished here as a team," he said. "That's where my real satisfaction lies. I enjoy knowing that I had a part in this thing."

Catching quarterbacks can be rough business even for Jones who takes a breather along the sideline.

Since his arrival on the Florida State campus in January, 1976, Bobby Bowden has turned the Seminole grid program from shambles to one of the rising stars on the collegiate scene. After FSU went 4-29 in three previous campaigns, Bowden has guided the Seminoles to marks of 5-6 and 10-2.

That 10-2 ledger included: (1) a 9-2 regular season record; (2) an invitation to the Tangerine Bowl where the Seminoles smothered Texas Tech, 40-17; (3) national ranking in both the United Press International (11th) and Associated Press (14th) wire service polls.

Naturally, the credit for the successes goes to Bowden. He, however, downplays his responsibility.

"The desires of the players to right a wrong they were not happy with is the reason for our winning," says Bowden. "They were not happy with what they were doing previously.

"We also won because of the diligent work of our assistant coaches. Too much of the credit has gone to me when it has been the assistants, trainers, doctors and managers as well as a Florida State administration who have all been part of our success."

If you know Bobby Bowden, that is a typical statement.

Nobody, however, should really be surprised that Bowden has put the Seminole program back on the winning track.

Enthusiasm and discipline are key words which exemplify Bowden's overall attitude, both on and off the field.

"I believe in discipline and enthusiasm in everything you do in life," Bowden says, "and you coach what you believe. If we can be enthusiastic in the little things we do, it will carry over to a winning season.

"But don't get me wrong about discipline. I believe in letting the players know who is boss, and I believe in some sacrifice and devotion. But discipline can only go so far.

"Heck, I've always said that if short hair and perfect manners won football games, the Army-Navy game would be played every year for the national championship."

Bowden's coaching philosophy is quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is secondary; blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Winning means a lot to Bowden, an avid golfer, who since moving to Tallahassee has improved his game to the

point where he now consistently shoots in the low 80s.

"I don't believe in playing without a scoreboard," says Bowden. "I don't feel there is any accomplishment with a tie. I think if one of my teams was playing Notre Dame for the national title and I had the choice of winning or losing or going for the tie, I would go for the win."

National championship was not a term mentioned with a whole lot of frequency at Florida State until the last few months. Bowden explains it cautiously.

"A national championship is the ultimate in coaching, but I must be realistic," says Bowden. "Every year we set new goals with our team. Last season our first objective was landing a spot in the top 20. Then we wanted a bowl bid.

"Now after getting past those goals we can begin worrying about the Top 10. We need a consistent winning record so that we can be a legitimate contender each year for national honors."

Bowden is more than just a football coach. He is also a deeply religious individual who, when he's not on the road recruiting, can often be found at a church podium in Tallahassee or one of the surrounding communities on Sunday mornings.

"I don't preach," Bowden says. "I'm not qualified to preach. I like to share my experiences with God, though, especially with young people.

"God is an integral part of my life. I look to God for guidance but firmly believe God helps those who help themselves. Man must help himself, but also seek guidance.

"Coaching, in a way, has many of the same traits as evangelism. You attempt to make your point, relay your beliefs and encourage your audience to take part in all this. Football or religion, it's much the same."

In addition to his head coaching po-

sitions at South Georgia Junior College, Howard and West Virginia, Bowden served as an assistant at Howard, Florida State and West Virginia. He was assistant football coach and head track coach at Howard for two seasons in 1954-55. From 1955-58, he was athletic director and head football coach at South Georgia Junior College. His teams won 22 of 33 games and captured three state titles during that period.

In 1959, he returned to Howard and in four seasons his teams built a 31-6 record. Among the accomplishments were two bowl appearances and several Little All-Americans.

Bowden was tapped by Florida State head coach Bill Peterson to coach the Seminole offensive ends in 1963. It was off to West Virginia in 1966 as the

offensive chief for the Mountaineers. Bowden was named head coach at West Virginia in 1970. His first team finished with an 8-3 mark, breaking 19 school records. The 1971 team was 7-4 and the 1972 squad finished 8-3 and earned a Peach Bowl invitation. In '73 and '74 the records fell to 6-6 and 4-7, but in 1975 the Mountaineers rebounded to an 8-3 record and added an upset win over North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl.

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham and was a Little All-America quarterback at Howard College. He holds a bachelor's degree from Howard and a master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock and they have six children.

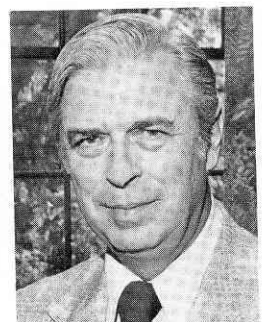
SEMINOLE FOOTBALL NETWORK

Howser Returns to FSU

Dick Howser, Florida State's first All-American baseball player and current third base coach of the world champion New York Yankees, will be the new head baseball coach at his alma mater.

The move, which will be effective at the close of the Yankees' current season, was announced Sept. 20 by Florida State and the Yankees.

Howser, 42, has spent the last 18 years at the major league level — eight as a player and 10 as a coach with the Yankees. He played in 789 major league games with the Kansas City A's, Cleveland Indians and the Yankees. During his career he played in the 1961 All-Star game for the American League.

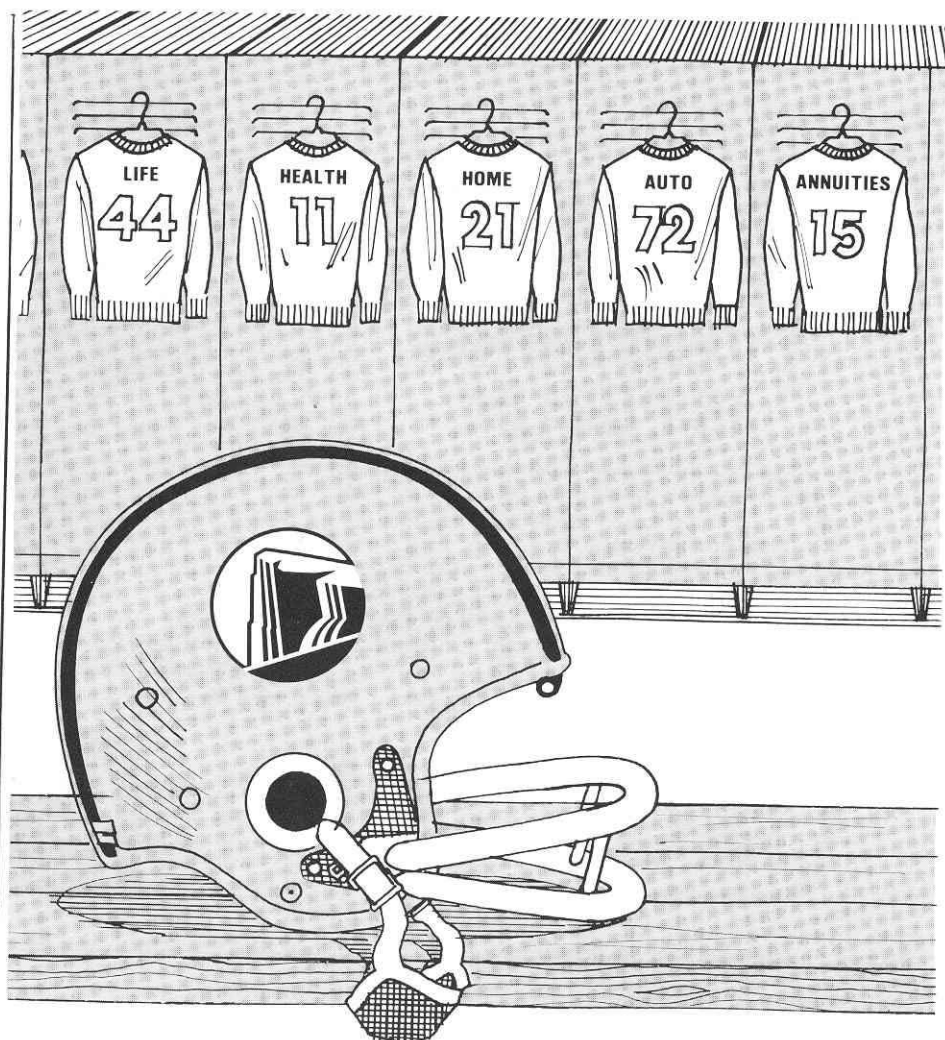
In 1969, Howser, a Seminole football fan who has aided the grid staff in recruiting, became the Yankees' third base coach and has held that position through four different managers.

He becomes the seventh baseball coach at Florida State since the program began in 1948. He succeeds another ex-major leaguer and FSU graduate, Woody Woodward, who recently accepted the position of field coordinator for the Cincinnati Reds.

Howser inherits a program that had a 44-16 record last season, finished second in the Metro Conference championship and received a berth into the NCAA Regionals.

The pastoral quiet of east Buck Lake Road was suddenly broken with the loud reports of gunfire, savage yahoos and the hoofbeats of a galloping horse.

Kathi (Mrs. Dean) Chenoweth laughed as she told of wondering what the neighbors thought the week before the FSU-Oklahoma State game when all activity at their home was frantically directed at getting Renegade ready to ride.

Renegade, of course, is the Seminoles' new mascot — the bay Appaloosa horse that Jim Kidder, dressed like an Indian warrior, rides onto the field ahead of the team.

Two weeks before that game, Renegade was still just a dream—mostly to Seminole Booster Bill Durham, Coach Bobby Bowden's wife, Ann, and Kathi Chenoweth — who spent her summer going to horse shows, looking for just the horse that would raise the "Saturday Night Fever" even higher.

She buttonholed everybody who might have a lead, including Commissioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner; and it was his son, Doyle Jr., who finally made the contact for her with Renegade's owner, Dr. Jerry DeLoney, a Tallahassee veterinarian. Dr. DeLoney and his family are all Seminole fans so they agreed to lend their horse to serve as a mascot — with the understanding that, if all goes well, he becomes the property of Florida State.

The call came the morning of the Syracuse game—they had a horse! Jim Kidder, the rider, had tried out for the job and been chosen last spring. He's a junior criminology major from Pompano Beach, who's been riding horses since he was six years old.

The lanky 20-year-old looked with dismay at the first authentic Seminole outfit provided him because it was literally a blue cotton dress, though indeed a man's costume.

"They literally took the shirt off my back," she recalls good-naturedly. It was Kathi's birthday and she was dressed in a brightly striped gown, ready to go out for dinner.

By the time Jim led the football team onto the field in Campbell Stadium, her dress had been cut up and turned into an outfit for an Indian brave. Meanwhile, a real Seminole outfit is being provided for the rider by Chief Howard Tommie of the Seminole Indian Tribe of Florida.

Durham found an Indian headdress with garnet and gold feathers and he made the spear, as well as researching

and applying Jim's make-up and working out all the technical aspects. The Chenoweth teenagers — Dean Jr., 17, and Kelli, 15, volunteered to be handlers for the horse and two experienced cowboys, Sam Booth and Dennis Bradley, joined them. Sam's wife, Carol, completes the handling team.

One afternoon the five of them, accompanied by Kathi and Jim, fanned out all over Tallahassee to locate garnet and gold outfits for the handling team. "So they'd look professional," Kathi says. They bought their own dark red corduroys and Andy Miller of the Seminole Boosters donated their shirts.

Everybody got caught up in the enthusiasm. The Chenoweth kids couldn't bear for Renegade to "look tacky," so they went shopping for a garnet and gold lead rope and halter — but Betty Fuller had the fever, too, so she donated it. who donated a trailer to transport the horse.

Renegade spent the last week before the game listening to the FSU "Fight Song." His handlers set up a tape player right next to his stall and played it at full volume, to be sure the sound of the Marching Chiefs didn't spook him when he got to the stadium.

Dress-rehearsal came on Friday night before the Oklahoma State game. Kathi and the handling team, Durham and Ann Bowden lined up on either side of the spacious Chenoweth back yard, burning torches and screaming cheers while Jim rode Renegade up and down between them, yelling his war whoops.

Renegade never turned a hair. He was already a winning Seminole, but by game time, Kathi and Dean, who are keeping the horse for the team, knew it's not easy being houseparents for a Seminole war horse! Worth it—but definitely not easy!

Saturday, September 30, 7 P.M.

THE TEAMS: Florida State has worked its way to 3-0 with victories over Syracuse (28-0), Oklahoma State (38-20) and Miami (Fla.) (31-21). Houston lost its opener to Memphis State (17-3) before beating Utah (42-25) last week.

THE COACHES: Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden (Samford '52) now has a 91-40 career coaching mark, including an 18-8 ledger in two seasons plus three games with the Seminoles. The 1977 Southern Independent and Churchmen's Coach of the Year had previous coaching stints at Samford and West Virginia before accepting the Seminole post in January '76.

Bill Yeoman (Army '49) is one of 11 active coaches at the Division I-A level to earn 100 victories. His overall 105-61-6 record carries with it a .628 winning percentage and 14th place on the list of winningest active major college coaches. Since using the Veer offense for the first full season in 1966, Cougar teams have averaged almost 440 yards per game total offense.

THE CAPTAINS: Representing Florida State at the coin toss will be defensive end Willie Jones and offensive tackle Nate Henderson. Houston captains will be quarterback Danny Davis and linebacker David Hodge. Florida State tri-captain Ivory Joe Hunter (broken leg) and Houston tri-captain Jim Wells (knee) will miss the game.

THE OFFICIALS: Officials for tonight's intersectional clash have been assigned by the Southern Independent Officials Association and Southwestern Conference.
REFEREE--Tommy Miller (Jonesboro, Tn.); **UMPIRE**--Bob Knowles (Waco, Tex.); **LINESMAN**--Hunter Jackson (Johnson City, Tn.); **LINE JUDGE**--Charles Boles (Hurst, Tx.); **FIELD JUDGE**--Wilson Gosier (Decatur, Ga.); **BACK JUDGE**--Harry Hicks (Beaumont, Tx.).

THE SERIES: Houston has a commanding 11-2-2 series advantage. The first game was played during the 1960 season when the Cougars took a 7-6 verdict in Tallahassee. FSU has played seven games, resulting in five losses and two ties, before it won its first Houston game, 40-20, in 1968. Houston then won another six straight before the Seminoles won at Houston, 33-22, in 1975.

NEVER IN TALLY FOR NOLES: Florida State and Houston have played six previous games in Tallahassee, but the Seminoles are still seeking their first win here. The Seminoles and Cougars did play to a 16-16 standoff at Doak Campbell in 1965.

PLENTY OF OFFENSE: Florida State and Houston both have displayed potent offenses in their previous games. According to the latest statistics released by the NCAA, the Cougars are currently fifth in total offense at 449 yards per game and Florida State ranks eighth at 425.3. Houston with 277.5 yards per game is 10th in rushing offense while Florida State at 228 ranks ninth in passing offense and its 32.3 points per game is 10th for scoring offense.

"We had a TD called back on that dad gum holding penalty...that should never happen at ~~home~~ home and the receiver was open on that interception at the one.

"I'm proud of the kids they could have quit.

"This was two different ball games--them in the first half and us in the second. We just didn't score as many points in the ~~second~~ second as they did in the first.

"That veer is tough to defense when you don't run it yourself. Nobody runs it better than Houston. They have a great offense. Bill is a master at it.

"I got a feeling they whipped us on the line of scrimmage in the first half. They have to stop themselves with that offense. They didn't fumble enough to lose.

"At the half we told our kids that if they could stop Houston we could win. And we had the chances--the penalty and interception stopped us.

"After the game I told the kids I was proud of them. Our play in the first half was probably due to poor preparation on my part

Wally Woodham:

"When we got behind, we just stuck to our game plan." We knew we had to establish our running game if we were going to win it."

"The offensive line gave me great protection." The team showed a lot of character tonight. We just fell short."

"This game gives me a lot of personal confidence." I still wasn't really happy. My job was to bring the team back and win and I didn't."

Francis Donasorte:

Other teams run the veer well, but they are the masters."

We knew they could score points, but we were shocked when they scored their first four possessions."

"It's the makeup of our team to comeback. Some teams would play dead down 21-0, but we fought back. This game will only make us work harder."

Willie Jones:

"Down 21-0, we had to start from the beginning. We got too far behind and just ~~couldn't~~ couldn't come back."

"We made some mistakes like that holding (negating Flowers TD) that really hard us."

"In the second half we decided to stop running stunts. We went back to the basic defense and fought our way close."

Jackie Flowers:

I thought we had won the game when I made that catch.

The difference in the first and second half was motivation. In the second half we were able to come back.

We had the game a few times, but we just weren't able to capitalize.

We've got to learn from this loss. Even though we were able to come back, the game wasn't worth it because we lost."
