

## 70 Seminoles To Get Letters Here Tonight

Florida State University's annual spring sports banquet will be held here tonight with 70 varsity letters to be awarded athletes in baseball, golf, gymnastics, tennis, track and field and volley ball.

The annual banquet concludes Florida State's most successful sports year. The Seminoles started off the year by winning the Dixie Conference title for the third straight time with a football team that completed its season undefeated and untied against all opponents. The basketball team won 18 and lost nine games, took the district 25 NAIB championship and went to the quarter-finals of the National NAIB before being eliminated.

The Florida State swimming team established itself as the best in the deep south by winning all seven of its dual meets, tying for first in the Southeastern AAU and copping the Florida AAU title. The volley ball squad won the Florida AAU championship for the third straight year, became the first college team to win the Memphis Mid-South Invitational tournament and finished fourth in the international collegiate tournament at Springfield, Mass.

The Florida State gymnastics team brought the school its first national championship, winning national titles in both the NCAA and AAU competition. The Seminole gymnasts also took the Florida AAU, the Southeastern AAU and the Southern Inter-collegiate Gymnastic league championships.

The spring sports teams all came up with outstanding records. The track squad won four out of five dual meets, then successfully defended its Dixie Conference championship. The tennis squad won the Dixie Conference title for the third straight year. The golf team was unable to make the trip to defend its Dixie championship, but had a creditable season record of eight wins, three defeats and one tie. And the baseball team won 12 and lost six against all opponents and had a 6-1 mark in the Dixie Conference. The conference title has not been announced in baseball, but Florida State is leading contender.

## Dick Montney's Average Best

The Florida State University golf team completed its 1951 schedule with 8 wins, 3 defeats and a tie. The Seminole linksmen also finished first in a Pensacola Invitational tournament, third in the Florida Intercollegiate and seventh in the Southern Intercollegiate.

Dick Montney, a Senior from Detroit, Mich, came up with the best average medal score for the season. Playing as the Seminoles' number one man in most of the matches, Montney averaged 73.5 strokes for 22 rounds of 18 holes each—including tournament play. He won 6 dual matches, lost 4, tied 1, and in doubles play had a 9-1-1 mark.

Eddie Johnson, Tallahassee freshman, had a 73.9 average for 22 rounds; won 9 matches while losing only two in individual competition and had an 8-1-2 doubles record. Senior Ted Hewitt, captain of the team, had a 74.4 average for 14 rounds, won five out of seven individual matches and six out of seven in doubles. Hewitt is also from Detroit.

Bud Marsee, Junior from Mishawaka, Ind, was also in the low seventies with a 74.8 mark for 16 rounds. Marsee won 7 individual matches, lost 1, and had a 6-2 doubles record.

Other team marks include: Tom Cumbie of Quincy, 78.2, 6-3-1 singles, 6-4 doubles. Tommy Brown of Tallahassee, 81.3, 1-5-1 singles, 1-5 doubles. Mike Paczolt of Johnstown, Pa, 81.7, 2-0-1 singles, 1-2 doubles. Roscoe Barber, Tallahassee, 83.7, 1-3 singles, 0-3-1 doubles. Frank Hirt, Tallahassee, 85, 0-1 singles, 0-1 doubles.

Hewitt and Montney are the only Seniors on the 1951 golf squad. The Seminole linkstars were coached by Bob Harbison.
