

Florida State University dropped a 13-5 golf decision to Stetson on the Country Club course that left the Seminoles' season record at five wins and five losses.

Paced by stocky, blond Dick Johnson, who was one of the leading contenders for the 1951 George Washington Birthday tourney title here, the Hatters swept three of the individual matches and both of the team scoring events to avenge an early-season defeat inflicted by Coach Bob Harbison's team on the De-Land links.

Johnson was the only player able to better par figures on the rolling Country Club course, checking in with a two-under-par 70 that enabled him to beat Jimmy James 2½-1½.

Grace Lenczyk, former national women's amateur champion who had beaten football star Tommy Brown in the first FSU-Stetson match, was beaten yesterday as Tom Cumbie scored a 2-1 triumph.

Cumbie had the low medal for the Seminoles with a 75. Miss Lenczyk needed 79 strokes to negotiate the hilly local layout.

Chuck Rea of Stetson beat Jude Dunfee of FSU, 2-1, and Johnny Nichols of the Hatters blanked big Frank Hirt of the Seminoles, 3-0.

In team scoring, Johnson and Miss Lenczyk beat James-Cumbie, 2½-1½, and the Rea-Nichols duo downed Dunfee-Hirt, 2-1.
