McVea is not so hefty, at :15-10 and 180 pounds, but Houston fans call him "Mac the Knife." Although out of two cames with injuries, he won national back of the week honors for his share in the upset of Michigan State,

South Florida was third in the meet with 72 points.

Cross Country scoring is a little complex. Each team is allowed seven entrants, but just the first five receives points. The meet winner gets 1 point, second place 2, etc. Add the points each team's first five fini-hers received and you have the team total. The low scorer wins.

Through this process, it was Florida State's No. 6 finisher, who didn't receive any points, who actually wrapped up the tie. Marc Williamson finished 11th just ahead of Florida's No. 5 finisher, giving the Gators one more point and the

Florida had earlier defeated FSU at Gainesville, and had won second place in the SEC meet, thus was a heavy favorite to walk off with state bonors.
