

# Tribe Tonight

Number three vs. Number 10. Need anything more be said?

That's the basic story line for tonight's Doak Campbell Stadium matchup between the Pittsburgh Panthers (No. 3) and Florida State (No. 10). Those are the rankings the two teams were given this week in the United Press International Top 20 poll.

There are other numbers that are of interest too. For instance...

(1) Pittsburgh ranks fourth in total defense giving up 177.7 yards per game while Florida State is ninth at 211.2

(2) Pittsburgh is third in scoring defense at 3.0 per game while the Seminoles are two steps back at 6.2.

(3) The Panthers rate second in the nation for rushing defense (31.0) while FSU is 14th giving up 99.0 yards per game.

You should by now get the idea that the Seminole offensive unit will have its hands full against a Panther defense that is headed by three-time consensus All-American end Hugh

"Without a doubt the Pittsburgh defense is the best we'll face this season," says head coach Bobby Bowden. "The Nebraska defense was good, but it's nothing compared to the one Pitt will throw at us."

Not to be overlooked, however, is the Seminole defense.

"The defense is what changed around the momentum," Bowden in discussing last week's upset victory (18-14) at Nebraska. That win many now consider the biggest in Seminole football history.

The Tribe defenders were instrumental in the second half comeback. Not only did they blank the Huskers in point production over the final 30 minutes, but also caused three critical turnovers.

Keystone of that defensive effort was senior linebacker Paul Piurowski. The Sarasota senior finished the afternoon with 13 solo tackles and nine more assists. The tackle Seminole fans will remember most, though, is the one at the close of the game where he brought down Nebraska quarterback Jeff Quinn, forcing a

fumble that was recovered by Garry Futch and gave the Tribe possession with just 10 seconds remaining. That tackle ended a last-ditch Nebraska effort to preserve its unbeaten record.

'We were in a basic defense," said Piurowski. "My man was the fullback. As the play began, right in front of me a hole opened. The fullback took the angle into the line so I figured he was not going to release for a pas. I just took the gap in front of me. I didn't want to grab Quinn by the jersey because it was the tearaway kind.

"So I got my hand inside his collar and took a grip on his shoulder pad. I knew he was trying to throw it so I had to spin him around. I did and the ball fell to the ground."

That Piurowski performance earned numerous honors during the week. Associated Press picked him as its "National Lineman of the Week." Sports Illustrated named him Defensive Player of the Week. He was also named the Associated Press Southeastern Lineman of the Week and United Press International Southeastern Defensive Player of the Week.

The national honor marked the first time a Seminole gridder has been cited in that manner since 1977 when Ron Simmons was also AP's National Lineman of the week for his work in a game vs. North Texas State.

"No player is more deserving," Bowden said. "Paul's performance Saturday was outstanding, but he has been a good one for us since he stepped on campus four years ago."

So, although offense is what the fans come to see, pay special attention to the Seminole and Panther defenses tonight. More than likely that play along with the work of the special teams will determine the winner in a game that undoubtedly is the headliner today across the nation. All eyes and ears will be focused on Tallahassee tonight awaiting the outcome of this one.

PITTSBURGH-Second Avenue is the dreary main drag in the Hazelwood section of this blue collar city, muscling its way past the imposing row of steel mills fronting the Monongahela River. The night rain is pounding futilely against the decades of pollution that give the stores and bars squatting beneath the mills a sinister cast.

The rugged neighborhood projects a forboding portrait of uneasiness to strangers, imagined dangers lurking in every shadow. That's why the Chasmar, one of the small neighborhood bars frequented almost nightly by a regular lineup of mill "hunkies" and other Hazelwood residents, seems such a paradox.

Through the heavy door is a comfortable and festive atmosphere. The men and their ladies drown the labors of the day in a procession of shots-and-beer and a boisterous repartee heavy on sports and good-natured putdowns. The bartender can't recall a single fight in the Chasmar since it opened in July, 1977. It's the kind of place where patrons routinely lean across

the bar to draw themselves another Iron City beer and mark it down on their own tab. Everyone is on first-name basis and some regulars are so consistent, the owners say if they don't show "we call to see if they're sick."

The "city of champions" decor includes pennants and T-shirts of the football Steelers and the baseball Pirates. Far more prominent, though, are trappings of the collegiate Pitt Panthers. The young manager of the Chasmar was linebacker and strong safety on Pitt's 1976 national champions. A display case contains ceramic football dolls representing that squad's starting offense and defense. The black-faced doll on the end of the top row wears blue and gold jersey No. 33, representing Heisman halfback Tony Dorsett. The back wall features a huge mural com

memorating the time the bar's manager blocked a Notre Dame punt. His Pitt helmet is perched in a position of honor high above the rows of tumblers and shot glasses. Little wonder that current Panther players cruise down from the near-by campus almost nightly to dispose of a pitcher of Iron City and join Chasmar patrons in discussions of how Pitt's promising 1980 team will win another national title.

One Chasmar bartender squirms uncomfortably each time the subject is broached. He was born and raised in Hazelwood and attended scads of Panther games while his older brother—the bar's manager—was in uniform. Yet, the summer part-timer winces painfully each time the customers break into yet another chortling cry of "PITT IS IT! PITT IS IT! PITT

The part-time bartender is Florida State's third-team All-American defensive back Monk Bonasorte, who will be on the spot when the pass-happy Pitt Panthers swoop into Tallahassee Oct. 11. The Pitt players and other Chasmar patrons have spent a large portion of the offseason assailing Bonasorte with good-natured needling about the approaching confrontation. Like Saturday night when a Chasmar regular

named Angelo led three Pitt players in a frolick ing, chanting snake dance past where Bonasorte and a Florida journalist were seated. Angelo wore a Panther helmet and jersey and the chant taunted that Pitt is "it" and Florida State is some-thing that rhymes with "it". Bonasorte's shoulders slumped and he glanced across the bar toward Angelo's wife. "He's all yours, Pat," said Monk, managing a feeble smile.

While most Florida State players point to the annual war with the arch-rival Gators, it is under-standable that Bonasorte's juices boil more for the Panthers. "The Pitt game is more intense for me because I know what I'll have to put up with when I come home," he says.

When the two schools last played in 1978, Monk, then a sophomore, gave an inspired per-formance as favored Pitt narrowly escaped, 7-3. And he recently told a reporter he would personally take charge of getting his Seminole teammates ready to play the Panthers next October. I'm tired of hearing all that 'Pitt is No. 1' stuff, he was quoted. Bonasorte says he didn't mean it as questioning the Panther credentials. But Pitt Coach Jackie Sherrill was ruffled.

Bonasorte was working out with Pitt players one afternoon last week when Sherrill walked up and darkly alluded to the story. "Don't let your mouth write a check that your ass can't cash, Sherrill warned ominously, then turned and

Monk was stunned. Sherrill has been part of the Pitt football family that has frequented the Chasmar and been treated royally by the bar's owners, Monk's parents, Charles and Mary

Ann. "I can't understand why Sherrill would say a thing like that to Monk," says Chuck Bonasorte, the bar manager and older brother who was known as Kamikaze Kid when he played at Pitt.

"Hey, we been jaggin' Monk," Chuck confided with a wink when he was sure his kid brother was out of earshot, "but when it comes right down to it, blood is thicker than water."

Mary Ann Bonasorte makes no effort to hide her loyalty to son Monk and his adopted Southern school. When Pitt and FSU played in 1978, Chuck decorated the Front half of the bar in the Panthers' blue and gold, while Mary Ann adorned the back half in FSU's garnet and gold. She recently put a copy of "The Ballad of Bobby Bowden," the song saluting FSU's coach, on the Chasmar juke box and played it every time Pitt players showed up. Saturday night she challenged Panther linebacker Earl Washington to a wager on this year's Pitt-FSU game. If FSU wins, she would get to shave Earl's head and if Pitt wins, he could shave her head. Earl grinned and declined the bet.

Despite the kidding, Mary Ann Bonasorte is still "Mom" to all the Pitt players who frequent the Chasmar. She routinely pushes them into a chair and shoves a plate of spaghetti or a steak in front of them. "I'm gonna cook their pregame meal before the Florida State game," she laughs, "and stir in plenty of Ex-Lax.

Even Angelo the Mailman, it is said, spends more time in the fall following the fortunes of young Monk than the nearby Panthers. Angelo has been known to shiver in his car in the chill of a frigid Pittsburgh evening straining to decipher the crackle of an Atlanta radio station that carries Florida State broadcasts. "Monk is the hero of this neighborhood," explains a Chasmar regular. The adoration is clearly definable.


Handsome, dark-haired Monk Bonasorte is a young man with impeccable manners that belie his street education. As a lad, he was arrested several times "for petty, stupid things" and once spent a night on the cold concrete slab of the city jail for fighting on the Pitt campus.

"We'd hang out on the corner drinking beer and when the cops would come by and tell us to move, we wouldn't," he recalls. "It's like the scene in 'Rocky' where the guys build a fire in the garbage can to keep warm so they can stay out on the corner. That's really what it's like."

Bonasorte himself is prime "Rocky" material. His route to success and respect has been on a path paved more by determination than talent. He led the nation's college defensive backs in interceptions much of last season (he finished third with eight) despite trailing most of them in speed. He sheepishly claims he has never been clocked in the 40-yard sprint. "Even if I knew, I wouldn't tell anyone," he grins.

Although an all-city selection in Pittsburgh's smallest prep classification, Monk found that no colleges were interested in a 6-foot-1, 185-pound tight end who could barely outrun coeds. Upon graduation from tiny Bishop Boyle High School, Monk said he "gave up on myself. I never thought about going to school just to go to school. If I couldn't play ball, I just figured I'd get a job in a mill.

He began playing on a sandlot football team, the Hazelwood Volunteers. Players provided their own equipment and games were played on hard, grassless fields before a few friends who would show up with a bottle of wine or a six-pack of beer. "There were no bleachers and the peo-ple would sort of drift onto the field while they

were talking," Monk recounts. "Late in the game, if you ran a sweep near the sidelines, you'd have to run over bottles and cans. So you didn't run a lot of sweeps. You'd call plays that stayed in the middle of the field.

Bonasorte had been out of high school almost two years when he walked on at Florida State in the spring of 1977 in an attempt to make the team. Mary Ann Bonasorte cashed an insurance policy on the gamble that he could win a scholarship and continue his pursuit of a college educa-Monk, "and there was no way I could afford to pay my own way beyond that one quarter.

That spring, Monk, who switched to defensive back when he noticed all the tight ends had to duck under door facings, made three interceptions and returned a mid-air fumble 98 yards. was on the opposite side of the field and the ball just popped up right in my arms. And one of the interceptions came when I fell on the ground and the pass came right to me," Monk remembers. 'Somebody was on my side. I got every break. If I didn't, I could be working in the mill or sitting here wasting my time."

Monk also made some of his own breaks. With FSU short of long snappers that spring, Monk quickly learned how and centered for punts in his first Garnet and Gold spring game. "I'd play anything just to make the team," he

Bonasorte returned home for the summer of '77 not knowing if his spring had been a tempting fantasy or the start of a new life. He reported for preseason practice in August knowing that if he hadn't earned a scholarship by school registra-tion day, when tuition would have to be paid, the dream would burst.

On the eve of registration, Monk learned he would be granted a scholarship.

Now the young man destined to pull an Iron City tap or labor in a dingy steel mill the rest of his life is closing in on a degree in criminology. He's listening with pleasure when his FSU coaches forecast a promising career as a football coach.

Or, who knows? Maybe even the NFL, which normally measures only height and weight, can find room for the indominable will of a slow little guy experienced in tightroping down the sidelines dodging tacklers and wine bottles.

DIVE FOR FIVE--Florida State (4-1) and Pittsburgh (4-0), two of the nation's premier independents, collide Saturday.

SITE-Doak S. Campbell Stadium (51,094), Tallahassee, Fla.

KICKOFF--7:00 p.m. EDT

ATTENDANCE--It's a sellout.

RADIO & TELEVISION—Radio networks of both schools will carry the game with Mutual Radio slated to do the game nationwide. ESPN will tape the game for nationwide telecast late Saturday and WIAE-TV, Pittsburgh, will send the game back to the Steal city. Gene Deckerhoff and Bill Peterson are the play-by-play and color commentators on the FSU radio network which includes more than 50 stations across the southeast. Mutual staff announcer Jim Gannon will do the play-by-play on the nationwide broadcast with former FSU quarterback Vic Prinzi providing analytical commentary. The ESPN team will include veteran play-by-play announcer Jim Simpson with former Oklahoma and St. Louis Cardinal head coach Bud Wilkinson giving analysis.

THE SFASONS—Florida State's only disappointment has been a 10-9 loss to Miami. That defeat came after the Tribe had won three straight to extend a regular season win streak to 18 games. Those initial wins came against LSU, 16-0, Louisville, 52-0 and East Carolina, 63-7. The Tribe returned to the winning track last week with an 18-14 upset win over third-ranked Nebraska at Lincoln. Pittsburgh, selected in preseason by SPORTS ILLUSTRATED and GAME PLAN to win the national championship, has rolled past Kansas, 18-3, Temple, 36-2, and Maryland, 38-9 after a close 14-6 call with Boston College in its opener.

LAST WEEK--Florida State pulled off what many observers believe is the biggest win in the school's history, 18-14 over No. 3 Nebraska at Lincoln before a crowd of 76,125, the second largest to ever watch FSU play. The Seminoles trailed in this one, 14-3, at intermission, but took the lead with a 12-point third quarter. FSU added three insurance points in the final quarter. Bill Capece accounted for 12 of the Seminole points with four field goals. The other six came on a six-yard touchdown romp by tailback Sam Platt. Much of the victory belonged to the defense which allowed Nebraska 368 yards, but forced the Huskers into four turnovers--two interceptions and two fumbles. Linebacker Paul Piurowski sparked the defensive effort with 18 total tackles--12 unassisted.

Pittsburgh quarterback Dan Marino tossed three touchdown passes as the Panthers waltzed to a 38-9 win over Maryland. Marino, who sustained a slight knee sprain in the previous week's game, completed 16 of 34 passes for 282 yards. The Panther defense limited Maryland to just 22 rushing yards in 43 attempts.

THE SERIES—Both schools have two wins apiece in a series that dates back to the 1971 season when FSU won a 31-13 verdict at Tallahassee. The following year the Tribe took a 19-7 verdict at Pittsburgh. In 1974, the Panthers won 9-6 in Tallahassee and in 1978 they won a 7-3 verdict in Pittsburgh to even the series.

THE LAST TIME--Florida State's defense gave its best effort of the season, but it wasn't enough as the Seminoles bowed 7-3 to 15th ranked Pittsburgh on October 21, 1978. The visiting Seminoles were not without their scoring opportunities. Early in the first quarter placekicker Dave Cappelen missed on a 21-yard field goal. Late in the game FSU advanced to the Pitt 20 before a fumble killed the drive. In defeat, FSU out-gained Pitt, 331-297 with 220 of Florida State's yards coming in the air. Seminoles QBs Jimmy Jordan and Wally Woodham combined to connect with eight different receivers for 21 completions in 42 attempts.

THE COACHES—Bobby Bowden (Samford '52) is in the midst of his fifth season as head coach for FSU. His record here is 38-13 and includes victories in 19 of the last 21 games. The record is impressive when one recalls Bowden started 0-3 and went 5-6 in that first season (1976). In the last three years Bowden has taken the Tribe to two bowl appearances (1977 Tangerine and 1980 Orange). Bowden last year was cited by ABC-TV and Chevrolet as its Division I-A Coach of the Year and was also the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons. This is Bowden's third head coaching stop. He was previously at Samford (31-6) and West Virginia (42-26) which gives him an overall coaching mark of 111-44. The victory total at the start of the current season (107-44) ranked 10th among active head coaches in I-A. The percentage (.709) was 11th among I-A and I-AA head coaches.

Jackie Sherrill (Alabama '66) has a 32-7-1 record in three seasons plus four games as the Pittsburgh head coach. Twice his Panthers have finished the season ranked sixth in the country by the polls. Last year his team finished 11-1, was ranked sixth, won the Eastern Championship and beat Arizona 16-10 in the Fiesta Bowl. He was named Eastern Coach-of-the-Year by the New York Press Writers Association. Sherrill originally joined the Pitt staff in 1973 as Johnny Majors' top assistant and left for a one-year stint as head coach at Washington State where his team went 3-8. He was a clear-cut choice for the Panther job when Majors opted for Tennessee. Overall, Sherrill sports a 35-15-1 record in five seasons plus as a major college head coach.

THE CAPTAINS—Florida State has four—offensively the honor belongs to guard Greg Futch and tackle Ken Lanier. Defensive representatives are noseguard Ron Simmons and linebacker Reggie Herring. Pitt will not announce its captains until game time.

BOWDEN & PITT—Seminole head coach Bobby Bowden is quite familiar with the Pittsburgh program. He has been a head coach with Pittsburgh as the opponent seven times with the Panthers owning a 4-3 advantage. He was 3-3 during his stay at West Virginia and is 0-1 since coming to Florida State. The loss as head coach at FSU came in 1978, 7-3. The Bowden victories vs. Pitt while at West Virginia came in 1971 (20-9), 1972 (38-20) and 1975 (17-14). The losses were 1970 (36-35), 1975 (35-7) and 1974 (31-14).

PITTSBURGH'S HOMETOWN—Seminole defensive coordinator Jack Stanton is a native of Carnegie, Pa., a Pittsburgh suburb. His mother still resides in that city.

PLAYER TIED, TOO-Seminole safety Monk Bonasorte will be seeing a lot of familiar faces on the other side this week. He's a Pittsburgh native and spent this summer working out with many of the Panthers. His brother, Chuck, played for Pittsburgh and now helps operate a tavern near the Pitt campus. Monk became the all-time career interception for FSU last week when he picked off a Nebraska aerial in the second quarter—it was his 14th career theft and second of the season.

MORE ABOUT SELLOUT—The Pitt game will be the second home sellout this season for FSU. All tickets for this game were gone last week, marking one of the earliest sellouts in history for a non-Florida game at FSU. When everyone is counted it's quite possible FSU will set a new single game attendance record for Doak Campbell, passing the mark of 52,623 set this season against Louisville in the opener.

YARDAGE WAS WORST—Since Bobby Bowden's arrival at FSU the Tribe has not had poorer offensive totals than those generated in last week's win at Nebraska. The 12 yards rushing was 13 less than the previous low—25 vs. Miami only a week earlier. And, the 166 total yards was also the worst in the Bowden-FSU era. The previous low was 174 vs. Miami in 1976.

CAPECE TIES RECORD -- FSU tied a single game school record for most field goals with his four successful boots vs. Nebraska. Two others have also accomplished the feat--Frank Fontes vs. Wake Forest in 1970 and Davey Cappelen against South Carolina last season.

MORE ABOUT CAPECE—Tribe placekicker Bill Capece has now hit on nine of 10 field goal tries this season. His only miss was from 52 yards out in the second quarter of the opener at LSU. Since that time he has connected for seven straight. Bill has also hit on 17 of 17 PAT attempts this season and has hit 19 straight over a two-year period.

ANOTHER TOUGH DEFENSE—In Pittsburgh, the Seminoles will be facing their third straight strong defensive unit. When the Seminoles played Miami, the Hurricanes were second rated in total defense and the Seminoles were first. Last week the Tribe had fallen to fourth and Nebraska was eighth. Now comes Pitt which rated second in last week's NCAA listings.

MORE ABOUT PITT 'D'--Pittsburgh's rushing defense also ranks among the best in the country. Last week the Panthers were third in the country and this week will probably move to second after giving up just 22 yards to Maryland. The top team, Miami, was idle and Missouri gave Penn State 212 yards along the ground.

TRIBE HOME WIN STREAK--Florida State now has an 11-game home field winning streak. The Tribe has not lost in Doak Campbell Stadium since the 1978 campaign when Houston escaped with a 27-21 victory. It was the only home loss in a six-game home schedule that season and last year the Tribe finished 5-0 in its home stadium. FSU has gone 2-0 in Doak Campbell this year.

BB IN DOAK-Doak Campbell Stadium has treated Seminole head coach Bobby Bowden well since 1976. In that time the Tribe has a 19-4 record, with two of the losses coming in the first year--33-26 to Florida and 15-12 to Clemson.

PANTHERS ON ROAD—This will be just the second road trip of the season for Pitt. The Panthers previously played at Kansas where they won an 18-3 verdict. Pitt has not lost on the road since it was beaten 17-7 at North Carolina last season. Since that game the Panthers have registered seven consecutive road victories including the 16-10 Fiesta Bowl win over Arizona.

TRIBE RUSHING STATS-In the last two games, the Seminole rushing stats have been anything but impressive. The total yardage along the ground generated by the offense has been 37 yards-25 vs. Miami and 12 vs. Nebraska. Much of the Tribe problem has come because of quarterback sacks. Rick Stockstill has been nailed for 81 yards in losses during those two games.

OFFENSE STILL BALANCED—The Seminole coaching staff has always indicated it wanted a balanced attack. The current offensive statistics show the Tribe is achieving that goal. Thus far in 1980 the Seminoles have 1,606 yards total offense with 802 along the ground and 804 through the air.

BIG SCORES AT HOME—In its last three home appearances, Florida State has rolled up some mighty impressive scoring numbers. This season the Tribe has pummelled Louisville, 52-0, and East Carolina, 63-7. Last year the Seminoles closed their home campaign with a 66-17 win over Memphis State. Combined that gives you a total score of 181-27.

RANKINGS BATTLE—FSU will be playing a Top 20 team for the third straight week.

When the Seminoles met Miami, the Hurricanes were rated 19th by United Press International. Last week Nebraska was third in both the Associated Press and United Press polls. And, this week Pitt will probably be ranked in the top five of both polls. The Panthers were rated sixth last week in both polls and appear to be a cinch to move up since two of the top five were beaten.

TOP INDEPENDENTS OF '79—Florida State and Pitt with their 11-1 records of 1979 were regarded as last year's leading independents. In the final Associated Press poll, FSU finished the year rated sixth and Pittsburgh eighth. The Panthers did not rate in UPI's top 10, but the Seminoles were eighth.

STREAKS—Pitt has one of the nation's longest. The Panthers have won 14 straight since losing 17-7 at North Carolina last season in the second game of the year. The win streak includes the 16-10 Fiesta Bowl victory over Arizona.

#### WHAT THE PLAYERS SAY ...

DB BOBBY BUTLER--"Sure the defense played well, but we also made some mistakes against Nebraska--like that fourth and 12 pass we let them complete. That should never have happened. That was the biggest win since I've been at FSU. It's something

to beat Nebraska, but it was great doing it there.

"We have to go right back and work just as hard this week as we did last. Pittsburgh knows how well we did against Nebraska and they're undefeated-they don't want

to lose their ranking." to at all was louise

OG GREG FUTCH--"I think the key to our winning at Nebraska was that we went to a roll and pass offense, and not just our normal straight back passing attack. It seemed to open things up better. I was impressed with the way Jerry Coleman (center) and Eric Ryan (guard) played. It's tough to have your first start, but your first start against Nebraska is really something.

"We have to go right back and work this week to make it two straight. Pittsburgh

is every bit as good as Nebraska and we're looking for another dog fight."

FB MIKE WHITING--"That was my biggest win ever--no doubt. I feel wonderful. You just can't explain it. I think the offense decided we had to do our best and not make any mistakes. We had to execute correctly and pick up the tempo. I think the win

proved we are a pretty strong team by beating a team like Nebraska.

"The big key in the second half to me was that we protected Rick. We need to do that again this week and it will be tougher since Hugh Green is such a great football player. Rick will need to get the time to throw and it can't happen if Hugh Green is

in his face on every play.

#### WHAT BOBBY SAYS...

ABOUT NEBRASKA WIN-"No doubt about it—the Nebraska win was a big, big win.
Nationally I doubt that FSU has ever had one bigger. It will surely have a lot of impact across the country. Folks just don't go to Lincoln and come away very often with a win.

"I feel very fortunate to be able to win a game like that. Nebraska has a tremendous program. My feeling on them hasn't changed one bit-they're as good as anybody in the country.

"I can't tell right now how much this win will mean to us nationally. I just know that teams aren't supposed to go to Nebraska and win. It just doesn't happen

very often.

"Thinking back this must rank in the top four wins I've had as a head coach. "Thinking back this must rank in the top four wins I've had as a head coach." The other three were against California and Pittsburgh while I was at West Virginia in '75 and our first win over Florida here at FSU. But none of those carried the national importance that this one has."

ABOUT PITTSBURGH--"Hang on because this will be another great football team. Their defense is the best in the country. Yes, they have a better defense than Nebraska and you know that spells trouble for us if the offensive line can't figure out a way to block them.

"Pittsburgh deserves to receive the recognition it has picked up already this year. They have a whole lot of folks returning from last season when they won 10

straight after losing in the second game of the year.
"It didn't surprise me that Pitt got started slowly this year. They always seem to begin like that and then about midway through the season they just blow folks away. Look at the schedule and results for this year-that pattern seems to be holding true.

"We can't afford a let up or they will dominate the game. I know one thing-it will be to our advantage playing in Tallahassee. We're going to have the fans behind us, but remember we went to Lincoln with all those Nebraska fans and won. Pitt can

do the same here."

PLAYERS TO WATCH...

# FLORIDA STATE

NG RON SIMMONS--(No. 50, 6-1, 230, Sr., Warner Robins, Ga.)--is recovering from a crippling ankle injury in the LSU game that sidelined him for both the East Carolina and Louisville games. He played about half the Miami game and went most of the way in upset victory over Nebraska. He's the most honored player in FSU football history, making consensus All-America last year as a junior. In addition he was ninth in the Heisman voting and a semi-finalist for the Lombardi Award.

DB MONK BONASORTE—(No. 42, 6-1, 175, Sr., Pittsburgh, Pa.)—now has sole possession of the FSU school record for career interceptions—13, including two this year. He picked up the record-breaker in last week's win at Nebraska with a second quarter theft. Last season he picked off eight enemy passes—fourth best in the country and was named third team Associated Press All-American. He is one of the top success stories in college football, coming to FSU as a walk—on and first attempting to make it as a tight end.

P ROHN STARK--(No. 3, 6-3, 195, Jr., Fifty Lakes, Minn.)--has a 46.7 kicking average with 28 boots this season. That includes a 48.4 average in seven kicks last week at Nebraska. His longest boot of the year was for 59 yards against Nebraska. Stark is one of the rare two sport athletes still competing at the college level. He is a member of the FSU track and field team where he competes in the decathalon. In 1978, Stark won the Metro Conference decathalon championship. He was red-shirted in the sport last season.

LB PAUL PIUROWSKI--(No. 53, 6-3, 220, Sr., Sarasota, Fla.)--played one of the finest games of his collegiate career vs. Nebraska. Tribe defensive coaches graded him at 80 percent for the game. Individual totals included 13 solo tackles and nine more assists. He was also credited with two tackles for loss, three intimidating hits and four third down stops. A three-year starter, Paul has recovered from knee surgery in his sophomore season. His current season stats include 83 total tackles-43 solo and 40 assists.

QB RICK STOCKSTILL--(No. 11, 6-1, 185, Jr., Fernandina Beach, Fla.)--has made the Seminole quarterback transition an easy one. After the graduation of Jimmy Jordan and Wally Woodham, he has filled the void more than adequately. His current passing stats--through five games he has completed 59 of 89 passes for 618 yards. Five of those completions have gone for touchdowns while two tosses have been intercepted. Against the Nebraska defense, which pressured him throughout the afternoon, he completed 15 of 25 for 154 yards.

#### PITTSBURGH

DE HUGH GREEN--(No. 99, 6-2, 220, Sr., Natchez, Miss.)--is the "All" candidate for Pitt. The Pittsburgh media guide describes him as "a devastating and dominating performer." He has already been designated as a two-time consensus All-America and appears to be a shoo-in for those honors again this season. He is the cornerstone of the Pitt defense that ranked fourth in total defense, fifth in scoring defense and seventh in rushing defense last season.

QB DAN MARINO--(No. 13, 6-4, 215, So., Pittsburgh, Pa.)--many Panther observers consider Dan the best young quarterback in the country today. Despite being just a freshman he started five games for the Panthers last season and passed for 1,680 yards, more than any other freshman in Panther history. This season he's hitting an even 50 percent, completing 65 of 130 for 893 yards. Ten of those completions have been for touchdowns, including three last week vs. Maryland. He has been intercepted six times.
