# Tribe Tonight

Florida State vs. Florida.  
Really, does this game need any introduction?

"No," says head coach Bobby Bowden of Florida State, "there is not a more important game on our schedule than Florida. It's for braggin' rights in the state. Coaches won't need to say a great deal to their team today—the team gets ready without any help from the coaches."

It has been said before, but this game ranks right up there with the other biggies around the country each year. It need not take a back seat to Pittsburgh-Penn State, Ohio State-Michigan, Alabama-Auburn or USC-UCLA.

"Nobody needs to be ashamed when they talk about the Florida State-Florida game," says Bowden. "It ranks right up there with the best of them each season."

Probably a reason that Florida State vs. Florida does not have the recognition of those other games is that it has never received the national publicity the others receive. For that reason, FSU elected last month to wait four weeks to play the game to accommodate a request by ABC-TV to do the game nationally.

"The network wanted us to move the game and I quickly agreed," said Bowden. "Sure the money (\$300,000) was a factor, but that didn't mean as much to me as the nationwide recognition the game and the Florida State football program will receive with a national telecast."

"The only way for people to know about our football program and the rivalry that exists between Florida State and Florida is to put the game before the public. That's what we're doing."

"The fact that the entire nation will have the opportunity to watch this great game far outweighs the fact that we've been idle for four weeks. Sure, I'm worried about the possibility of our team being rusty and our timing not being what it should be, but remember this is Florida State vs. Florida. The game could be played at 3 a.m. on Christmas Day but both teams would be ready and it would draw a sellout crowd."

The long layoff has allowed FSU to become completely healthy for the first time since the opener at LSU. All-American noseguard Ron Simmons, who sprained an ankle at LSU and has been hobbled ever since, had

time to rest the last three weeks and is now playing like the Simmons of '77-79 vintage.

THE GAME has taken on special meaning this year.

FSU fans know their team must win to maintain the high national ranking it currently enjoys—third in both the Associated Press and United Press International polls. The Tribe still has an opportunity to win the national championship if Notre Dame and Georgia lose, but an FSU defeat would eliminate any possibility of the Seminoles winning their first-ever football crown.

This game has special meaning for the Seminole seniors. They could become the first group of seniors in the school history to graduate and say they never lost to Florida on the football field. In the same respect, Florida will be fighting hard for a victory. The Gator seniors will not want to be known as the group that never won against the Seminoles.

Florida needs the win to return to a berth in the Top 20, a spot it enjoyed several times this season, most recently as last week prior to the Miami loss. A win over FSU would certainly put the Gators back with the national elite.

Both teams also need a win today to gain momentum for their bowl dates. FSU, as everyone knows, will return to Miami for the second straight year to face Oklahoma, the Big Eight champion, on New Years Night. Florida has a Tangerine bowl date with Maryland.

So, the stage is set. Sit back and enjoy the 23rd renewal of the FSU vs.

Florida series. If it's anything like the last four (since Bobby Bowden took over the Seminole head coaching position), the happenings of this one will keep you talking for several months.

TRIBE TIDBITS: Today's television appearance is the seventh in the last two seasons for FSU with still the Orange Bowl national telecast remaining... This will be the sixth ABC-TV appearance in two seasons for FSU, the second national although last year's LSU game went to 84 percent of the country and would in many circles be considered a national telecast... Seminole mentor Bobby Bowden is 8-0 with ABC-TV since coming to FSU in 1976... Tribe defense, with an excellent effort today, could finish the regular season as the country's top team in total defense and scoring defense... FSU ticket office is still accepting applications for Orange Bowl ducats which this year are going for \$15 apiece...

# SEMINOLES SAY GOOD-BYE TO SENIORS TODAY

When the senior class of 1980 takes the field this afternoon, they could represent the first group of Florida State players to defeat arch rival Florida four straight years. In those years, the four year veterans have amassed a 38-7 record with this game and January 1 appointment with Oklahoma to go. The group played in the Seminoles first bowl in six years, The Tangerine, and brought the University its first major bowl berth with last season's Orange Bowl.

Fans looking back at the Class of '80 will have a difficult time determining a favorite. First on the list of the 'Big Boys' is nose guard Ron Simmons. All-Everything for the Seminoles last season, Simmons was selected first team Associated Press, United Press International, Walter Camp, Football News and The American Coaches Association (Kodak) squad. More stunning was Simmons' ninth place finish in the voting for the Heisman Trophy and his pick as semi-finalist in the Lombardi award. The 6-1, 235 pound Warner Robbins native again earned Kodak honors in 1980 and is one of the four finalists for the Lombardi. In four regional or national televised games, Simmons has won the ABC-TV/Chevrolet scholarship award. One of the four Tribe captains, Simmons will call his last coin toss at Campbell Stadium.

Also on defense, the Tribe loses its two starting linebackers Reggie Herring and Paul Piurowski. One of the finest linebacking duos in the nation, Herring and Piurowski are No. 1 and No. 2 in tackles for the Tribe. The heart of the defense, both players have earned national honors this year, with Piurowski being tabbed the Defensive Player of the Week by SPORTS ILLUSTRATED for his performance against Nebraska. One of the most intense Tribe players, Herring leads the squad in total tackles with 155 and six quarterback sacks—the most on the squad. Piurowski is right behind with 104 tackles after missing two games because of appendicitis.

In the trenches, Florida State loses two of its tireless players, defensive tackle Mark Macek and defensive Arthur Scott. Macek, probably the least heralded of the Seminoles

defenders, was one of the first of Bobby Bowden's players making the trek from up north. A native of Wyandotte, Michigan, Macek has not missed a game or practice since he made his first start as a sophomore. Scott, another of the 'no-name defense' is third on the team in tackles this season (61) after finally settling at defensive end after five positions changes in his career.

Probably hardest hit on defense is the Tribe's secondary corps. Gone are familiar faces Monk Bonasorte, Bobby Butler and Keith Jones. The All-Time Seminole interception leader, Bonasorte has made a name for himself in four seasons. A walk-on from Pittsburgh, Bonasorte is the team leader this year with four interceptions, after finishing fourth in the nation last year with eight thefts. Possibly the best athlete on the squad, the Tribe will miss defensive back Bobby Butler. A track All-American and outstanding football player, Butler developed the habit of blocking enemy punts nailing seven so far in his career. The third DB loss is Jones. An academic All-American, Jones proved speed and size weren't everything. Second behind Bonasorte with three interceptions, the three-year letterman may be the hardest hitter on the team.

Also lost defensively are backs Mike Smith and Homer Thomas.

When quarterback Rick Stockstill, takes the snap next year, tailback Sam Platt won't be there to run the ball. A chance to become only the third FSU player in history to rush for over 1,000 yards, Platt needs 46 yards to top that plateau. Platt was a wide receiver last season. In the air the Tribe loses Tallahassee native Kurt Unglaub. A five-year player, Unglaub has caught the ball for over 1,200 yards and has hauled in 10 touchdowns, two this season.

In the pit, the Tribe loses the services of guards Greg Futch and Lee Adams, tackle Ken Lanier and center John Madden. The third Seminole captain, Futch is a story all his own. Futch was a walk-on who made the squad only to be hampered by diabetes and a knee injury sustained in 1978. Also a five year senior, Futch was the 1979 recipient of the "Bobby Crenshaw Award" for the team's guttiest performance. At

Also missing from the offensive unit will be snapper Trent Barnes, popular guard Brent Brock and tight end Rick Houston.

The specialist leaving the Seminole camp is placekicker Bill Capece. Already the all-time Seminole single season scoring leader (99 points), Capece needs three field goals today to become the top field goal kicker in NCAA history. Additionally for the Tribe, Capece is the school single season field goal record holder (21), and is only three PATs short of typing the 1978 record on 39 held by Davey Cappelen.

"Our recent successes must be attributed in part to our seniors," said Bowden. "They have been our leadership and our inspiration. It takes many qualities to build a top football team, but you always start with the seniors."

When players and spectators reflect during the summer about the players who wore the Garnet and Gold they will certainly be missed.

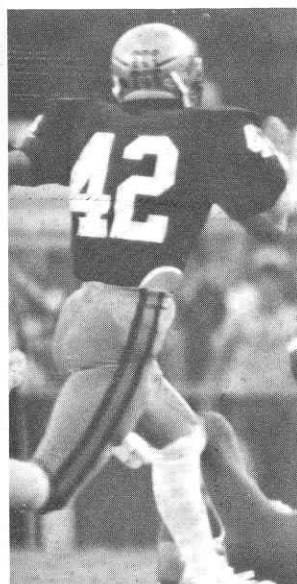

## TRIBE CAGERS CONTINUE TO CLIMB

While the Seminole basketball team was only 1-0 going to press, a trend may have already developed.

"We played smart ball against Central Florida (a 57-41 FSU win)," said head coach Joe Williams after the game. "We might have a good team after all."

Right coach. Following a 22-9 season, and a berth in the NCAA Mideast Regionals, the Seminoles return this year with even higher expectations. Gone are all-time NCAA field goal percentage shooter Murray Brown and playmaker Tony Jackson, but back are All-America candidate guard Mickey Dillard and a host of talented players.

Dillard, the Tribe's leading scorer last year with a 20.4 average, is the quickest guard in the nation. An All-Metro selection in 1979, the Ft. Lauderdale native could work his way to the top of four separate Seminole basketball records. In 30 of 31 games Dillare scored in double figures, and against NCAA Champion Louisville, the senior led Florida State Scorers three consecutive times.

Also at the guard spot are Bobby Parks and Rodney Arnold. Only 5-11, Parks has taken the role of the Tribe's offensive general replacing Jackson. Possessing probably the best outside shot on the team, Parks started 28 of 31 games in 1980. In the backcourt along with Dillard and Parks is the thrilling Arnold. A crowd favorite with his uninhibited playing style, Arnold led the team to its lone win in the NCAA Tournament with a 29 point performance against Toledo. Slowed this season with a painful hip infection, doctors hope Arnold will return for tonight's game.

In the front court, Florida State is anchored by center Elvis Rolle. Dubbed the 'Big E' by the Tully faithful, Rolle was third behind Brown in scoring with a 15.3 average. Rolle's best game was a 32 point effort vs.

Florida A&M, an individual high for any Seminole last year. At the forwards, FSU features three 'new' faces. Back for his senior campaign is 6-10 Kris Anderson. An academic casualty in 1980, Anderson started his sophomore year and most of his junior season. Also back is 6-5 James Bozeman. A local product from Florida High, Bozeman earned himself a starting spot in 1979 only to tear his achilles tendon and miss the entire season. The new face is that of 6-9 Oren Gilmore. Gilmore, brother of Chicago Bull star Artis, comes to the Seminoles after spectacular season's at Chicago Bloom Township High School. Recruited by over 100 schools, Gilmore should add needed depth at the high post position.

With bench strength a weak point

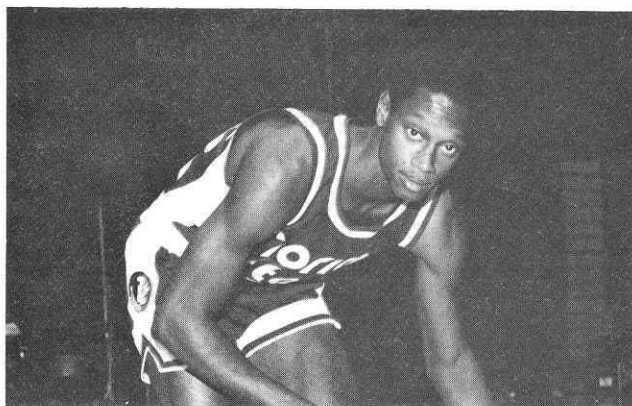
last year, the Tribe reverses that trend with the steady improvement of several key individuals. Back again is forward Pernell Tookes, a non-starter who played in all 31 games, Greg Collinsworth and Scott Matchett. The back-up guards are sophomores Ed Young and Hank McGrotha and junior Steve Dillard. Back-up centers are seniors Donnie Kuhl and Derrick Groomes.

"I'm expecting a better season this year than last," Williams said. "If we can get good leadership from our seniors and our guards can adjust to a play-making as well as a scoring role, I think we'll do just fine."

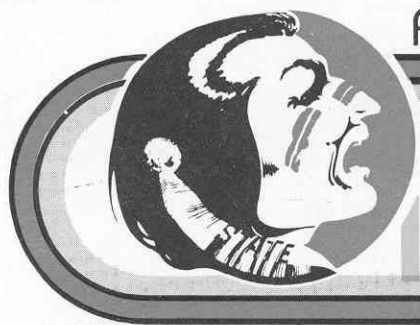


1980-81 FLORIDA STATE BASKETBALL TEAM

## WRITTEN FOR USE AS DESIRED

YEN FOR TEN--Florida State (9-1) and Florida (7-3) renew their state rivalry for the 23rd time Saturday.

SITE--Doak Campbell Stadium (51,094), Tallahassee, Fla.

KICKOFF--12:25 p.m. EST.

EXPECTED ATTENDANCE--The game has been a sellout since mid-summer. It's quite likely a new Doak Campbell Stadium attendance record will be established, the current high is 52,894 for this year's (Oct. 11) Pittsburgh game.

TV & RADIO--ABC-TV for the second straight year has picked the game for national telecast. Announcers will be Al Michaels (play-by-play) and Ara Parseghian (color). The game is part of a national doubleheader with Southern California hosting Notre Dame in the second game.

Mutual Radio has also picked the game for a national broadcast. Jim Gannon will have play-by-play responsibility with former FSU quarterback Vic Prinzi doing the analytical commentary.

Florida State's radio network will beam the game to most of the south. WGLF-FM, Tallahassee, is the flagship station for the 57 station network that features Gene Deckerhoff doing play-by-play and former FSU head coach Bill Peterson doing analysis.

Florida's network also covers much of the south. Play-by-play is handled by Otis Boggs with former Gator linebacker Fred Abbott and radio veteran Bob Leach in color roles.

THE SEASONS--Florida State, after a loss (10-9) in the fourth game of the campaign at Miami, has rolled to six straight wins. The win streak began at Nebraska where the Tribe dumped the third ranked Cornhuskers, 18-14. The following week third-ranked Pittsburgh came to Tallahassee and FSU won a 36-22 decision. Wins over Boston College (41-7), Memphis State (24-3), Tulsa (45-2) and Virginia Tech (31-7) have followed.

Florida, after finishing a miserable 0-10-1 last season, comes to Tallahassee with a 7-3 record. The Gators started the season with three straight wins before losing to LSU, 24-7. Other losses have been administered by top ranked Georgia, 26-21, and Miami, 31-7.

LAST WEEK--Florida State has been idle since November 8 when it downed Virginia Tech, 31-7, in an ABC-TV regional broadcast. The win was the sixth straight for the Seminoles.

Florida, after a week layoff, was beaten 31-7 by Miami (Florida) last Saturday. Florida marched to a touchdown after the opening kickoff but was never able to score after that. Miami, meanwhile, had a 10-point first quarter and added another 12 in the second.

THE SERIES--Despite the fact that FSU has won the last three meetings, Florida still has a 16-5-1 series advantage. The Seminoles fell behind in the series when Florida won five of the first six games. The sixth ended in a 3-3 deadlock. The teams have played every year since 1958 when Florida won 21-7 in Gainesville.

THE LAST TIME--Florida State completed its first undefeated season as a major college by dumping the Gators, 27-16, at Gainesville last November 23. The game was part of an ABC-TV national doubleheader on the Friday following Thanksgiving. FSU had a 10-0 halftime lead on a 42-yard Davey Cappelen field goal and 21-yard pass from Jimmy Jordan to Hardis Johnson. Florida, however, came back with 10 points in the third quarter to knot the count. But in the fourth quarter the Tribe lead zoomed to 20-10 on a 20-yard run by fullback Mark Lyles and 18-yard field goal by Bill Capece. Florida got six of the points back before FSU iced the win on a two-yard TD run by Lyles with Capece booting the PAT. Playing in his final regular season game for the Seminoles, Lyles rushed for a personal career high 151 yards in 27 carries. Tailback Mike Whiting picked up 123 yards in 19 attempts.

THE COACHES--When looking for someone to credit with the turn-around of the Florida State football program, most point to head coach Bobby Bowden (Samford '52). Since coming to FSU for the 1976 season, Bowden has led the Seminoles to a 43-13 record, which becomes even more impressive when one takes away the 5-6 first year and 0-3 start. The Tribe has lost just twice in its last 26 games. In the last three years, Bowden has taken FSU to two bowl appearances (1977 Tangerine and 1980 Orange). Bowden last year was cited by ABC-TV and Chevrolet as its Division I-A Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons. This is the third head coaching stop for the Birmingham, Ala., native. He was previously at Samford (31-6) and West Virginia (42-26). His overall coaching mark is now 116-45 through the Virginia Tech win. The victory total at the start of the current season (107-44) ranked 10th among active head coaches in I-A. The percentage (.709) was 11th among I-A and I-AA head coaches.

This is the second year for Charley Pell (Alabama '64) at the Florida helm. After an 0-10-1 start last year, the Gators are 7-3 this season and headed to the Tangerine Bowl after closing the regular season with the Seminoles. Pell journeyed to Florida after coaching at Clemson for two seasons and compiling an 18-4-1 record. He was also head coach at Jacksonville (Ala.) State between 1969 and 1973. Overall, he has 58-30-3 record as a college head coach.

BOWDEN AND FLORIDA--Seminole mentor Bobby Bowden has a 3-1 record in previous meetings with Florida. In his first year, the Seminoles lost a 33-26 verdict. Since then the Tribe has won by scores of 37-9, 38-21 and 27-16.

PELL AND SEMINOLES--Florida mentor Charley Pell has an 0-1 mark against the Seminoles. Last season Pell watched his Gators fall, 27-16, to the Tribe in Gainesville.

SEMINOLES, GATORS IN TALLY--This will be the 11th meeting between FSU and Florida that will be played in Tallahassee. The Seminoles have just two wins in those previous 10 games. One win came in the 1978 campaign when the Tribe stole a 38-21 verdict and the other was in 1964 when FSU won its first game ever against the Gators, 16-7.

SEMINOLES AT HOME--FSU has a 15-game home winning streak. The Tribe has not been beaten in Doak Campbell Stadium since September 30, 1978, when Houston took a 27-21 victory. The home win streak includes six games this season.



**BOWDEN IN DOAK**--Doak Campbell Stadium has served Seminole head coach Bobby Bowden well since he took over the FSU program. The tribe mentor has a 23-4 record at home in that time with two of the losses coming in the first year--33-26 to Florida and 15-12 to Clemson. Miami won 23-17 in 1977 and Houston had its win in '78.

**BREAKING DOAK DOWN MORE**--Here are some more facts about how friendly Doak Campbell Stadium has been to the Seminoles. Dating back to the last two home games of the '76 season the Seminoles have won 22 of 24 games. Taking it another step, wins have come in 16 of the last 17 home dates.

**NO PLACE LIKE HOME**--In addition to the win/loss record, there are other reasons why FSU enjoys playing on the natural grass of Doak Campbell. The Tribe enjoys a tremendous scoring advantage there. In the six games this fall, the Seminoles have a 269-45 scoring margin over their foes. That averages out to 44.6 against 7.5.

**PLATT GOING FOR FOUR, SEVEN**--Florida State's senior tailback Sam Platt needs 56 yards rushing vs. Florida to become just the third player in Seminole history to run for 1,000 yards in a single season. Platt has already set a school record for most 100 yard games in a season, six. He will be attempting to rush for 100 yards in his fourth consecutive game Saturday. In his last three outings he has run for a school record 188 vs. Memphis State, 113 vs. Tulsa and 108 vs. Virginia Tech.

**CAPECE NEEDS THREE**--Seminole placekicker Bill Capece needs to kick three field goals vs. Florida to establish a new NCAA single season record. The old mark of 21 has already been broken by Obed Ariri of Clemson, who booted 23 this season. Capece presently has 21 in 28 attempts and leads the nation in per game average, 2.10.

**MORE ABOUT CAPECE**--The Seminoles senior placekicker Bill Capece currently ranks second in the nation for individual scoring. It will be nearly impossible for him to take over the number one spot, however. He would need to score 22 points to replace Sammy Winder of Southern Mississippi, who scored 120 in 11 regular season games. Capece, in fact, will have a tough time retaining his second spot. J.C. Watts, the Oklahoma quarterback, scored four TDs last Saturday vs. Oklahoma State and now has 108 points for the season, a 9.8 average. Capece through 10 games has scored 99 points, a 9.9 average. But he will need 10 points vs. Florida to hold down the second slot or it will go to Watts.

**OTHER CAPECE FACTS**--Bill is already the leading single season scorer for FSU with his 99 points. He also has the school single season field goal record (21) and is three successful PATs short of tying the 1978 record of 39 held by Davey Cappelen. In his career, Bill has now scored 104 points which ties him for fourth all-time with Fred Biletnikoff. Five points on Saturday vs. Florida would move Capece into sixth place, a spot currently held by Bill Moremen (1965-67) and Larry Key (1974-77), who scored 108. 99 of the Capece points have come this season and the other five were scored in last year's Florida game where he converted two PATs and a field goal. He has been successful on all 38 of his PAT attempts while in college.

**SOME RECORD FACTS**--The Seminoles have set only one new individual season record. That is the 99 points by Capece. But, if tailback Sam Platt would carry the ball 25 times vs. Florida he would become the all-time single season attempts leader, replacing Larry Key, who carried 239 times in 1977. Platt can also move into the second slot for rushing yardage by gaining 58 yards against Florida. Platt has already gained 954, the third best effort for an FSU player in a single season. Mark Lyles gained 1,011 last year which is the second best. Platt would need to gain 164 yards vs. Florida to become the all-time single season rushing leader. Key picked up 1,117 during the '77 campaign.

**TEAM RECORDS**--Several Seminole team records have been set and there are possibilities for others. Records already set: (1) most points in a season (335), the old record 319 set in 1979; (2) field goals (21), breaking the old record of 15 in 1979; (3) field goals attempts (28), the old record 25 in 1970; (4) first downs rushing (129), the old record 107 in 1975; and, (5) rushing plays 554, the old record 519 in 1975.



TEAM RECORDS THAT CAN GO--With some effort vs. Florida, several more team records could be set. These include: (1) touchdowns scored--the record is 42 in 1978 and the Tribe has now scored 39; (2) touchdowns rushing--record is 21 set in 1966 and Seminoles have now scored 20; (3) yards rushing--record is 2,194 set in 1949 and Tribe has now run for 2,000; (4) pass completion percentage--record is 59.0 set in 1964 and Seminole quarterbacks are currently throwing at a 58.4 percentage.

STARK WILL DO IT--Seminole punter Rohn Stark, who currently ranks third in the nation with his 45.7 average, is assured of setting a new single season average record at FSU. The old mark for a single season is 41.9 by Pat Versprille in 1955.

TRIBE DEFENSE STANDS OUT--More than a partial reason for the FSU success this season has been the play of the Tribe defense. The Seminoles will lead the nation in two defensive categories this week--scoring (7.2 ppg) and total defense (203.3 yards ppg). But, the Tribe will need an outstanding defensive effort to protect that top ranking in total defense. Pitt has finished its season giving up just 205.4 yards per game. FSU, to keep its ranking, would need to hold Florida to 226 yards or less. In scoring defense, if the Tribe can hold Florida to 18 points or less, it would give the scoring defense title to FSU. The Seminoles have never finished the season as the national leader in either category.

FOURTH QUARTER WHITEWASH--If FSU can keep Florida scoreless in the fourth quarter Saturday, it will mean the Tribe has finished the season without its goal being crossed in the final 15 minutes. Currently the Seminoles enjoy an 89-0 scoring advantage in the final frame.

SECOND HALF THE BEST--If one wants to believe statistics, FSU plays its best in the second half. Current stats show the Tribe with a 179-21 scoring advantage in the third and fourth quarters this season. The first half difference is 156-51.

MORE ABOUT SEMINOLE WINS--Over its last 48 games, dating back to the final three games of the 1976 season, Florida State has compiled a record of 41-7. The mark over the last 35 games is 30-5 and includes the final game of the 1977 season and the Tangerine Bowl victory over Texas Tech, 40-17. The report card for the last 22 games is 20-2 with the losses being administered by Oklahoma (24-7 in the 1980 Orange Bowl) and Miami (10-9 during the current regular season).

WIN STREAK--In addition to its home win streak of 15 games, FSU also has a win streak of six games going. The Tribe has not been beaten since Miami won a 10-9 verdict back on Sept. 27 at the Orange Bowl. That Miami win snapped an 18-game regular season win streak for the Seminoles. Oklahoma's victory in the January 1 Orange Bowl ended a 15-game win streak for the Seminoles that stretched over two seasons.

STATS WITH BOWDEN--You may wonder what sort of statistics besides the win/loss record FSU has under Bowden. While compiling that 43-13 ledger, the Tribe has scored at a rate of 26.6 ppg. compared to the opponents' 15.5. This year's cast is scoring at a rate of 33.5 and giving up 7.2.

JOHNSON, UNGLAUB TIED--Wide receivers Hardis Johnson and Kurt Unglaub each have 10 career touchdown receptions. That ties them for eighth on Florida State's all-time list with Jim Tyson (1968-70). Johnson, however, is just a sophomore while Unglaub will be playing his final regular season game for the Seminoles Saturday.

MORE ABOUT JOHNSON--Seminole wide receiver Hardis Johnson has a better than average reception/touchdown ratio in his first two years. Hardis now has 31 career catches for 565 yards and 10 scores. That is just short of one TD for every three catches.

ABOUT ATTENDANCE--More than likely, a new FSU single game attendance record will be set Saturday. The current mark is 52,894 set this season (Oct. 11) vs. Pittsburgh. But, a more startling fact is that if the attendance passes the stadium capacity of 51,094 it will be the fifth time in seven games this season the announced crowd has been larger than capacity. The only games that did not at least match capacity were East Carolina (50,547) and Tulsa (47,683).



WHAT THE PLAYERS SAY...

LB REGGIE HERRING--"I don't think the long layoff will hurt us. It could be to our advantage if we use the time properly. It should give us time to become better prepared.

"Florida is an explosive football team. They will beat you any way they can. They're not going to try to run over you, they're going to try to beat you with the big play. It will take a total team effort and complete concentration on our part not to let that happen.

"Last season I think Florida responded to the occasion and we did not. Playing the game at Campbell Stadium means our fans will not let us get down.

"I couldn't ask for a better way to end my career. A game against Florida at home and the Orange Bowl coming up. I'm excited about the prospects."

QB RICK STOCKSTILL--"The long layoff has showed some in practice, but not where it would hurt. At first I wasn't happy about the change, but now I'm glad. If we had played the game as scheduled, Mike Whiting would not have been able to play. I would hate to play any game without him in the backfield.

"Any time you lay off it will take a little time for the receivers and quarterback to get their timing back. Weighing that against letting our players get some rest makes the layoff seem worth it.

"Right now all the talk is about the Orange Bowl, but it's not coming from the players. The only time I've thought about the OB was when I watched the Oklahoma-Nebraska game on television.

"Florida has a tough defense that can take turnovers and make them into points. We're going to have to be very careful and not do anything foolish."

K BILL CAPECE--"I think the time we had off will help us. Everyone should be 100 percent. I didn't kick for a week and then started up again and felt good. My leg was rested and I had a better mental attitude.

"I now have to kick three field goals against Florida to get the NCAA record. When I had all those field goals early in the season I felt sure the record would be mine, but now I just don't know. Three field goals in one game is unusual although I've had three or more several times this season.

"This game will be something. Our senior class could have the honor of being the first at Florida State to beat Florida four straight years. But, those Florida seniors would never have beaten us and I know they must be thinking about that. Both teams should be at an emotional high for this one. Everyone is going to be fired up.

"When we were on break everyone talked about the Orange Bowl, but the team is now thinking about just Florida. If we don't win our chance of finishing number one is gone. If we win, the chance is still there."

WHAT BOBBY SAYS...

ABOUT THE GAME--"Isn't this going to be a great game for the fans? I don't know how Charley (Pell) and I will like it but the fans should really get a charge out of this one. It has everything you would want in a football game--two teams with good records who are fighting for national prestige.

"Anyone who thinks this is just another game on the schedule is crazy. This one is for braggin' rights in the state. It's as big as Oklahoma-Nebraska, Pitt-Penn State, Army-Navy, USC-UCLA or any of those other big games. This game just hasn't had the national exposure of those other games, but some day I expect it might."

ABOUT THE LAYOFF--"I'm not concerned about the long layoff. Sure we might be rusty, but the advantages of being on national television and having the opportunity to showcase our football team across the country far out-weigh the layoff. Our team has stayed in great shape and mentally they are prepared. I think they will be anxious to play a football game again Saturday.

"Mentally we were tired after that Virginia Tech game. Remember our team had gone 13 weeks without a rest. That had taken its toll."

ABOUT TELEVISION APPEARANCE--"Anytime ABC wants us to play on television we will. If they ask us to play at 3 a.m. we will do that too. Sure, the financial advantages are great (\$300,000 for a national game), but it's also great for the players. Everyone seems to play better when they know the cameras are there."

ABOUT FLORIDA'S SEASON--"Last Saturday's loss doesn't take away anything from the Gator season. They have had a tremendous year considering what happened last season. Charley and his staff have turned that program around and even though that means more competition for us, I'm glad. I've always said that I would be glad to see the day when Florida State, Florida and Miami field outstanding football teams. That means the competition between us will be all the more intense and the desire to win will be stronger. I believe it's tremendous that the three of us are going to bowl games. No other state can say its three major football teams are bowl bound.



PLAYERS TO WATCH...

FLORIDA STATE

NG RON SIMMONS--(No. 50, 6-1, 240, Sr., Warner Robins, Ga.)--despite injuries this season he was named to the Kodak Coaches All-American first team and is a finalist for the Lombardi Award, which goes to the nation's outstanding lineman. Ron injured his right ankle during the first quarter of the LSU game and missed the remainder of that game plus the entire Louisville and East Carolina contests. He was a member of every pre-season All-America team. He's the most honored player in FSU history. As a junior he became only the third player at FSU to win consensus All-America honors and the first since Ron Sellers in 1967. The other FSU consensus All-American was receiver Fred Biletnikoff (1964). Simmons last season finished ninth in the Heisman Trophy voting, better than any other lineman. He was a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award.

P ROHN STARK--(No. 3, 6-3, 195, Jr., Fifty Lakes, Minn.)--has been named to a first team berth on the 1980 Football Writers Association All-American team. Throughout the year he has ranked among the national punting leaders. His booming kicks have consistently kept FSU out of trouble. Currently he has a 45.7 average in 51 boots. He almost assuredly will now have the FSU single season record, which currently is 41.9 yards per boot held by Pat Versprille since 1955. A two-sport athlete, he also participates with the track and field team where he is a decathlon competitor. Rohn, who's married and an amateur pilot, has hopes of making the next Olympic team.

CB BOBBY BUTLER--(No. 21, 5-11, 185, Sr., Delray Beach, Fla.)--following the Pittsburgh victory, the Panther coaching staff called Butler "the best cornerback in America." Normally the opposing coaching staff will throw to the side opposite Butler, who usually draws the other team's best receiver in man-to-man coverage. Butler has developed a speciality for blocking kicks, already coming up with two this season to run his career total to seven.

OT KEN LANIER--(No. 72, 6-4, 260, Sr., Columbus, Ohio)--is the veteran of the Seminoles' offensive line. He has been a starter since the second game of his freshman season. Many observers--pro scouts--seem to think he will be among the first 12 players selected in this year's draft. Like punter Rohn Stark, he's also a member of the Florida State track and field team that finished third in the NCAA Outdoor Championships last spring. Ken has the school record in the shot put and has been the Metro Conference champion the last two years in the event.

TB SAM PLATT--(No. 29, 6-0, 185, Sr., Jacksonville, Fla.)--with 46 yards rushing vs. Florida he can become the third player in FSU football history to gain 1,000 yards rushing in a season. His 10-game stats show 954 yards in 215 carries. That isn't bad for someone who spent his first three years with the Tribe as a wide receiver. Six times this fall Sam has rushed for more than 100 yards in a game, a new school record. He also set the school single game rushing mark vs. Memphis State gaining 188 yards in an ABC-TV regional game where he was named the MVP. Sam could take over the second spot for most yards rushing in a single season. Mark Lyles ran for 1,011 last year.

FLORIDA

WR CRIS COLLINSWORTH--(No. 21, 6-4, 190, Sr., Titusville, Fla.)--is known as Florida's big play man. He leads the Gators in receiving with 39 catches for 578 yards and three touchdowns. He was a pre-season All-American on several publications. He hails from the same high school (Titusville Astronaut) that gave Seminoles their starting linebacker, Reggie Herring. He has been All-SEC Academic for three consecutive seasons. Played quarterback in high school, but only called signals one year for the Gators. He has thrown two TD passes, one of them an NCAA record-tying 99 yards against Rice as a freshman.

TE CHRIS FAULKNER--(No. 80, 6-5, 250, So., Arcadia, Ind.)--rates behind Collinsworth as the Gators' second leading receiver. He has caught 22 passes for 239 yards and three touchdowns. Those three TDs ties him with Collinsworth for the team lead in that category. Last year Faulkner tied for the Southeastern Conference lead in touchdown receptions with four.

ABOUT SEMINOLES AND TV...

FSU AND ABC IN '80--This will be the third time in the 1980 season the ABC-TV cameras have been at a Florida State game. ABC was in Memphis, October 25, when the Tribe took a 24-3 verdict and in Tallahassee, November 8, for the 31-7 win over Virginia Tech. Both those games were regional, however, while Saturday's game is slated for national telecast.

SEMINOLES AND ABC-TV SINCE '77--The national TV appearance vs. Florida marks the ninth ABC-TV appearance for the Seminoles since 1977 when the Tribe bested Florida, 37-9 at Gainesville before a regional audience. In 1978, the Tribe was on twice--at Miami where FSU won 31-21 and in Tallahassee vs. LSU where the Seminoles took a 38-6 verdict. Last year there were three appearances--regionals vs. Virginia Tech (17-10) and LSU (24-19) and a national game vs. Florida (27-16). This year, FSU has beaten Memphis State (24-3) and Virginia Tech (31-7) on ABC.

BOWDEN IS PERFECT ON ABC--Seminole mentor Bobby Bowden has a perfect 8-0 record on ABC since coming to FSU.

BUT A BLEMISH--FSU does have a television loss under Bowden. That came in last year's Orange Bowl where Oklahoma won 24-7 before the NBC cameras in a national telecast. The 1977 Tangerine Bowl was broadcast by the Mizlou network nationwide and the Seminoles won by a 40-17 count over Texas Tech. Thus the Bowden TV record would be 9-1 since coming to Florida State.

SEMINOLES VS. FLORIDA ON ABC--Saturday will be the fourth time since 1968 that ABC had televised the FSU-Florida clash. In 1968 in Tallahassee the game drew a regional audience with the Gators winning 9-3. The next time ABC picked up the game was also for regional showing and the Seminoles won 37-9 at Gainesville in 1977. The cameras were back in Gainesville for a national telecast last season when FSU won 27-16.

FIRST EVER FROM TALLAHASSEE--Saturday will be the first time ABC-TV has ever done a national telecast from Doak Campbell Stadium. In the previous FSU national appearances the Tribe has always played away from Tallahassee. Four times ABC has done regional telecasts from Tallahassee--1968--a 9-3 loss to Florida; 1969--a 33-22 win over North Carolina State; 1978--a 38-6 win over Navy and 1980--a 31-7 win over Virginia Tech.

SEMINOLES NATIONAL ON ABC--This will be just the fourth national telecast for Florida State on ABC since the network began broadcasting the college football package. Other national appearances for the Seminoles were the 1967 Gator Bowl from Jacksonville (FSU 17-Penn State 17), 1970 from Tampa where Houston won a 53-21 verdict on Thanksgiving night and 1979 from Gainesville where the Tribe bested Florida, 27-16.

SEMINOLE ABC RECORD--This is the 19th ABC television appearance for the Seminoles since the 1959 season. Overall, the Seminoles have a 11-6-1 record in those games and have not lost in an ABC appearance since 1972 at Auburn where the War Eagles took a 27-14 verdict. Thus, FSU has eight straight wins before the ABC cameras.
