Tribe Tonight

A new \$300,000 scoreboard.

A new lighting system that cost \$400,000.

A new set of goal posts.

A new stadium that brings the capacity to 51,094.

All of those things will be visible to the spectators tonight as Florida State makes its home debut for the 1980 football season. The opponent: Louisville's Cardinals.

And, even the FSU football team will be sporting somewhat of a "new" look based on last week's 16-0 shutout at LSU that helped catapult the Seminoles into the 10th spot in this week's Associated Press Top 20 poll.

FSU kept winning last week -- the regular season win streak has now reached 16 games -- but the Seminoles did it in a way that was somewhat new to the fans. Head Coach Bobby Bowden, with an untested quarterback (Rick Stockstill) and horrible field conditions, unleashed a ground attack at the Bengal Tigers. Only 11 times during the game staged before the third largest crowd (77,385) in LSU history did the normally pass-happy Seminoles put the ball in the air.

Was that game offensive plan an indication of what Tribe followers can expect in the coming season?

"I certainly hope not," said Bowden later. "I could hardly stand being so conservative, but that is what the game conditions called for. In all my years of coaching, I can't remember a game plan being better executed."

Although Bowden has never said so, many believe he wanted to allow Stockstill, the Wally Jim Jordham understudy the last three years to get a game under his belt without making any major mistakes that could cost the Tribe a victory. The plan worked perfectly with Stockstill handing off to a quartet of running backs that included Sam Platt, Mike Whiting, Ken Burnett, Larry Harris and Homes Johnson.

Never was there a fumbled handoff. Never was there a bad exchange on the snap. Never was there an interception. Indeed in this '80 opener, FSU did not have a turnover. When that happens folks it's very difficult for a team to lose.

It's purely a guess in this corner, but we would expect the Seminoles to mix up the offense a little more tonight against the Cardinals. Still, you won't see that 50-50 pass-run ratio Bowden would like to have, but unless the weather conditions dictate

otherwise, Stockstill will probably put it in the air more than last week.

After that running performance at LSU, it's anticipated by the Seminole coaches that the opponent will have to respect the Tribe running game. That was something that didn't take place last season, especially in the regular season finale at Florida and Orange Bowl tussle with Oklahoma.

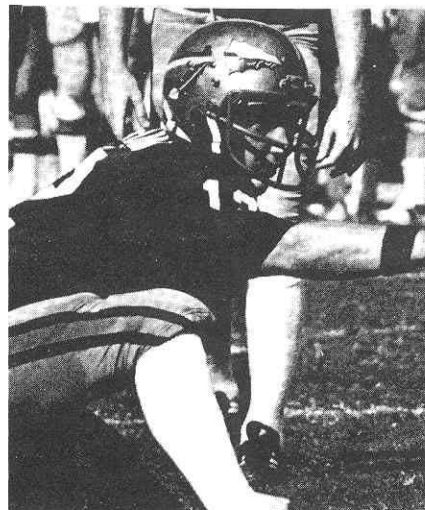
"I've made up my mind after those two games that no team would intimidate us," says Bowden. "Both teams would use five backs in obvious passing situations and with our running game not what we would have liked it gave us some problems."

Everyone knows that in the Seminoles' 11-0 effort of the 1979 campaign the running game wasn't what everyone would have hoped. It was tough to complain, but outside speed was sorely lacking.

Bowden and his staff went out of their way to try and correct those ills during spring practice. The major "move" of the spring involved wide receiver Sam Platt. He was shifted to tailback and made quite an impression in those rugged no-holds barred Saturday scrimmages.

For Sam, it paid off. He won a starting assignment and last week vs. LSU carried the ball 22 times for 79 yards. The longest run was for 13 yards, but Sam showed he isn't afraid to carry the ball. And, with the return of Homes Johnson to the Tribe roster, it gives the Seminoles one of the finest tailback combos ever seen in these parts.

Johnson, as many know, was the leading ball carrier for FSU in 1978 -- picking up 817 yards as a sophomore. He



left the squad for personal reasons last fall but returned in the winter and has shown the coaching staff he wants to be a part of the action in '80. A new attitude for Homes means he can be nothing but a plus for the Tribe during the rugged campaign ahead.

This will not be an easy season for Bowden and Company. Last year FSU was the "cinderella" team of college football. No more -- the Tribe is a hunted football team. Everyone on the schedule wants a part of the team that enjoyed the successes FSU had last season.

So, the way Bowden has promised that the offense from LSU won't be the attack for the remainder of the season, he would surely make another one - buy tickets for the remaining home games now because each game will present a different sort of challenge and be exciting.

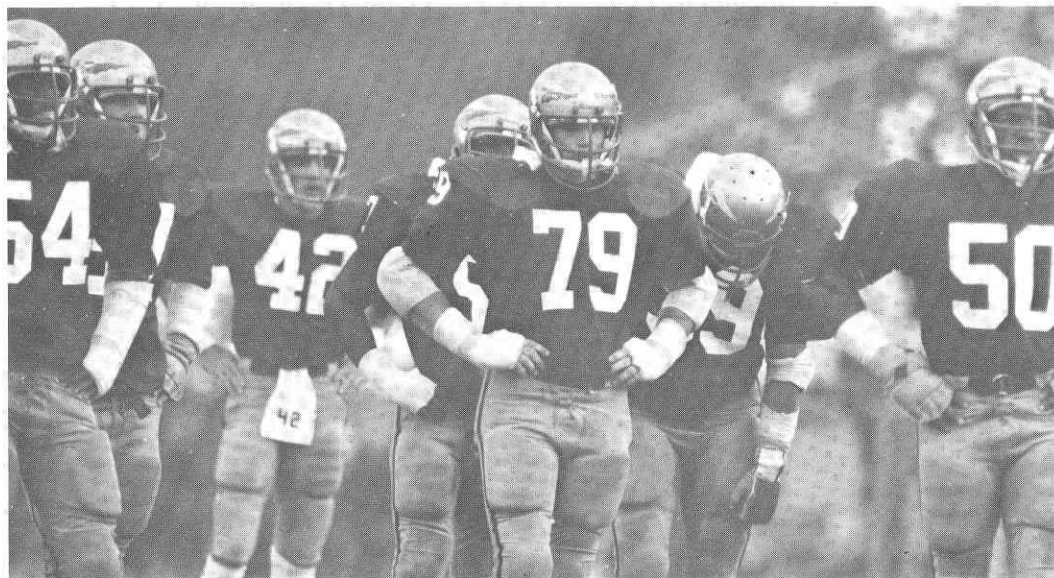

Seminoles Emerge as a National Power

Florida State never had it so good.

We're writing about the 1979-80 intercollegiate sports season for the Seminoles. No, this story isn't just about the successes of the football team which have already been well documented. It's about all the sports, especially the male variety, which brought FSU a ranking of seventh in the nation for the 1980 NCAA All-Sports rankings.

It's a story, too, about the blooming seven women's sport program which has begun to make headway and join its male counterparts in the national spotlight.

Head Coach Bobby Bowden's football team was the pace-setter for the 1979-80 sports program at FSU. Everyone by now knows the Seminoles went 11-0 during the regular season and received an invitation to the Orange Bowl where it lost to Big Eight Conference champion Oklahoma.

That loss, however, didn't diminish the deeds of the Seminoles. This was a team that became the first in FSU grid history that advanced to fourth in the Associated Press and United Press International Top 20 rankings. That came at the end of the regular season and despite the loss to Oklahoma the Tribe still finished sixth in the final AP balloting.

The Seminole gridders brought the school recognition that can't be fixed by a dollar figure. In addition to taking a prominent spot on the sports pages across the nation, FSU had three ABC-TV appearances. There were regional presentations against Virginia Tech and Louisiana State (84 percent of the country watched) and a national date against arch-rival Florida. And, the Orange Bowl was beamed nationwide on New Year's night by NBC-TV.

While the football team was doing its thing

during the fall, the cross country team of John Brogle set the tone for the Seminole teams that would participate in Metro Conference competition during the year. A young FSU team won its second consecutive league title. That would be the first of six Metro team championships won during the year which would give FSU its third straight league all-sports championship.

Basketball kept the fans interested during the winter months. Joe Williams, who was coaching here for the second year, guided his cagers to a nifty 22-9 mark that included an appearance in the NCAA post-season tournament where it had a 1-1 record.

In the Metro's post-season tournament, the Seminoles finished second behind Louisville, a team that won the national championship. For FSU, the league post-season tournament was another in a series of frustrations in that event. It marked the third straight year the Seminoles advanced to the title game but placed second.

Watching the basketball team was not good advice for someone with a heart condition. Ten of the 31 games were decided by two points or less with FSU winning six. One of those losses came when a Virginia Tech player hurled the ball the length of the court for a basket. The shot was later recognized by Guinness as the longest in basketball history.

Also during the winter, swimming coach John Stafford put together a unit that would win its third consecutive crown and advance several competitors to national competition.

Baseball and track and field drew most of the national attention during the spring.

Mike Martin was in his first season as mentor of the Tribe baseball program but he guided the club to a school record 51 wins in 63 starts.

Included were the league championship, NCAA South Region championship and trip to the College World Series.

Those titles were significant since the Tribe fielded a starting lineup that normally consisted of two freshmen, one sophomore and five juniors. It was supposed to be a rebuilding year, but ended up being far more.

The track and field squad of Dick Roberts was responsible for a season that caught everyone by surprise. First the thinclads had a 12th place finish in the NCAA Indoor competition. Next came the Outdoor campaign and when it came time to tally the final results FSU was third.

The Tribe worked its way into such a lofty perch with a victory in the 200 meter dash, second place finish in the 100 and fourth in the 400.

The spring accomplishments in baseball and track overshadowed better than average efforts by the tennis and golf squads.

Veteran links coach Don Veller, who always seems to do more than his budget could ever allow, had some early season problems, but whipped his club into shape for a late season stretch run that included a Metro title and 14th place in the NCAA national tournament.

Tennis coach Randy Jobson in his second tour as mentor of the netters guided FSU to its best finish ever in the Metro -- second behind powerful Memphis State which has won the title five straight times.

While much of the glory has to be attributed to fine coaching, the winners are made up of individuals, not statistics.

Noseguard Ron Simmons of the football team has become the most honored athlete in FSU history and still has a season remaining. The

What A Year It Was!

Warner Robins, Ga., native was a consensus All-American last season, finished ninth in the Heisman Trophy voting and was a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award. Defensive back Monk Bonasorte was a third team (AP) All-American selection. A total of seven Seminoles won All-South Independent honors.

In basketball, forward Murray Brown became the all-time field goal percentage leader in NCAA history. He and Mickey Dillard were first team all-conference.

Centerfielder Mike Fuentes was a baseball All-American. But, all the baseball players picked up some sort of honor. Every Seminole starter was either chosen All-Metro, All-Metro Tournament or All-South. Some players made all three. Freshman outfielder Mike Yastrzemski was chosen MVP of the South Regional and Fuentes was honored as the Outstanding Athlete of the four sport Metro Spring Sports Weekend.

Track produced six All-Americans with Herb Wills, Leon Hutchins and Bobby Butler gaining that status for the first time. Sprinters Mike Robertson and Walter McCoy earned A-A honors for their eighth and ninth time respectively.

In other sports, individual stars were also apparent. John McLean won the number two singles title in the Metro, swimmer Craig Lindell was an NCAA qualifier and golfers Jeff Sluman, Grant Turner, Stephen Keppler and Paul Downes finished as the top four individuals at the Metro.

While the men were grabbing the headlines, the women were doing just as well in a quieter way. The women's squads sent four teams to national competition and had two win state crowns.

In volleyball, coach Cecile Reynaud led the nationally recognized squad to a 32-19 record and first place finish in state and 18th place showing at the national tournament. Softball experienced similar success with a 37-10 report card, again first in state and second in regionals.

Track earned the third spot in regionals and promised even greater success with hiring of former Wyoming head coach Roger Smith to guide the program.

Tennis was eight matches over .500 and finished a respectable fifth in rugged state competition. FSU hosted the national AIAW cross country championships where the Lady Seminoles finished 22nd after a second place showing in the regional meet.

Under the direction of Terry Maul, swimming jumped off to an 8-0 start and finished second in the region and 28th in the nation.

The women boasted stars Marla Anderson and Michele Guibault in golf, Laine Lasseter in basketball and Nancy Townsend in volleyball

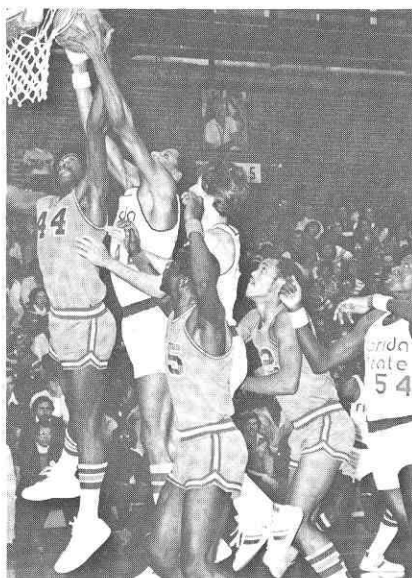
and track.

Women's athletic director Ms. Barbara Palmer spearheaded legislation that will provide state schools with \$600,000 that help make Florida the first state to comply with Title IX regulations.

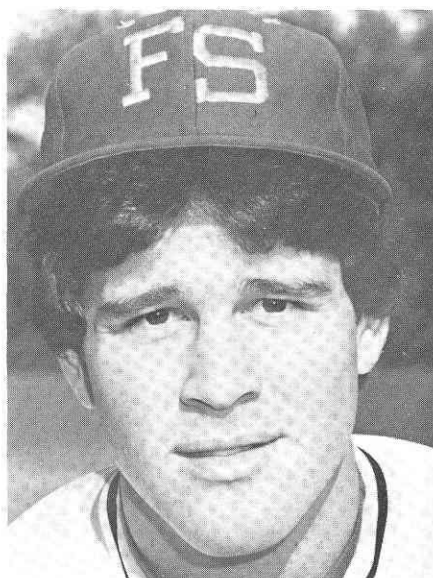

Defensive Back Bobby Butler: Three in a row against Florida.



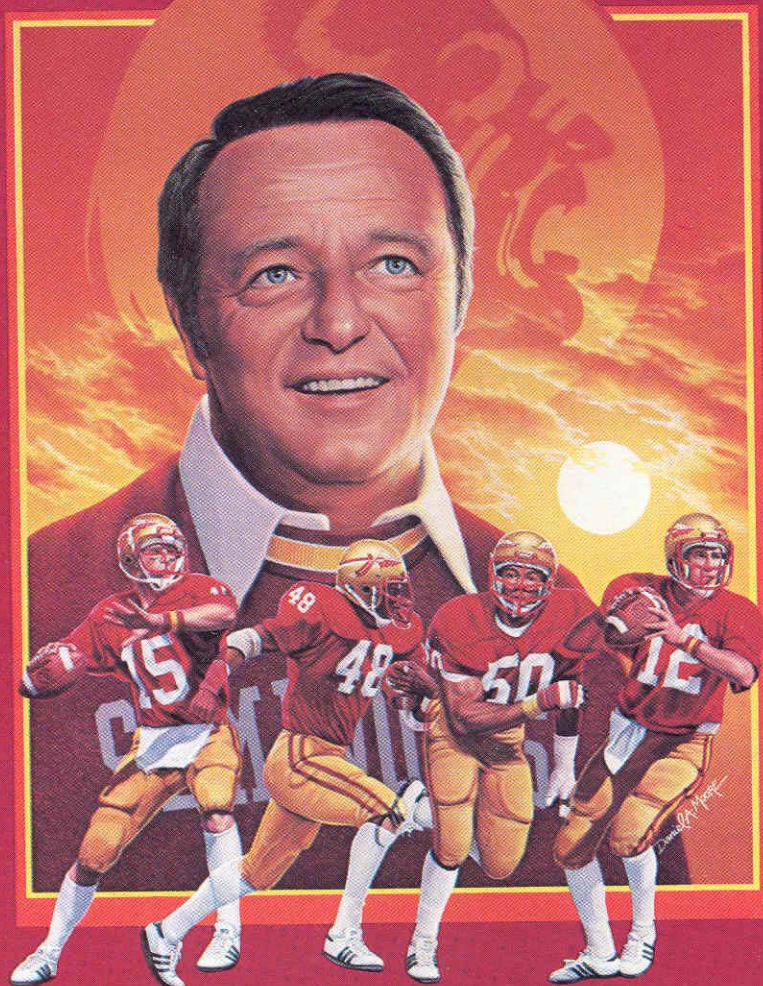

After eighteen seasons, few football coaches in America can match Bobby Bowden's talent for taking losing teams and turning them into winners. And as one associate coach says about him, "Bowden does not just coach football. He coaches people."

Such is the case at Florida State, where prior to his arrival in 1976, the garnet and gold clad Seminoles had just gone through a 20-game losing streak. Yet when Bowden, the Seminole Savior, arrived at FSU from the mountain top of West Virginia, things began to change. He told them, "We can win at FSU."

And in four short seasons and 34 victories, numerous television appearances and two post-season bowls, "Bowden and Co." have risen to the top of the football world.

Now, for the first time, FSU's Coach Bobby Bowden tells his own candid story of how he came back from a death bed at age 13 and struggled down the long, hard road to reach the success that he and FSU have recently begun to enjoy. For years, Bowden has been known in the public eye as a cunning football strategist, a superb motivator of young men, a corn-pone quipper and a deeply religious man. But in **BOUND FOR GLORY**, you'll find out there is much more to this 50-year old ruler of Tallahassee.

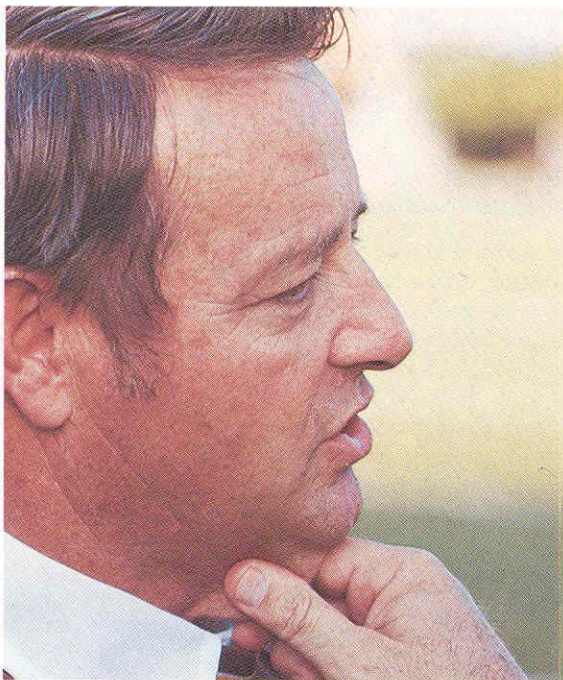

November 5, 1979.

That day is very significant one in the history of Florida State football. No, it isn't the date of a significant victory on the field.

But, it's a day that FSU football family and its fans did win. That is the day FSU got the name of its head football coach Bobby Bowden on an automatically renewing five year contract.

"It means we are married and nobody's going to put our marriage assunder," said Bowden.

After the 11-0 1979 regular season and trip to the Orange Bowl, the 50-year-old native of Birmingham, Ala., still anxiously anticipates the 1980 season.

"An undefeated regular season was something I really thought would never happen. You know, I've come mighty close a number of times, 9-1, 8-1, 10-2. I'll tell you one thing, you get a taste of something like last year and you don't ever want to let it go."

What Bowden has done with the FSU football program since arriving on campus in the winter of 1976 has been simply amazing. That first year the Tribe went 5-6—not a good mark by many standards, but when one remembers the Seminoles had a combined mark of 4-29 the previous three years 1976 was considered a plus. Since then FSU has reeled off regular season marks of 9-2, 8-3 and 11-0.

There have been two bowl appearances—the 1977 Tangerine and 1980

Orange. And the honors have been many. The team for the first time ever last season rose to fourth in the national polls and finished sixth after the bowl games were completed. Bowden has received numerous coaching honors and nose guard Ron Simmons is the most honored player in Seminole football history.

Bowden, in four seasons at FSU has a 34-12 mark and has a career register of 107-44.

ABC-TV and Chevrolet recognized the Bowden achievements last season when they named him "Division I Coach of the Year." And Associated Press writers and broadcasters voted him Southern Independent Coach of the Year for the second time in the last three.

Bowden is no Tallahassee stranger. He had been an offensive coaching mind on FSU's staff in the 1960s, when

Bill Peterson was head coach and the Seminoles were first making waves in the polls with a celebrated passing game that featured wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff.

Bowden doesn't follow a complicated coaching philosophy. In fact, it's quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is irrelevant, blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and was a Little All-American quarterback at Samford University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Samford and master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock and they have six children.

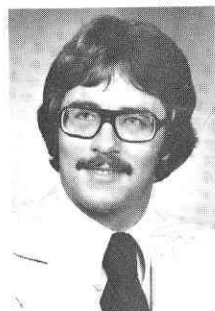
Former head coach Bill Peterson will serve as the color analyst for each broadcast.

FLORIDA STATE CROSS COUNTRY TEAMS OFF AND RUNNING

NEWNESS SURROUNDS LADIES' PROGRAM

There will be some new faces when the Florida State women's cross country team takes to the road this fall.

The most obvious will be that of first-year coach Roger Smith, who has a history of turning winning programs loose at the high school, junior college and college levels.

Smith's list of coaching success is phenomenal. At El Mont (Calif.) High School, he took a program that had not won a dual meet in 63 attempts and won the Pacific League Championship in two years.

It took him even less time at Clackamas (Ore.) Community College. His squad won the national championship in 1977, his first season of coaching. Over a three-year period, his cross country teams compiled a 51-1 record while the track teams were racking up a neat 119-4 slate.

Smith's most recent coaching assignment was a one year stint at the University of Wyoming. His indoor track, outdoor track and cross country teams all qualified for nationals.

Smith has set high goals for Florida State. "I'm here to build a national championship program," he says. "We're not waiting for the future. The future is now. While we won't challenge for the national championship this year, we do want to improve on last year's ranking (22nd in the nation)."

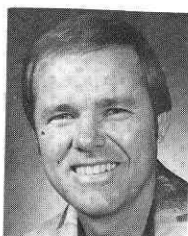
Smith's roster includes eight first-year runners and only three seniors. While he expects the freshman class to be strong, he's counting on two of his vets to lead the way.

Kathy Moore, a senior from Miami, and Darien Andreu, a sophomore from Orange Park, return as the two top runners. Both placed high in the regional meet last season and qualified for nationals. Smith is also keeping an eye on returning letterwinners Mary Banks, Gale Grant, Lisa Rhoden and Debbie Kemp.

A freshman who could challenge right away is Margaret Coomber, who joins the team at age 29. One of three foreigners on the squad, Coomber is ranked among the top 39 female runners in the world in the half-mile.

Florida State's schedule is built around the concept of training for two meets at season's end. "We won't ignore the other meets and we won't train through them," Smith says, "but we will gear everything towards regionals and nationals. What we do in those meets is really what counts."

MEN GO FOR A THIRD METRO CROWN

Coach John Brogle and his Florida State teams have won two Metro Cross Country Championship trophies in the past two years. They wouldn't mind a third trophy for the new trophy cases in Tully Gymnasium.

Since the Metro Conference began holding the cross country championships, it's been all Florida State on the cross country course.

A look at Florida State's 1980 roster would indicate that the trend may continue. Nine out of the ten lettermen responsible for last year's first place finish will still be wearing the garnet and gold this fall. And threats of a dynasty are even more evident when one realizes that those nine have not yet reached senior status. It could be a long two years for Florida State opponents.

In last season's championship, five Florida State harriers finished in the top 12 positions as the Seminoles copped first place with 12 points to spare. Only Virginia Tech and Memphis State could give FSU a race. To add to the laurels, Brogle was named Metro Cross Country Coach of the Year.

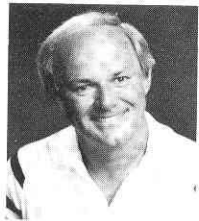
Tallahassee native Herb Wills heads the list of Florida State talent. The youngster was a qualifier for the 1980 Olympic trials in the marathon and placed fourth in the NCAA track and field championships for the 10,000 meter distance. And he's only entering his junior season.

Yet more talent lies in the Class of 1982. Doug Overfelt won the Metro Spring Championships in the 5,000 meters and finished fourth at the cross country championships last season as a sophomore. Robb Gomez was an All-American in the indoor 1,000 meters. And the list goes on with Larry Green, John Hodge, Brett Hoffman, Bobby Shackleford and Scott Taylor.

Marc Trigg, an outstanding sophomore, distinguished himself as a top performer last season as a freshman, placing sixth in the cross country championships.

While Brogle and his squad are going after that third consecutive Metro title, they'd like to take it one step farther and qualify for nationals. "We just missed out on that last year," Brogle says. "But with our talent and depth, we think it's a goal that is within our reach in 1980."

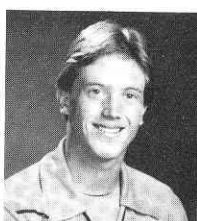

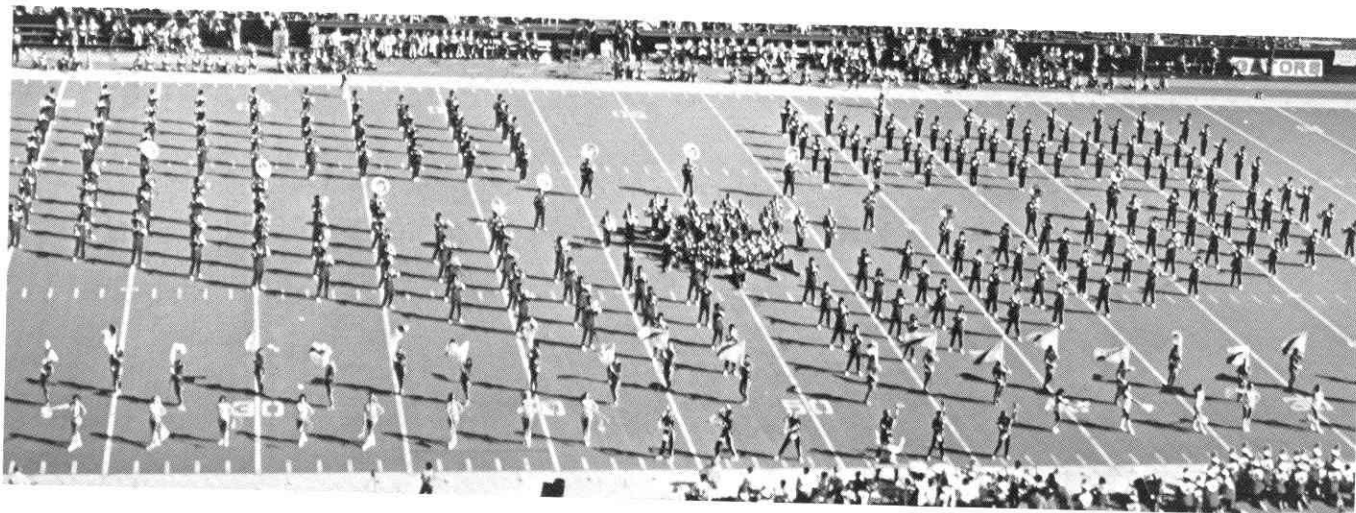
THE MARCHING CHIEFS

THE COACHES: Bobby Bowden (Samford '52) is at the Florida State helm for the fifth season. In that time, the Tribe has gone 35-12 with 16 straight regular season wins. Twice in the last three seasons Bowden has taken the Seminoles to two bowl games--Tangerine (1977) and Orange (1980). Last season Bowden was rewarded for his team's perfect (11-0) regular season when ABC-TV and Chevrolet named him its Division I-A Coach of the Year. Twice in the last three seasons he has been picked as the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year. He has been head coach at Samford (31-6) and West Virginia (42-26) and now sports an overall head coaching record of 108-44.

Bob Weber (Colorado State '58) is serving his first season as head coach at Louisville. He had been an assistant for three years before taking the job last spring after Vince Gibson resigned to become the head coach at Tulane. This, however, is not Weber's first major college head coaching assignment. He had a similar post at Arizona between 1969-72 when the Wildcats put together a 16-26 report card.

THE SERIES: Tonight marks the sixth meeting between the schools, dating back to 1952 when Louisville won its only game, 41-14. Since that time the Tribe has dominated, winning 59-0 in 1953, 47-6 in 1954, 9-7 in 1970 and 27-0 in 1979. The Cards are on the Seminole schedule in each of the next three seasons with all games slated for Tallahassee.

THE CAPTAINS: FSU has four captains--offensive guard Greg Futch, offensive tackle Ken Lanier, noseguard Ron Simmons and linebacker Reggie Herring. Tri-captains for the visiting Cardinals include defensive tackle Dan Dihtzeruk, offensive tackle Joe Jacoby and defensive back Jamie Perrin.
