

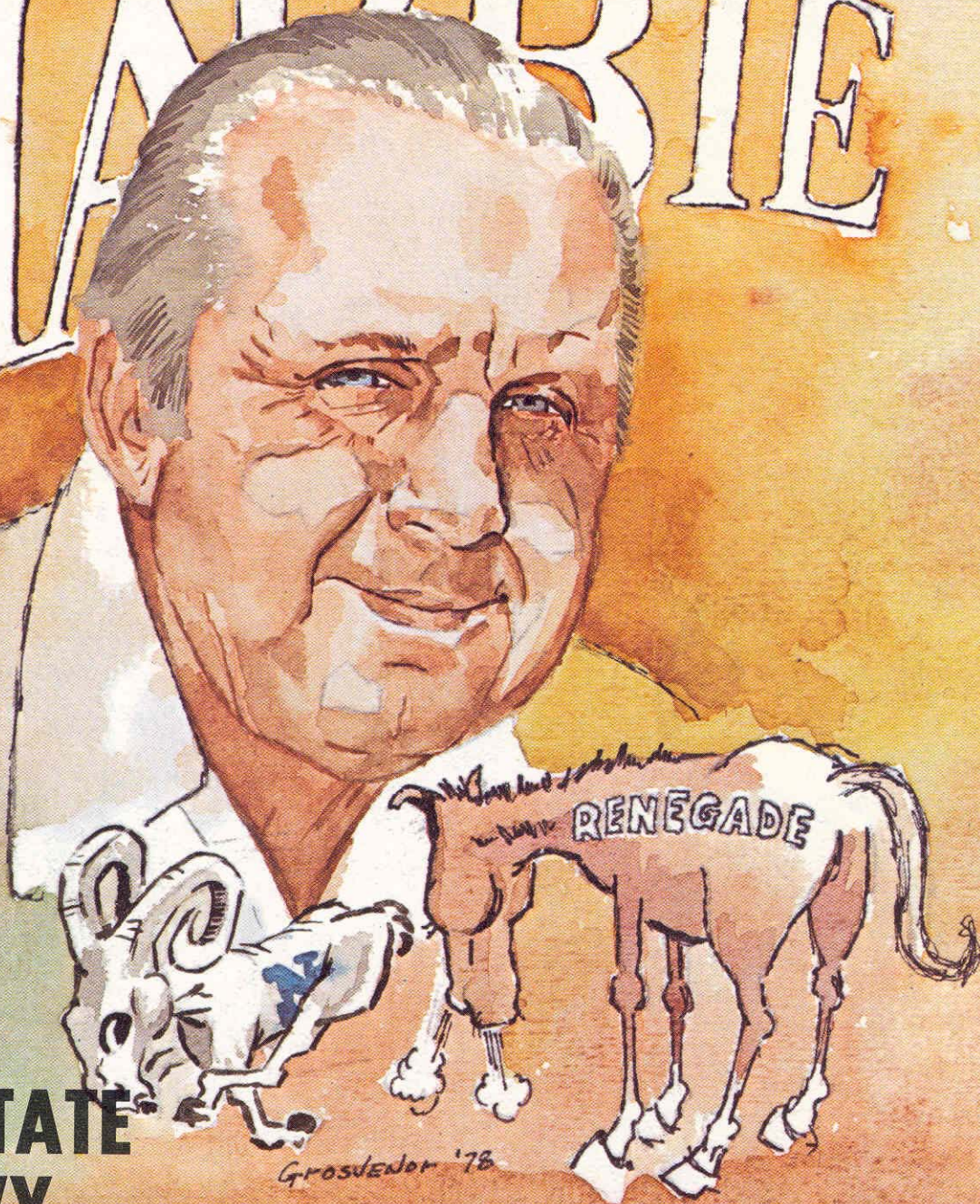

THE SEMINOLES vs. THE MIDSHIPMEN

In a premier battle of major independents, Florida State celebrates its Homecoming weekend by hosting the surprising Midshipmen.

The Seminoles are 6-3 after defeating Virginia Tech 24-14 last weekend and desperately in need of a victory to keep their bowl hopes alive. The Middies are 7-2 but have suffered back-to-back losses and their bowl chances may hang in the balance as well.

The game is so attractive ABC will be televising the contest as part of their regional doubleheader thus forcing the starting time to be advanced to the afternoon. Florida State and Navy will each receive a \$200,500 paycheck for the TV appearance.

"It should be a great football game," said FSU coach Bobby Bowden of the Seminoles' 13th appearance on network television. "Both teams have a lot at stake. It should be one of the better college football matchups of the season."

Bowden's comments came shortly after Florida State picked up its seventh victory by downing Virginia Tech. Sophomore tailback Homes Johnson dashed for 152 yards to lead the Seminoles to a come-from-behind win.

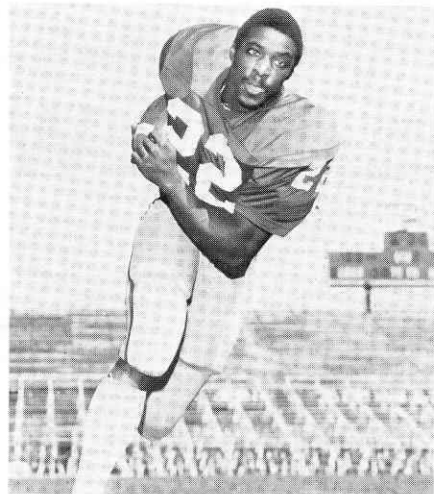
Johnson, now with two 100-yard plus games under his belt, has amassed 706 yards of 149 rushes to lead FSU in that department. Fullback Mark Lyles, who scored twice from the one yard line against the Gobblers, is the second leading rusher with 509 yards.

Wally Woodham has had the hot hand at quarterback the last few games and has drawn most of the playing time. Woodham has completed 77 of 134 passes for 1,073 yards and eight touchdowns. He completed 17 of 29 for 198 yards in the win over Virginia Tech.

Jimmy Jordan remains in the thick of things, however. The junior quarterback has successfully completed 97 of 169 tosses for 1,132 yards and 10 TDs.

Wide receiver Jackie Flowers has been the favorite target for both Woodham and Jordan this season and ranks among the top pass catchers in the nation. He has hauled in 43 passes for 757 yards and seven scores. His availability for tonight's game is questionable after sustaining a knee injury in the Virginia Tech contest.

Bowden has also been pleased with the improvement of the Seminoles' offensive line. "Some holes opened up so big along the line of scrimmage that even the coaches might have been able to gain some yardage," he said.



Homes Johnson rushed for 152 yards last week against Virginia Tech which earned him his second 100 yard game of the season. Johnson has gained 706 yards this fall including a 135 yard effort at Syracuse.

Bowden has also indicated that FSU has tried to establish a strong running game the last few weeks because that is what the opposing defenses "were giving us."

Nose guard Ron Simmons and end Willie Jones continued to pace the Seminole defensive unit.

Navy, after opening with seven consecutive wins, has stumbled the last two weeks by losing to Notre Dame 27-7 and Syracuse 20-17. To make matters worse, the Midshipmen have lost two starters—fullback Lawrence Klawinski and split end Phil McConkey — who were injured in the Syracuse defeat.

Navy fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter last Saturday but battled back to tie the Orangemen 17-17 before Dave Jacobs kicked a 30-yard field goal with 2:48 remaining to give Syracuse the up-

set victory.

The Middies lost Klakinski early in the game forcing Navy to go to the air as quarterback Bob Leszczynski passed for 269 yards. But Leszczynski was without McConkey, their leading receiver, who sustained a knee injury and will be out the remainder of the season.

Leszczynski had tossed eight scoring passes by completing 68 of 145 aerals.

Coach George Welsh's leading rusher, Steve Callahan, missed the Syracuse game with a leg injury but will return for tonight's matchup. Callahan has gained 694 yards on 160 attempts and scored five touchdowns.

This will be the first meeting between Navy and Florida State. In fact, it will be the first time the Seminoles have played one of the military academies in football.

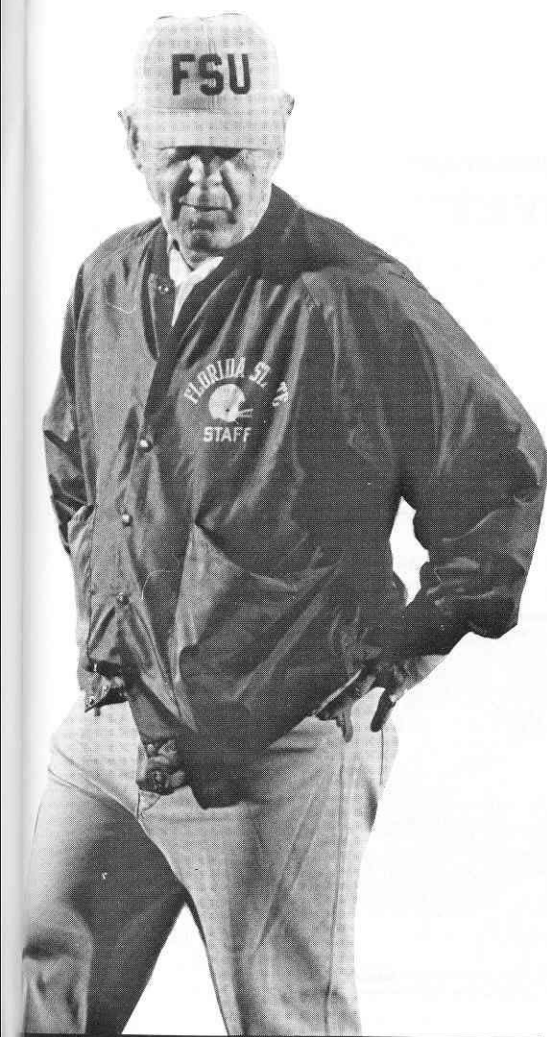

30 Years As A Seminole

**Bob Harbison Has Spent Three Decades At FSU,
Seeing Many Players, Coaches Come And Go**

When that inevitable day arrives and Bob Harbison knocks on the door of the Pearly Gates, St. Peter will greet the old coach warmly and take him to Heaven's Garnet and Gold Room.

Harbie will want to know whether he's expected to coach the offensive or defensive lines or, perhaps, to go out and recruit some of the best prospects.

In football, Bob Harbison can do it all—and do it well.

He is Garnet and Gold personified.

He is a legend in his own time at Florida State University.

Loyalty is his middle name.

He is more of a fixture in Seminole football than Doak Campbell Stadium itself. Ex-Hoosier Harbison was here first.

When the Florida State Seminoles battle the rival Florida Gators at Doak Campbell next Saturday, Bob Harbison will have completed his 30th season as a Seminole assistant coach.

Three decades in any field is an accomplishment. In football it is unsurpassed.

Harbie has outlasted six head coaches—Don Veller the man who hired him in 1948, Tom Nugent, Perry Moss, Bill Peterson, Larry Jones and Darrell Mudra.

Harbison was out of football for two seasons, but Mudra appointed him to his staff in 1974 and when Bobby Bowden left West Virginia in 1976 to succeed Mudra, there was no question but that Harbie would be a valued member of his staff.

"Why has he stayed on and on here?" Bowden asked. "Because he minds his own business and he is loyal. He doesn't irritate people.

"He's about as knowledgeable on football as any coach I've known, especially on the little things.

"He can head the offense and he can head the defense or anything else. He is that knowledgeable. He handles our kicking game and he heads up our recruiting.

"The more he knows you the more he'll talk with you. He is not one to grab the microphone, though.

"Of all the coaches who ever worked with him or been around Bob, I never saw one who didn't love him.

"Steve Sloan. Don James. All of them who went on from here to become head

coaches. They all come back to Bob. And, I feel the same way about him."

Sloan, now the head coach at Mississippi following successful head-coaching stints at Vanderbilt and Texas Tech, is an opposite from Harbison in many characteristics, but he and Harbison have been the closest of friends since the day Sloan came to Florida State to coach the quarterbacks under Jones in 1971.

Often, Sloan will telephone Harbison for coaching advice.

"He is one of my dearest friends," Sloan said from Oxford, Miss.

"I came to Florida State in 1971 to coach the quarterbacks and he was coaching the line. We became good friends. I call him to keep in close touch.

"He is real knowledgeable about people. He has an insight into players and why they will play to their maximum.

"He doesn't speak in long sentences. But, he is real intense in the why's about things that people take for granted. The mysteries of the universe, I would say."

Harbie and Sloan built their friendship on the greens, tees and fairways of the beautiful Killearn Country Club.

"He studies golf," Sloan laughed. "He reads all the golf books and everything Ben Hogan said about the game, then he tries to put it into practice."

Don Fauls, the Seminoles' venerable trainer, said "he'll read something about golf and then he'll come in and tell us all about it. He saw where Tom Watson keeps his weight behind the ball. He tried it and found he could hit the ball farther.

"I think that he coaches the same way.

"Usually he talks in short sentences but sometimes he gets off on a subject and it's like he's been vaccinated with a phonograph needle.

"Mudra had the good sense to hire him back but some of the young guys on that staff didn't listen to him.

"But, Bobby Bowden knew. He gave him some responsibility. When he speaks, everybody listens. I don't know anybody in football who has more knowledge of the game than he has.

"He learned a long time ago that as long as you keep your drills in close quarters, you can work hard without getting boys hurt. I mean if you've got

offensive and defensive players blocking, he'll have them close, maybe a yard apart. Move them five yards apart and you increase the possibility of them getting hurt. This is why his guys were always prepared. He works them hard without hurting them. I remember that we discussed this maybe 20 years ago. Now he'll come to me and say, 'How do you like my drills?' They're working hard and don't realize it.

"He used to be a mean son of a gun. But, I think he's mellowed. Not only that, he's smarter now.

"He's really a comic. But, he has concern without showing it. He exudes confidence in the people around him. He has that great ability to grasp the situation then come up with a profound statement.

"You'll wonder, 'Where did he get that?' and when you analyze it, you'll see that he's right."

Surely, a man who has coached 30 years has the right, as Fauls mentioned, to mellow.

Vince Gibson, the head coach at Louisville, played under Harbison at Florida State, then coached with him.

"He is a super guy—a guy you really have to get to know," Gibson said.

"I thought he was awful rough on players in his younger days, but I never knew one who didn't like him. When I played for him, he worked the stew out of us. But he older he gets, it seems like he has more of a rapport with the players.

"He always comes up with something you remember. When I played there under Nugent, we were getting ready for a homecoming game and I remember he got up and said 'Football players play football on Homecoming'.

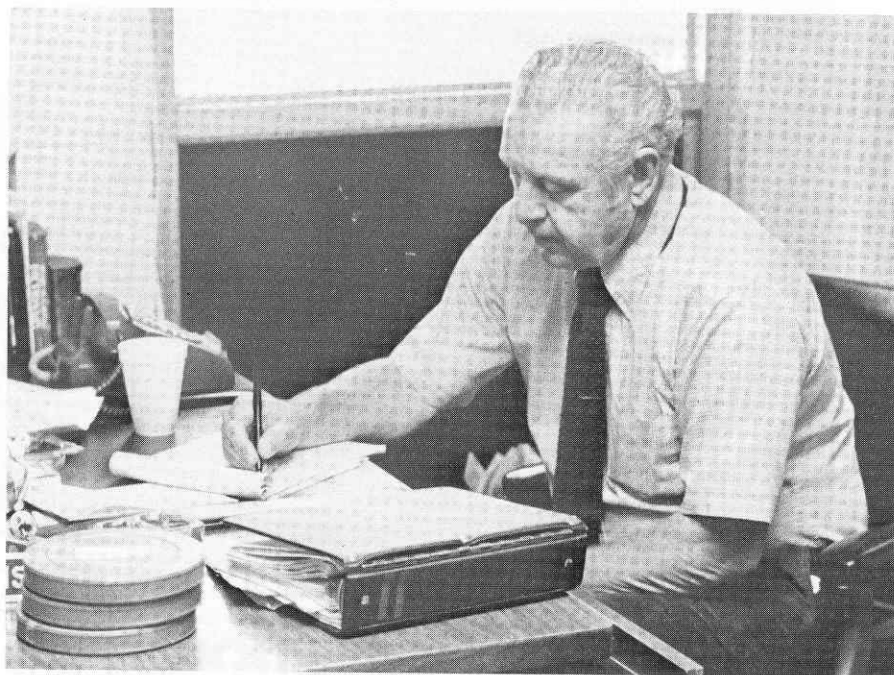
"I always thought about that, even to this day."

Joe Gibbs, the offensive coordinator for the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers, was a coaching associate at Florida State in 1967 and '68.

"I remember seeing him one day grab a player and just throw him," Gibbs said.

"I was a young coach only in my second year and I was a bit scared. I remember how nervous I was before a game one day and when I went up to the pressbox where he handled the telephones to the sideline, there was Harbison eating peanuts."

Gary Huff, Buccaneer quarterback who still holds five Florida State career passing records, said he remembers Harbison most for the attitude he instilled

in the offensive linemen toward the quarterback.

Peterson, under whom Harbison served for 11 seasons—including some of the greatest in FSU history—called Harbie "Eagle Eye."

He earned that nickname because of the precise scouting reports he turned in on opposing teams.

"What he presented, the kids respected," Coach Pete said.

"He headed our defense and did a great job. He knew personnel very well. He was an outstanding recruiter.

"Back then, we didn't have much choice and we had to take some gambles. But he was so good at seeing the little things in kids.

"I remember one we missed, though," and Pete laughed.

"Jack Youngblood lived at Monticello and I heard he wanted to come to Florida State real bad. But Harbie turned him down. I don't know, but I think he felt he was too slow."

Youngblood went on to prove that not even Bob Harbison's football judgment is infallible. He made All-American at Florida and is an All-Pro defensive end with the Los Angeles Rams.

But for every one like that, you could name a dozen Harbie did get.

He is proudest of having recruited the skinny-legged Ron Sellers, who went on to become the Seminoles' all-time great

pass receiver and to be named All-American.

It was Harbison who coached the great defensive lines of the mid-60's, including 1964's "Magnificent Seven".

Fauls estimates that "75 to 80 percent of the games he scouted for us, we won."

Harbie undoubtedly enjoyed some good luck.

Bill McGrotha, sports editor of The Tallahassee Democrat, recalls that Harbie took a pre-game stroll one morning in Blacksburg, Va., prior to a tough game with Virginia Tech. It was a windy day and, he said, Harbison noticed a piece of paper blowing across his path. Out of curiosity, he picked it up and discovered it to be part of the Gobblers' game plan. "It tipped off two or three facets of their defensive plans which helped the Seminoles to win," McGrotha said.

Lonnie Burt, former FSU sports information director, recalled that Harbison drew up the game plan nicknamed "guts" which was used to defeat Houston and its No. 1 offense in the nation, 40-20, in Jacksonville in 1967. The plan put defensive back Walt Sumner in man-to-man coverage on the Cougars' sensational tight end, Elmo Wright.

They also tell funny stories on Harbison.

Coaches Running Too

The running craze that has swept the nation has found its way to the Florida State football staff.

George Henshaw, who coaches the defensive interior line for Bobby Bowden, has become quite an accomplished runner. His daily road work varies between three and five miles over several routes around the FSU campus.

"I usually run after practice every day, sometimes with Gene McDowell (another assistant coach)," says the 30-year-old Henshaw. Occasionally, I'll run in one of the local races. It gives me something to look forward to."

Henshaw recently ran in a 5000 meter (3.1 miles) race along with approximately 1,000 other area runners. He finished 46th with a time of 17:17.

He planned to run in today's Turkey Trot, a 15,000 meter (9.3 miles) race run in conjunction with Homecoming festivities, but switching the game to the afternoon prevented it. "The most I have ever run is 12 miles," he says. "The Turkey Trot wouldn't have been for me because I'm able to pace myself."

Henshaw, who also oversees the Seminoles' conditioning program, is willing to lay his running abilities on the line against his much younger players. For two consecutive years he has outdistanced the entire FSU football squad in the annual preseason 12-minute run.

Married Seminoles

Five members of the Florida State varsity football team are married.

These players not only have to maintain their responsibilities as student-athletes but also serve as heads of their household. They are: OG Greg and Karen Futch, TB Greg and Barbara Ramsey, DT Arthur and Francine Scott, P Rohn and Ann Stark, and FB Wade and Danis Wallace.

Hunter, Piurowski Out

Defensive back Ivory Joe Hunter and linebacker Paul Piurowski will definitely not see further action this fall.

Hunter, who received a broken leg in the Oklahoma State game, hoped to return before the end of the season but team doctors said the bone had not healed properly.

The Tallahassee native, one of six

seniors on this year's squad, will be eligible for redshirting this season because the injury occurred in the second game of the campaign.

Piurowski was one of the Seminoles' leading tacklers before a knee injury in the Southern Mississippi game sidelined him for the season. He received two torn cartilages after a bruising tackle.

Offensive guard Lee Adams, who sustained a costly knee injury earlier in the season, is also on the injured list.

Junior Varsity 3-2

Florida State's junior varsity football team posted a 3-2 record this fall and the coaching staff was pleased with what they saw.

The Seminoles dropped their season opener to Marion Institute (30-9) then defeated Ft. Lauderdale (37-13), Louisiana State (37-26) and Ft. Benning (23-11). FSU fell to Auburn (35-20) to close out the season last Monday.

Freshmen running backs Kelly Burney and Michael Whiting proved they will be the FSU running backs of the future while tight end Sam Childers will find a spot on the varsity.

Lineman Robert Merson and linebackers Scott Redditt and Mark Sims were standouts on the defense.

Seminoles on ABC

Today's game marks the Seminoles' 13th appearance on ABC's College Football series since 1959.

FSU has won its last two regionally televised games — 37-9 over Florida in 1977 and 31-21 over Miami earlier this year — to give the Tribe a 6-5-1 record on ABC.

Of the 12 previous telecasts only two have originated in Tallahassee — 1968 against Florida and 1969 versus North Carolina State. As part of the new NCAA television contract with ABC, both Navy and Florida State will net \$200,500 from today's telecast.

Also, because the Seminoles are appearing on their second network telecast of the season, next week's originally scheduled TV game with Florida will not be aired live on the four-station state network.

Burt remembers a 1966 flight via Mackie Airlines to Syracuse.

"I don't think Harbie cared for flying anyway," Burt said. "He covered it up by reading. For some reason, the engines all stopped momentarily. Whoever was sitting next to Harbie noticed that when he resumed reading his book, it was upside down but he continued to read on as if he was undisturbed."

Peterson said he heard that Nugent placed Harbison in charge of films, but Harbie forgot to take along the projector on one trip to a game. He said Harbie remembered it about the time of takeoff and raced down the aisle of the plane yelling "Stop the Airplane!"

Harbison himself insists that he now enjoys coaching and life generally more than ever.

"You get a different look at it sometimes," he said in one of those profound statements Fauls was talking about.

"Football," he said, "is an interesting game. I always think that my next one is going to be my best one. Offenses are much more wide open now. The veer has brought some of that on. Passing is back in college football. It used to be that you would play Georgia or Georgia Tech and they'd run one play about 40 times from the dead T. Now you play a Yeoman (Houston coach) and you don't know what to expect on any play. The pros have had some influence, too."

"It makes coaching tougher but it gives the fans a thrill."

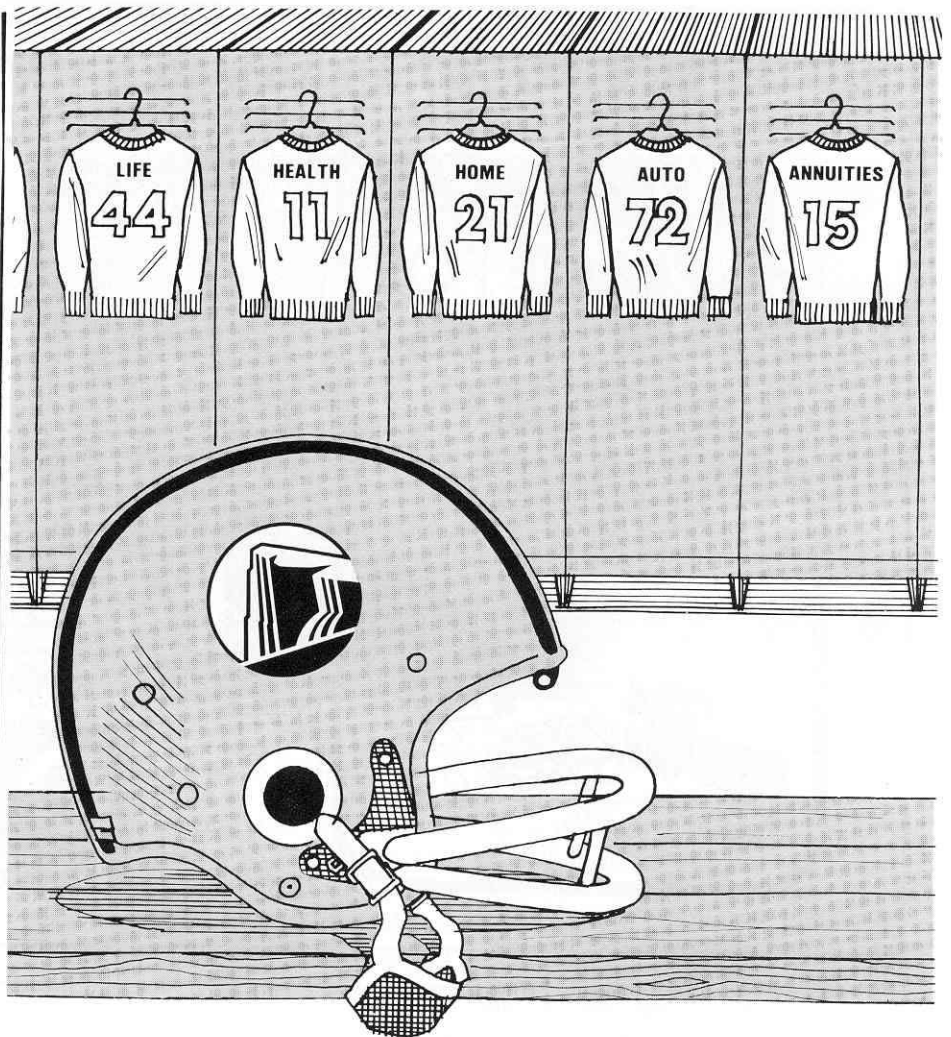
"But, with all the things out there, kids are still basically the same. Some you get close to. Like the other night, I tried to tell this boy the truth. Somewhere along the line, they're going to have a problem. Bobby (Bowden) is strong on telling them the truth."

Check the current Seminole roster and you will discover that the Bob Harbison influence had much to do with many of them becoming Seminoles.

Harbie has several parts of the state as his recruiting responsibility. Included is the Lake Okeechobee area.

"We never got anybody from down there before so I figured I'd try it," he said. "We got this kid John Diamantas from Merritt Island. I still can't believe that myself."

"But I've been lucky. I've had lots of help. You know, recruiting is like the Mafia. You're only as good as your organization."

Basketball Rebuilding This Season

Rebuilding.

That one word describes the pre-season outlook for the 1978-79 Florida State basketball team which opens a new campaign by hosting Eckerd on Nov. 27.

After all what more can be said for a team that . . .

(A) Has lost four starters from a club that won the regular season Metro Conference championship, finished 23-6 and advanced to the NCAA Regionals before losing to eventual champion Kentucky, 85-76;

(B) Has just three players who are 6-6 or taller;

(C) Has just four players with more than 200 minutes of varsity playing time;

(D) Has lost its head coach of 12 years.

"Rebuilding is the best word to describe the job we have ahead of us," says new coach Joe Williams, who comes to the Seminoles from Furman where his team went 19-11 last season and like FSU advanced to the NCAA playoffs.

"I don't have any idea what type of club we're going to have," says Williams. "And, I'm not sure that it won't be until January before I can accurately describe the pulse of this team."

So, where does Williams begin?

The answer: Mickey Dillard and Tony Jackson.

Dillard (6-3) and Jackson (6-0), who will serve as co-captains, form one of the quickest guard combinations in the country. Dillard played a sixth man role last season while Jackson was the starting point guard, the team quarterback. Despite the sixth man role, Dillard finished the season as the second leading scorer with a 13.7 average.

Jackson was not the high scorer, but

contributed in many other ways. He was the floor leader, who dished out 166 assists—tops in the Metro Conference. He was also a demon on defense, always drawing the opponent's best scoring guard.

"Mickey and Tony should form one of the most outstanding guard combinations in the country," says Williams. "It's certainly going to be hard for anyone to find a quicker pair of guards than those two."

After Dillard and Jackson there is a tremendous drop off in squad members with major college playing time.

Forward Murray Brown (6-8) played 402 minutes as the seventh man last winter. Next comes guard-forward Hank Mann (281) followed by guard Jerry Cox, forward Donnie Kuhl, forward James Bozeman and guard Bobby Parks, who each played just 28 minutes or less in 29 games.

That group sizes up in the following manner:

Brown: Destined to start in the low post this season for the Seminoles. An aggressive, hard-working player who has the tools to become outstanding.

Mann: Has played since coming to Florida State but only sparingly. He has never been consistent, but must be-

come that way if the Seminoles are to have a winning program.

Kuhl: A player who has never really been given a chance to show what he can do. He will receive that opportunity this winter. He has the size FSU coaches want in forwards and centers.

Bozeman: Untested in the collegiate ranks thus far, the coaches expect him to contribute heavily this season. He will receive a long look in the forward position.

Parks: Should improve back court with stability. Again, because of the strong depth situation Florida State enjoyed last season Bobby did not have much opportunity to play. He will get that chance this season.

Cox: Jerry sustained a broken foot last season. He was able to play in just two games. Coaches are not sure how well he is going to come back off that injury. Hopefully he will come back strong and help Parks give depth to the guard positions.

Because he arrived in mid-April Williams and his staff had difficulty in recruiting replacements for the departing seniors. Still they came up with two freshmen — Greg Collingsworth (6-5½) and Pernell Tookes (6-6) plus junior college transfer Ed Chatman (6-3).
