Big Business Seminole Style

Like any big corporation, major college football is a conglomerate. It involves production, outstanding physical exertion as well as mental preparedness, marketing, promotion and finances.

As in any big corporation, football has to have a president or a chairman of the board to make the conglomerate a success.

At Florida State, chairman of the board Bobby Bowden has so constructed a good football conglomerate in the past four years, one that has taken the corporation from the brink of bankruptcy to showing a net profit, a profit whereby all the stockholders, the Florida State football fans, are sharing in a new enthusiasm for the conglomerate as a whole.

But Bowden, like any good chairman of the board, will be the first to admit that his board members, the ones who are with him day and night in the decision making process, are the ones who will ultimately decide whether or not the corporation will continue its ascendancy or drop once again into the throes of mediocrity

where its competition will devour it.

Coach Bobby Bowden, first and foremost, is a realist. He bets his dreams of national recognition on his staff, and the staff is where the nuts and bolts of the corporation are produced.

"Any football coach is only as good as his staff and his players," Bowden said. And he means every word of it.

One can never attend any kind of football function, speaking affairs, seminars, clinics, or football camps and not hear the head man praise his staff. If he didn't give the recognition where recognition is justly deserved, he wouldn't be chairman of the board for very long. There would be no board to chair.

In the years that have seen Florida State emerge from a small school struggling to make its name in the football world to its present position among the nation's elite, a great deal of the credit must be given to the men who serve under the head coach. The quality of a coach's ability to produce winning teams depends almost in its entirety on the staff he

chooses and works with.

No better indication of that can be shown than the assistants that former Coach Bill Peterson surrounded himself with throughout his decade as head man at FSU.

Nearly every assistant coach and many players who served under Pete have moved on to head coaching positions or other high ranking posts in the world of major college football. The rise of assistants to head jobs at other schools is the epitome of a coach's talent in hiring and training a good staff.

Bowden himself is one of the Peterson trainees. He served on Pete's staff for two seasons before eventually winding up as head man at West Virginia. Others who coached with Pete and moved to head jobs are Vince Gibson, now at Louisville, and Don James, head coach at Washington. John Coatta, who also coached under Peterson, was once head coach at Wisconsin.

Bowden is going to be faced with the same problem of losing top assis-

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tants that other good coaches have always faced. Already George Haffner and Jerry Bruner from last year's staff have moved to Texas A&M and L.S.U., respectively, and when head coaching jobs open again following this season, Bowden may well lose some others, but that is the rub of the green in the football business.

Bowden feels he has a top staff of assistants this year, and while the head man gets the laurels (plus the snipes if any are forthcoming), seldom do the assistants receive words of praise from the media, fans or anyone else except the head coach and the family at home.

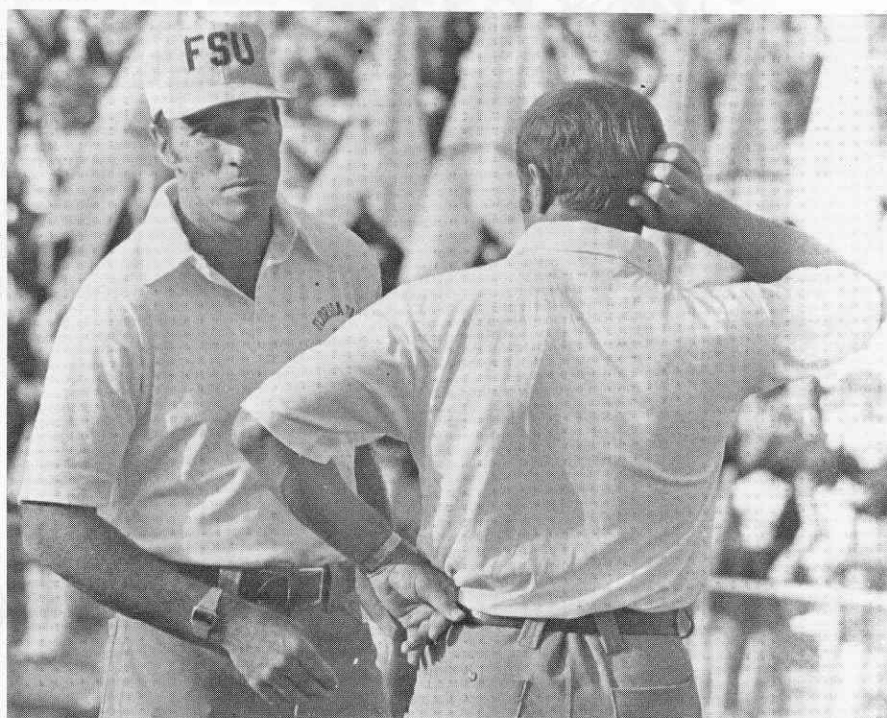
This year's Florida State staff of assistant coaches are as good as any in the land. Bowden thinks so, and so far his thinking about anything to do with football has been pretty good.

The senior member of the Seminole staff, of course, is the closest thing the Tribe has to an institution. Bob Harbison, the grey fox, is beginning his 31st year on the Florida State football scene, and this year has been elevated to the newly-created position of administrative assistant to Bowden. In that capacity, Harbie is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the football program. He supervises the fiscal affairs of the football staff and serves as liaison between the coaches and the university community.

Harbison has coached both offensive and defensive lines while at Florida State, and he has excelled in both. Back in 1964, when the Seminoles went 9-1-1 and won the Gator Bowl Championship, Harbie's defensive line was known as the "Seven Magnificents," and they held the first five opponents scoreless until Kentucky scored in the final seconds of the game to avoid being shut-out, losing, 48-6.

His offensive lines have been just as productive. That was his task in the hey-days of Kim Hammond, Bill Cappleman and Gary Huff, and Harbie's front line provided enough protection that those passers could have played in a tuxedo.

Harbison has been to all nine Seminole bowl games and is now serving under his seventh head coach. He previously worked under Don Veller, who brought him to FSU from Indiana, Tom Nugent, Perry Moss, Peterson, Larry Jones and Darrell Mudra.

Gene McDowell is beginning his 11th season as a member of the Florida State coaching staff. McDowell was an All-America linebacker for the Tribe in the early sixties, and now coaches that position on Bowden's staff.

Gene has been in the coaching game now ever since he graduated, and this is his second time around with FSU.

Shortly after he graduated, McDowell began his coaching career when he spent the fall of '63 as head coach of the Army Ranger military team. Following his discharge from the Army in 1965, McDowell returned to Florida State as a graduate assistant before taking charge of the freshman team for two years. Back then, freshmen could not play varsity ball.

He spent the campaigns of '68 and '69 as recruiting coordinator for Bill Peterson. In 1970 McDowell moved to Kansas State to be with former team-mate Vince Gibson, and he remained there as receiver and defensive end coach for four seasons. When Gibson left Kansas State, McDowell came back to Tallahassee and ultimately re-joined the Seminoles.

Jim Gladden is beginning his fifth year with the Seminoles. Gladden joined the staff for the 1975 season as a graduate assistant, and when

Bobby Bowden took over the next year, he promoted Gladden to the full time staff.

Gladden has coached the defensive ends since joining the Tribe, and his most notable student has been Willie Jones, now doing his thing with the Oakland Raiders. Gladden also is credited with making Scott Warren one of the premier defensive ends in the country.

A native of Springfield, Missouri, Gladden spent 15 years in high school coaching before coming to Florida State. He attended William Jewell College and was an All-Conference end before graduating. In his high school coaching career, Gladden reached a pinnacle in 1970 when he was named high school coach of the year in Kentucky.

George Henshaw came to Florida State with Bobby Bowden in 1976. He has been associated with Bowden for the past seven years. He played for Bowden at West Virginia, and the native of Midlothian, Virginia was a three-year starter for the Mountaineers as a defensive tackle, and served as co-captain in his senior season. He must have been a good leader, because the Mountaineers went 10-1 and whipped South Carolina in the Peach Bowl.

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Henshaw came here to coach nose guards and tackles on defense. But when George Haffner left to go to Texas A&M, Bowden moved George to the offense, where he is coordinating the entire offense and coaching the offensive line. Henshaw started his new duties in the spring and will work closely with Bowden in formulating offensive game plans for this season.

For the fourth consecutive season, Jack Stanton will be in complete charge of the Seminole defense. His defensive teams of the past two seasons have come on like gang-busters and this year's front line is predicted to be the best yet.

In addition to serving as defensive coordinator, Stanton also coaches the defensive backs, and this corps is expected to be a Tribe standout this year.

Stanton is a native of Carnegie, Pennsylvania, and last year he was credited with taking a secondary that was decimated by injuries and molding it into one that was more than adequate against the forward pass.

Jack began his coaching career in the high school ranks as an assistant coach in Louisville, Kentucky and Wheeling, West Virginia. Later he became head coach at a high school in Alexandria, Virginia.

Stanton then moved to George Washington University for a season before returning to his alma mater, North Carolina State for the next five seasons.

Jack came to Florida State in 1973 as defensive backfield coach, but left after that season to join Bill Dooley at North Carolina in the same capacity. But when Bowden came to FSU in 1976, he brought Jack Stanton in with him, and he's been at his job in admirable fashion ever since.

Nick Kish also is in his fourth season on the Seminole staff. Recognized as a top recruiter, Nick does his thing in that line for the Seminoles as well as serving as offensive backfield coach. He has been with the staff for four years, but until this season he was listed as a part-time coach. Bowden moved him to full time status this year.

Kish came to FSU in 1977 after a very successful four years as head coach at Grover Cleveland High School in Buffalo, New York. His four-year record was 29-2 and in-

cluded a 28-game winning streak. Among Nick's most illustrious players was present FSU fullback Mark Lyles.

Kish's teams captured city championships in 1973, 74 and 75, and were ranked among New York's top ten prep schools in '74 and '75.

Kish played college ball as a wingback at Syracuse, and was in the same backfield with Larry Czonka, but transferred to the University of Buffalo in 1969 where he was defensive captain and chosen the team's most valuable player.

Kent Schoolfield did his running in football and track at cross-town Florida A&M University. He, too, is beginning his fourth season on the Seminole staff.

A native of Columbus, Ohio, he coached at Miami Central High School before Bowden tabbed him to join the Seminoles in 1976.

After a brilliant high school football and track career, Schoolfield went to Florida A&M where he again excelled in two sports. Though he played freshman ball at A&M as a defensive back, he was switched to wide receiver, where he found a home. He graduated from A&M in 1970 and spent the next year in professional football with the Boston Patriots and the Pittstown Firebirds of the Continental League. He then spent two years in the army before returning to A&M as a graduate assistant in football and track. From there he came to the Seminoles as coach of the wide receivers and tight ends.

Bill Shaw was a star lineman for the 1968 and 1969 Florida State bowl teams. He played in the '68 Peach Bowl and the '69 Fiesta Bowl, and returns this year to his alma mater as the defensive line coach.

Shaw was the defensive coordinator for the Jacksonville (Ala.) State team for the past two seasons. Prior to that he tutored the tackles and nose guards at VMI for three seasons. He also was a graduate assistant at FSU for two seasons.

While at Jacksonville State in 1977, Shaw's defense limited six of its opponents to a touchdown or less. Jacksonville advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs that season, losing to Lehigh in the championship game.

While Shaw was at Jacksonville, the team had an 18-6 record in two years.

Shaw played defensive tackle, tight

end and defensive end during his playing days at Florida State, and is now in his first season as a full-time staff member with the Seminoles.

Billy Sexton, a graduate assistant on the Florida State staff for the past two seasons, has been appointed to the full time staff this year and will be tutoring the quarterbacks.

This makes the quarterback situation here at FSU this season an almost exclusive Tallahassee Leon High school operation.

He will be working with Wally Woodham and Jimmy Jordan, who followed as quarterback for the Lions.

Sexton did not play his first two years of football at Florida State. He had three years of experience at Alabama, his father's alma mater, before deciding to transfer to Florida State. He was a back-up quarterback at Alabama, but when he came to FSU he was the starter for the opening half of the 1973 season.

After graduating from Florida State in 1974, Billy spent three seasons as offensive coach at Leon High School before coming back to Seminole country as a graduate assistant.

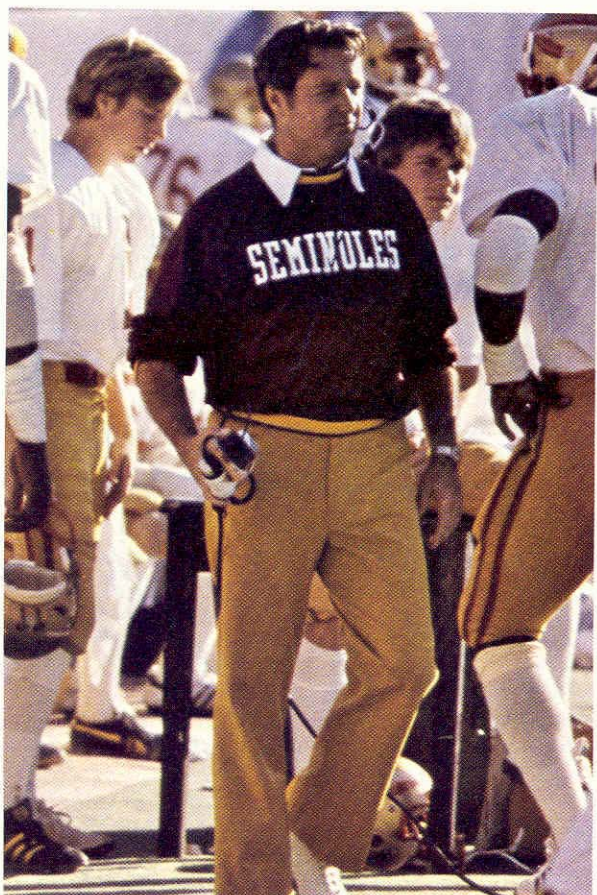

BOWDEN!

How does one describe Florida State head football coach Bobby Bowden?

Bobby Bowden may be one of the original down-home, good old boys, and to hear him tell it he's been a Seminole all his life. He wears a garnet and gold stripe shirt, hits golf balls with an official FSU driver and, if properly motivated, might tell you he bleeds garnet and gold.

He truly enjoys being the head football coach at Florida State University.

And, why shouldn't he?

After all, in three seasons, the Seminoles have compiled a 23-11 record under the guidance of Bowden, who currently ranks 15th on the active list of college coaches in winning percentage (.691).

But, for Bowden it's more than just winning. Being a head football coach at a major university allows him to be out and around, meeting the people. During the month of May, for instance, he normally speaks to a minimum of 25 Seminole Booster Clubs around the state.

Why?

There are two obvious answers: recruiting and fund raising.

But there's more to this man who has turned the fortunes of the Florida

State football program from ashes to a rising star on the national scene. He is more than just a football coach. He is also a deeply religious individual, who when he's not on the road recruiting and raising funds, can often be found at a church podium in Tallahassee or one of the surrounding communities on Sunday mornings.

"I enjoy meeting and talking with people," Bowden explains. "I'm not a preacher. I'm not qualified to preach. I do like to share my experiences with God, though, especially with young people."

"I want to add something to their lives . . . to make them aware of what's going on around them."

"Kids enjoy listening to coaches speak. I know I did when I was growing up. Kind of looked up to them, you know what I mean?"

Bowden certainly has the football buffs of the southeastern United States attention after what has happened in three seasons at Florida State.

Consider these facts . . .

(1) After going 4-29 in three seasons B.B. (Before Bowden), the Seminoles have now compiled a 23-11 mark with him captaining the ship;

(2) The 1977 Seminoles won 10

games enroute to a 10-2 record. Those 10 victories represent the most ever registered by any major (Division I-A) college team now playing football in Florida;

(3) Florida State's '77 Seminoles finished the season ranked 11th and 14th in the individual wire service polls;

(4) Bowden took the Seminoles '77 to their first bowl appearance since the 1971 Fiesta Bowl;

(5) Despite the fact that there were just five seniors on the 1978 squad, it survived a mid-season slump, to manage an 8-3 record. That ledger was not good enough for national ranking or a bowl appearance at the conclusion of the season but it provided momentum for 1979;

(6) Early in the 1978 campaign, FSU managed to rank ninth and 10th in the wire service polls after three consecutive victories. Those were the highest rankings EVER for a Seminole football squad.

So . . . Seminole fans look forward to 1979. It should be an especially pleasing campaign for Bowden, a Birmingham, Ala., native, because unless the Garnet and Gold suffers a complete collapse Bowden will notch his 100th coaching victory at the major college level.

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Bowden begins 1979 just four wins shy of the 100 victory plateau. His overall report card is 96-43 and includes marks of 31-6 at Samford and 42-26 at West Virginia before joining the Seminole camp.

Bowden began at Florida State with a 5-6 record. But, since that time everything has been on the upward trend. And, despite the disappointment of not receiving a bowl berth or finishing in the prestigious Top 20 Seminole fans remain excited.



That is because of the pass happy offense Bowden has installed since taking over. Last year the Seminoles displayed the 11th best offense (411.1 yards per game) in the country and the third best passing attack (249.9). And, the team averaged 28.4 points a game. The point average included 38 point efforts in three of the final four games.

What is the reason for the Bowden coaching success?

Enthusiasm and discipline are key words which exemplify Bowden's overall attitude, both on and off the field.

"I believe in discipline and enthusiasm in everything you do in life," Bowden says, "and you coach what you believe. If we can be enthusiastic in the little things we do, it will carry over to a winning season."

"But don't get me wrong about discipline. I believe in letting the players know who is boss, and I believe in some sacrifice and devotion. But discipline can only go so far."

"If short hair and perfect manners won football games, the Army-Navy game would be played every year for the national championship."

Bowden's coaching philosophy is quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is secondary; blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Winning means a lot to Bowden, an avid golfer, who since moving to Tallahassee has improved his game steadily.

"I don't believe in playing without a scorecard," says Bowden. "I don't feel there is any accomplishment with

a tie. I think if one of my teams was playing Notre Dame for the national title and I had the choice of winning or losing or going for the tie, I would go for the win."

National championship was not a term mentioned with a great deal of frequency at Florida State until the last two years. Bowden explains it cautiously.

"A national championship is the ultimate in coaching, but I must be realistic," says Bowden. "Every year we set new goals with our team. In 1977 our first objective was landing a spot in the Top 20. Then we wanted a bowl bid."

"Last year we fell short of our goal—gaining a spot in the final Top 10 and going to our second consecutive bowl game. But, that may not have been all that bad. Our players know that to achieve those goals they must do more than step on the field. They realize Florida State needs a consistent winning record to be a legiti-

mate contender each year for national honors."

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and was a Little All-American quarterback at Samford University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Samford and master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock, and they have six children.

Mrs. Bowden is active in the Tallahassee community and recently helped establish the Extra Point Club, a group of women working towards the betterment of FSU football. Steve is studying for the ministry in Louisville, Robyn teaches at Fairmont State College, Tommy is a graduate assistant on the FSU staff, Terry manages the Coble Terrace residence hall which houses many of the Seminole football players, Jeff is a walkon wide receiver at Florida State and Ginger is a freshman at FSU.

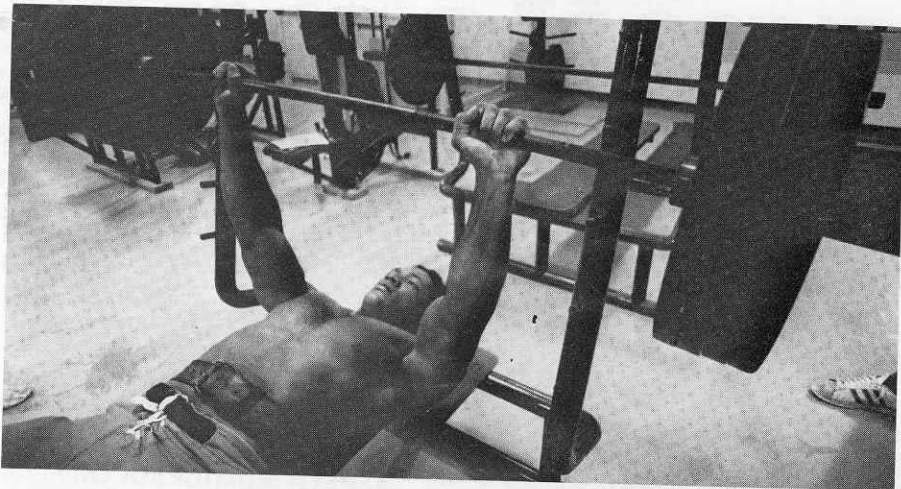
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Pumping iron

Seminole gridgers endure the pain of extreme weight-lifting program

Ron Simmons, above, bench presses just over 400 pounds — about 100 pounds below his usual weight, while Scott Warren, bottom right, works out on the Nautilus machine under the watchful eye of strength coach Jake Gonos.

The pain is reflected on Scott Warren's face as he strains to bring the bar up once, maybe twice more. He is working out on a contraption in the weight room at the Florida State football fieldhouse. There are other such machines, exotic-looking conglomerates of pulleys and chains that give the appearance of medieval torture devices.

How fitting. In a way, what Warren and the other FSU football players endure, even after a two-hour practice in 90-degree heat, is a form of torture. But it is necessary, vital to the construction of a football program.

Like virtually every other major college team, Florida State has a sophisticated, intensive weight-training program. The players lift year round. In the off-season, they sweat for hours to build poundage and strength. But they keep at it even now, amidst the practices and games, to maintain the fruits of their labors. It is as much a part of football as blocking and tackling.

"You've got to be strong to play," says Warren, finished now. Beginning his fourth season as a starting defensive end, Warren weighs about 217 pounds, far smaller than your average lineman. But coaches say Warren is one of the strongest players on the team.

Because he engages in hand-to-hand combat with brutes who weigh as much as 60 pounds more than he does, strength is vital to Warren. He must work constantly to improve, lest he find himself knocked back into the nickle-seats courtesy of some behemoth tackle.

"It's hard to say what I'd be without it," Warren says of the training. "As a freshman, I probably weighed 10 or 15 pounds less than I do now, and I was 70 or 80 pounds less stronger in the bench press.

"The extra weight and strength has helped me control blockers. I can throw them where I want to. With tackling it helps, too. I can really tell the difference. When I hit the ball-carrier, they feel the impact instead of me."

"We think that strength is very, very important to football players," emphasizes assistant Coach Jim Gladden, who, with assistant George Henshaw, began the current program at Florida State. "Speed and strength give you an equalizer to size."

There are, however, objectives that go beyond increasing strength. A sheet of paper that outlines the exercises for the players during the off-season also states the purpose of the FSU weight-training program:

- To gain overall body strength and explosive power.

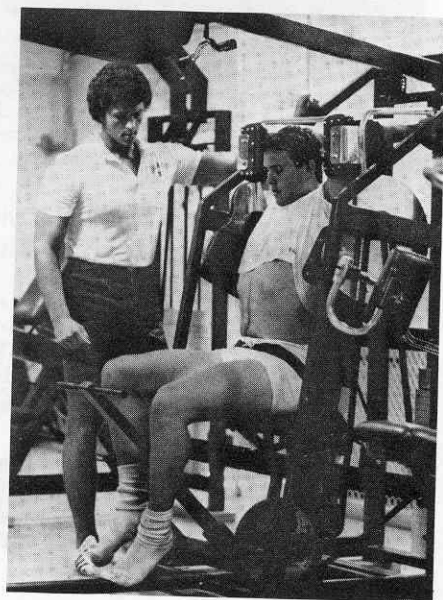
- To build muscle tissue to increase body weight.
- To increase flexibility and cardiovascular efficiency.
- To prevent injury.
- To build confidence by increasing strength.

Gladden and Henshaw still oversee the weight-training but Jake Gonos supervises the workouts on a day-to-day basis. A graduate assistant who was an honorable mention Little All-American center at Gettysburg, Gonos works with the offensive linemen and also bears the title, "Strength Coach."

"I come from a good weight-lifting area (Wilkes Barre, Pa.)," Gonos says "but I wasn't really into it until I was a freshman in college. In four years, I got my bench press up to 400 pounds. I really got into it. Now I read books on body building, go to seminars. I like to work out myself. It's really healthy."

Gonos pumped himself up to 245 pounds in college and considered playing football in Canada. But he decided his future was in coaching, and is pursuing a master's degree in physical education at FSU. Now a more svelte 225 pounds, Gonos is a demanding mother hen in the weight room, imploring the players to lift past the point of mere pain.

"There's no gain without pain," he says. "If you come here without the idea of attacking the weights, you're not going to help yourself. You've got to want to hurt and feel that pain."

The weight room is gaily painted in garnet and gold, ironic for the physical demands that are required. There are two types of training devices, the Nautilus equipment, which are those iron maiden-looking machines, and the more conventional barbells.

Nautilus has been around for about 10 years, but has only caught on really big in the last five. Gonos says you can do about 20 different exercises on the machines. Each is designed to exercise a certain group of muscles. There are, for example, the Hip-and-Back machine, the huge "Big Bertha," for two types of leg exercises, and the Behind-the-Neck Torso machine. "A favorite of (quarterback) Wally Woodham's," says Gonos.

Nautilus helps build and maintain strength, Gonos says, but as mentioned in the list of objectives, it is exceedingly beneficial in the prevention of injuries.

"If you're not strong, you're more susceptible to injury," says Gonos. "You'll bend, but there's not much there that will bend."

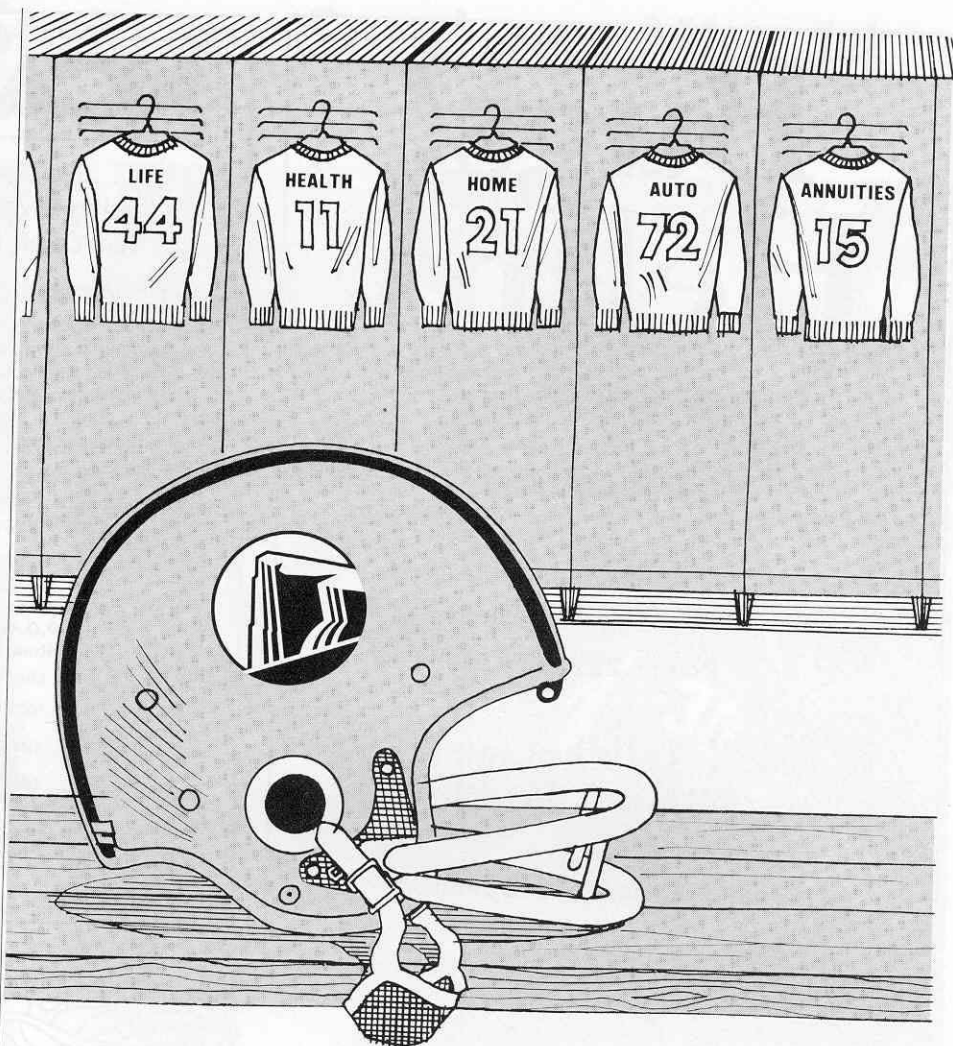
Shoulder, neck and back injuries are most apt to be prevented with faithful use of the equipment, Gonos says. Even the number of knee injuries can be lessened with the building-up of the supporting muscle around the joint.

But they cannot be prevented, and the Seminoles last fall and this spring were hit with an apparent plague of torn knees. Still, the weight training proved useful in the rehabilitation of injury.

Guard Greg Futch was one who was felled by "a knee," as the injury is simply labeled. It happened during spring practice, and doctors told Futch he would be out at least until the fourth game in the fall.

"That got me down, so I just decided to work hard at it," says Futch, who started against Southern Mississippi last Saturday. "I decided it had to be done. I'd work the knee an hour, and stay in the weight room two or three hours."

Futch worked with fellow guard Mike Good, a lifting devotee, and tight end Bill Keck, himself recovering from a knee. Futch found that as he helped strengthen his leg, his feeling changed about weight training. ●



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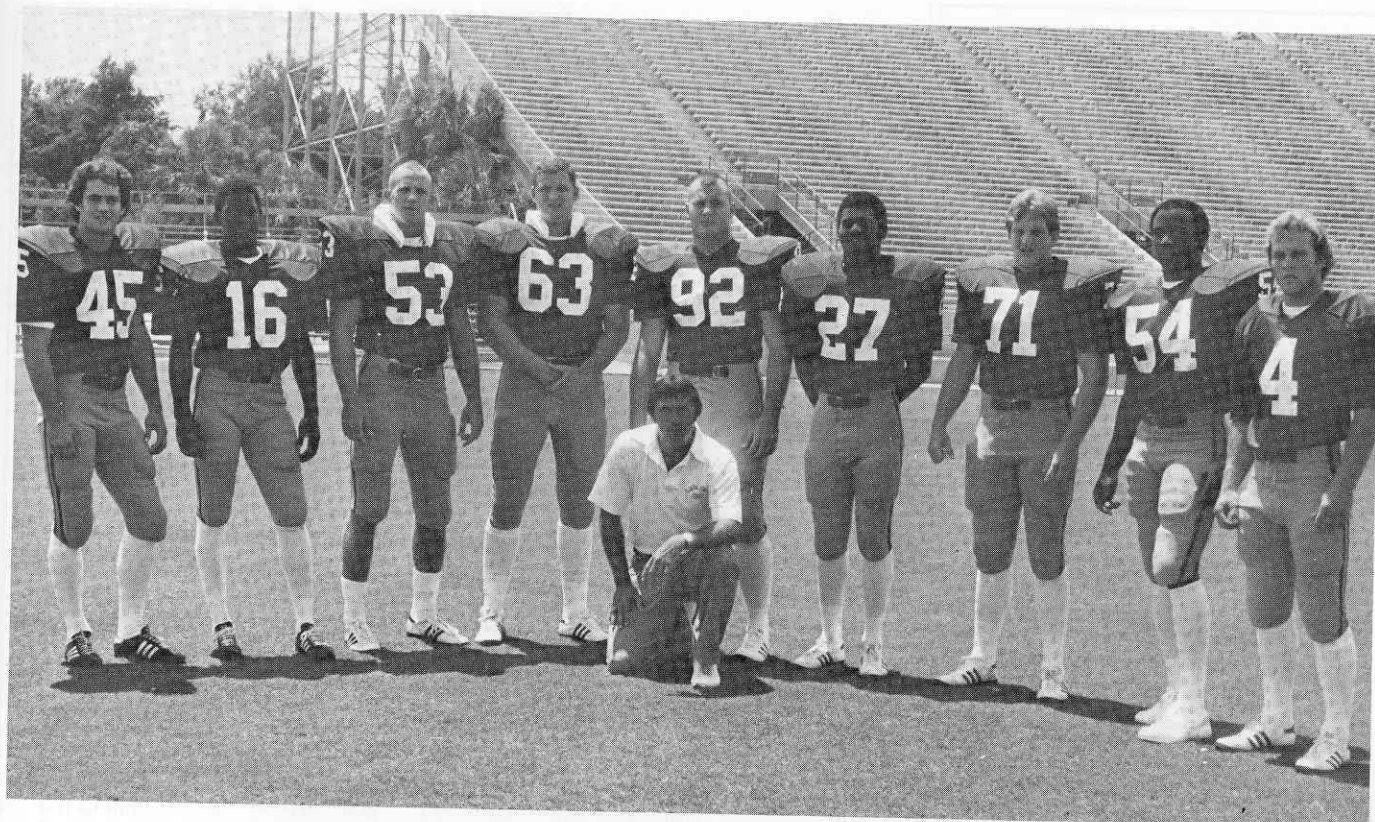

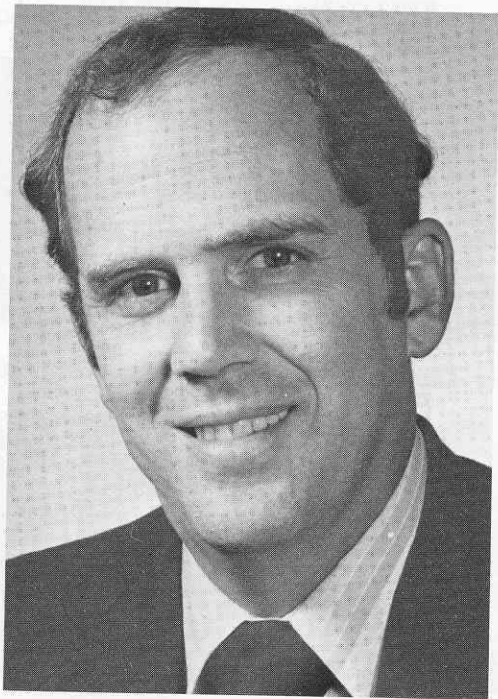
The Marching Chiefs popularity has been growing in leaps and bounds as its reputation as one of the nation's finest collegiate marching bands continues to grow.
